# Message from the Rector



Dear People of God,

The January 2014 *Columbia* magazine had a marvelous article entitled, “The Gospel of Life According to Pope Francis.” This article traces Pope Francis’ key pro-life statements beginning as Cardinal Bergoglio and including comments since his Papacy started in March 2013.

During his 15 years as Archbishop of Buenos Aires to the present time, Pope Francis has always defended the dignity of human life from the moment of conception to natural death. Pope Francis has consistently had primary concern for the most vulnerable and defenseless human beings including children (born and unborn), the disabled and the elderly. We have seen this lived out on live television—inviting children into the sanctuary and kissing the elderly and sick.

## Public Responsibility

I want to focus in particular on two stages of life that I consider essential for the growth in peace of different generations: childhood and old age. They are the two extremes of life, and they are the most vulnerable and the most forgotten. A society that abandons its children and eliminates its elderly is mortgaging its future.

## On Abortion

The moral problem with abortion is of a pre-religious nature because the generic code of the person is present at the moment of conception. This means that a human being already exists. I separate the issue of abortion from any religious concept. It is a scientific problem. To not allow further progress in the development of a being that already has the entire genetic code of a human being is not ethical. The right to life is the first human right. Abortion means killing someone who cannot defend himself.

## Saying “Yes” to Life

All too often, as we know from experience, people do not choose life, they do not accept the “Gospel of Life” but let themselves be led by ideologies and ways of thinking that block life, that do not respect life, because they are dictated by selfishness, self-interest, profit, power and pleasure, and not by love, by concern for the good of others. It is the eternal dream of wanting to build the city of man without God, without God’s life and love—a new Tower of Babel . . . Dear brothers and sisters, let us look to God as the God of Life, let us look to his law, to the Gospel message as the way to freedom and life . . . Let us say “Yes” to life and not death. Let us say “Yes” to freedom and not enslavement to the many idols of our time. In a word, let us say “Yes” to God who is love, life and freedom, and who never disappoints . . . Let us ask Mary, Mother of Life, to help us receive and bear constant witness of the “Gospel of Life.”

Be witness and diffusers of the “culture of life.” Your being Catholic entails a greater responsibility: first of all to yourselves, through a commitment consistent with your Christian vocation; and then to contemporary culture, by contributing to recognizing the transcendent dimensions of human life, the imprint of God’s creative work, from the first moment of its conception. This is a task of the new evangelization that often requires going against the tide and paying for it personally. The Lord is also counting on you to spread the “Gospel of Life.”

# Stewardship

## Lead a life filled with light.

The prophet Isaiah again records a remarkable prophecy in our First Reading from the Book of Isaiah. Within the context of that Scriptural reading Isaiah says, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." Just prior to that Isaiah speaks of two areas of Israel that are also the names of two of the twelve tribes of Israel — Zebulon and Naphtali. These tribes were located at the northern end of Israel adjacent to the Sea of Galilee.

When the Assyrians invaded and occupied Israel, it was the northern tribes like Zebulon and Naphtali that suffered the most. It was they on whom the greatest gloom and darkness descended. However, the prophecy speaks of the coming of the Messiah, the birth of Jesus, the Light of the World. Thus, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light."

Christ is still the light of the world, and He still provides this light and hope to those of us who may feel like we are in darkness and distress. We must embrace Him nonetheless and follow His way by becoming His disciple. If we do that, our lives will indeed be filled with light and great rejoicing. It is up to us to respond. In John 8:12, the Lord tells us, "I am the light of the world; anyone who follows me will not be walking in dark, but will have the light of life."
