Message from the Rector



Dear People of God,

Christmas morn has passed, but we continue our Christmas Season as we celebrate this weekend the Feast of the Epiphany.

What does Epiphany mean? As many of you know, Epiphany means appearance or revelation. It means a showing, a direction for our search. And interestingly enough, the scriptures imply it is a search that everyone must make. Luke, in the Gospel, has the poor searching in the form of shepherds. Matthew, in his Gospel, has the learned and rich searching in the form of the Magi. So the message is that there is room for everybody in this search for life's meaning and purpose, from no degrees to PhD's, from shepherds to executives.

And so to the Magi. They are three searchers who did not find the answer to life in their horoscopes, but took a long and difficult journey to another country in search of the Christ.

The Feast of the Epiphany means finding Christ. It is not a one-time thing. Rather, finding the Lord is a lifelong quest, like a marriage or a profound friendship. And we, like the Magi, gather to focus on the One who loves us and abides with us. The more we connect the way of Jesus with our story—if searching is our road, then finding will be our home.

Epiphany is about dreams, hopes, searching and direction. The destination is not as critical as the journey. In our life, what are we searching for and what are we finding? We sometimes seek happiness in all the wrong places. Dream big dreams! However, in our search, always keep our eyes fixed on the Lord Jesus Christ and doors will open we never dreamed possible.

The Little Hut

The only survivor of the shipwreck was washed up on a small, uninhabited island. He prayed feverishly for God to rescue him, and every day he scanned the horizon for help, but none seemed forthcoming. Exhausted, he eventually managed to build a little hut out of driftwood to protect himself from the elements, and to store his few possessions. But then one day, after scavenging for food, he arrived home to find his little hut in flames, the smoke rolling up to the sky. The worst had happened—everything was lost. He was stunned with grief and anger. “God, how could you do this to me?” he cried.

Early the next day, however, he was awakened by the sound of a ship that was approaching the island. It had come to rescue him. “How did you know I was here?” asked the weary man of his rescuers. “We saw your smoke signal,” they replied.

It's easy to get discouraged sometimes when things appear to be going badly. But we shouldn't lose heart, because God is at work in our lives, even in the midst of pain and suffering. Remember, next time your little hut is burning to the ground, it just may be a smoke signal that summons the grace of God.

Look what you did!

Today our Gospel tells the story of the Magi bringing gifts to the newborn Lord. In these past few weeks, you have also brought gifts to the Lord in your gifts to people in need. The generous spirit of Holy Name Cathedral parishioners and visitors made this winter warmer and Christmas a bit kinder.

1. For our annual *Christmas in October*, we appealed for \$10 gift cards to be given to our Thursday and Friday Suppers guests. We needed 250, and you donated 300+. (The extra cards were shared with individuals who were in need of basic supplies this Christmas season).
2. For our annual *Christmas in November*, we appealed for gloves for the guests who attend our Suppers. We needed 250; you donated over 450! (The extras were shared with 2 parishes: St. Malachy and St. Benedict the African). In addition to gloves, the busy hands of our Act 2 members knitted over 500 pieces, mainly hats and headbands! A senior citizen in Indiana with family ties to Holy Name has made a year round project of crocheting and knitting for our guests, sending 5 bags of hats, scarves and lap blankets. Thank you Helen McArde, Act 2 Knitters and Clarissa!
3. Each week in the bulletin there are appeals for *cash donations* and *dessert bakers* to support our year round effort to feed 210 people every Thursday and Friday evening. As always, our parishioners and visitors respond generously.

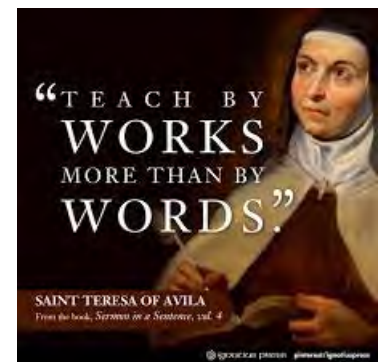

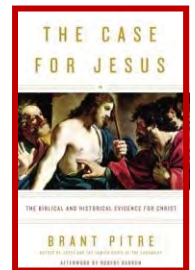
January Book Club Meeting

New Year Resolutions & Stewardship

The beginning of the year is a popular time for personal reassessment. The earth has finished one more revolution around the sun, and swings low over the cold January horizon, just like last year. The days are shorter, and an evening of introspection seems more inviting. Somehow, when we take down the old calendar and tack up the new, we sense an opportunity to make a fresh start.

To make the best of this opportunity (which, truthfully, exists in June just as it does in January), it's useful to make firm commitments. It's even more useful to write them down. These resolutions — kept in a desk drawer or on the refrigerator door — are a “hard copy” of our best intentions for self-improvement. They're signposts that redirect our lives towards good, towards God.

Often New Year's resolutions are about personal health, such as losing weight, relaxing more, or smoking less. And it is important, of course, to take good care of our bodies. But Christianity offers us a fuller concept of self-improvement. St. Paul reminds us that both the body and the soul need an exercise program. In fact, every aspect of our persons — physical, mental, spiritual, emotional — can benefit from an annual self-audit.

Some people have taken to heart this multi-faceted concept of the self, and each year make one resolution for each area. For instance, one could resolve to join a rosary prayer group to work on spirituality, or take a continuing education course to build mental skills. Still other people use the three theological virtues — faith, hope, and love — to guide their resolution-making process.

By now you may have discerned a similarity between New Year's resolutions and Stewardship commitments. First, we use a similar method to think about Stewardship, by breaking it down into more specific concepts: time, talent, and treasure. Second, to become better stewards, we write down our commitments. We record our good intentions to clarify exactly what they are — and to remind us of our commitment on the evenings when the Rosary group interferes with a bowl game.

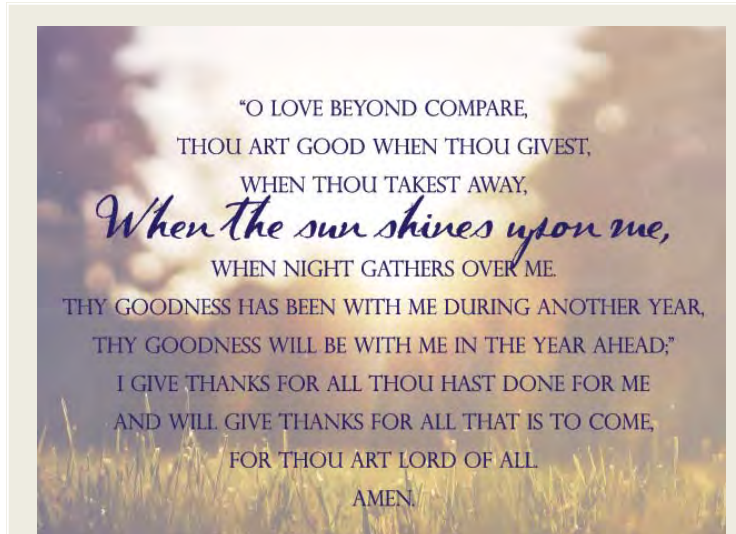
Any serious commitment shares the same components — it is specific, and it is written. From marriages to mortgages, treaties to trades — serious resolutions are spelled out, literally and figuratively.

But even more important than the methodology of a commitment is the heart of the person who makes it. Even the most well-written job descriptions are useless unless there is someone to do the job well! Let us pray that this new year is a time of grace and wisdom for those of us who seek to recommit our lives to our family, our parish, and our God.

New Catholic School Scholarship Opportunity for 2018/19 School Year



Through the “Invest in Kids Act,” the state of Illinois has created a new way to fund scholarships for children from low-income households who want to attend private schools. This program provides an opportunity for more students to receive a quality Catholic education. The tax credit scholarships offered through this program could cover **up to 100 percent of tuition and fees** for eligible, low-income students. Not all families will be eligible for the new scholarships, but we want to make sure all families are aware of the program.
