Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

A Blessed, Happy and Healthy New Year to all! 2022 is history and the doors have swung open to 2023. As we start a New Year together, it can be an excellent opportunity to remember and look forward with hope and joy in the Lord Jesus.

Life is difficult and the road is filled with many bumps and curves. However, God is constant and straight in His love for us. God pursues us — always seeking to love and forgive each one. Our God is a God of second chances and new beginnings. Jesus came into our world to reveal His Father of love, mercy, forgiveness and new beginnings. The Lord truly holds each one of us in the palm of His hands!

And speaking of hands, I share with you a story given to me. Prayerfully read this story between a grandfather and his grandson as we begin a new year together.

One day I sat beside Grandpa, and he didn't acknowledge my presence, and the longer I sat, I wondered if he was OK. Finally, not wanting to disturb him but wanting to check on him at the same time, I asked him if he was OK.

He raised his head and looked at me, and smiled. "Yes, I'm fine, thank you for asking." He said in a clear, strong voice.

"I didn't mean to disturb you, Grandpa, but you were just sitting here staring at your hands, and I wanted to make sure you were OK," I explained to him.

"Have you ever looked at your hands?" he asked. "I mean, really looked at your hands?" I slowly opened my hands and stared down at them. I turned them over, palms up and then palms down. No, I had never looked at my hands as I tried to figure out his point.

Grandpa smiled and related this story:

"Stop and think for a moment about the hands you have, how they have served you well throughout your years. Though wrinkled, shriveled and weak, these hands have been the tools I have used all my life to reach out and

grab and embrace life. They braced and caught my fall when, as a toddler, I crashed upon the floor. They put food in my mouth and clothes on my back. As a child, my mother taught me to fold them in prayer. They tied my shoes and pulled on my boots. They held my rifle and wiped my tears when I was off to war.

"They have been dirty, scraped and raw, swollen and bent. They were uneasy and clumsy when I tried to hold my newborn son. Decorated with my wedding band, they showed the world that I was married and loved someone special."

"They wrote letters home and trembled and shook when I buried my parents and spouse and walked my daughter down the aisle. Yet, they were strong and sure when I dug my buddy out of a foxhole and lifted a plow off my best friend's foot.

"They had held children, consoled neighbors and shook in fists of anger when I didn't understand. They have covered my face, combed my hair, and washed and cleansed the rest of my body. They have been sticky and wet, bent and broken, dried and raw. And to this day, when not much of anything else of me works well, these hands hold me up, lay me down, and again continue to fold in prayer. These hands are the mark of where I've been and the ruggedness of my life. But more importantly, it will be these hands that God will reach out and take when he leads me home. And with my hands, He will lift me to His side, and there I will use these hands to touch the face of Christ."

I will never look at my hands the same again. But I remember God reached out, took my grandpa's hands, and led him home. When my hands are hurt or sore or when I stroke the face of my children and wife, I think of Grandpa. I know he has been stroked, caressed, and held by the hands of God. I, too, want to touch the face of God and feel his hands upon my face.

To love another person is to see the face of God! May our New Year together be filled with God's Blessings, Peace and Joy. God bends to touch us first!

Celebrate Jesus' Holy Name on our Feast Day on Tuesday

As we begin a new calendar year, many possibilities are placed before us to grow in our life of faith. And on Jan. 3, we have the opportunity to celebrate our parish's feast day and our Cathedral, the Holy Name of Jesus. Every church, when the bishop dedicates it, is placed under the title of a saint, an event in the life of the Lord, a title of our Blessed Mother, or a title associated with our Savior. Holy Name parish was founded in the 1840s and became the Cathedral of the diocese when the current church building was dedicated in 1875. Holy Name Cathedral has been a beacon of hope, a place of welcome, and an oasis in the busyness of Chicago for generations. Many have come here to give glory to God through the Holy Name of Jesus.

The Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus was traditionally celebrated on Jan. 1, eight days after Christmas, which in Jewish tradition was the day a child was named and a boy circumcised. In the second chapter of Luke's Gospel, we read, "When eight days were completed for his circumcision, he was named Jesus, the name given him by the angel before he was conceived in the womb" (Luke 2:21). Since Jan. 1 is not always a Sunday, and given the significance of the name of Jesus in our




faith, the Church moved the feast. For a time it was the Sunday between Jan. 2 and 5. When there is no Sunday in between, we celebrate the feast on Jan. 2.

After continuous moving of the date and even removing it from the General Calendar in 1969, the Church added it again in the 2002 Roman Missal. We now celebrate the Feast of the Holy Name every year on Jan. 3. The Society of Jesus (Jesuits) mark it as their feast day, as their crest has the monogram of the Holy Name, the exact monogram in our ceiling: IHS. We celebrate the name because a name is significant. A name points to a reality.

In St. Paul's letter to the Philippians, there is an ancient Christian hymn found in chapter 2, read during Holy Week, that teaches us the significance of a name: "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confesses that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Phil 2:10-11). The Name of Jesus has power. The Name of Jesus is holy. Let us always be mindful that when we call upon the name of the Lord, he hears us and answers our needs.

Join us for Mass on Tuesday, Jan. 3, at 7am, 8am, and 12pm as we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Name of Jesus, the patronage under which our Cathedral, our diocese, and our ecclesiastical province are placed. As we begin this new calendar year, let us dedicate ourselves to keeping the Name of Jesus holy and calling upon his name in every moment of our life.

During this continued Christmas season, it is well to remember and repeat the classic statement by the character Tiny Tim in Charles Dickens' immortal A Christmas Carol: "God bless us, every one," for certainly He does.
