

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

"The Word was made flesh, and he made his dwelling among us." These momentous words from the beginning of John's Gospel describe exactly what we celebrate at Christmas. Jesus, the eternal Son of God, has indeed come among us and become a part of our human family. He shared our joys and our sorrows. God bless you and all your loved ones. As I celebrate the Eucharist in this Christmas season, know that I bring all of you to the altar with me.





Inspiring O Antiphons Show the Coming of the Messiah

s we move into this final week of our Advent journey, we have begun the O Antiphons leading up to the Solemnity of Christmas. From Dec. 17 to Dec. 23, the Church draws nearer and nearer to the coming of the Lord in the flesh; something humanity has longed for generations.



The famous Advent hymn: "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," derives its verses from the O Antiphons of the liturgical year, found in the daily Mass Alleluia verse acclamation and the Vespers Antiphon for the Magnificat. Vespers is the official Evening Prayer of the Church, known more broadly as the Liturgy of the Hours or, to some, as the breviary. Every ordained member of the clergy promises to pray the Liturgy of the Hours daily, and religious communities also pray the hours. What is unknown to most is that all the faithful are invited and able to pray the Liturgy of the Hours by virtue of their baptism, making each of us a priest, prophet and king.

The O Antiphons are inspiring in their theology because they draw from Old Testament imagery heavy with messianic prophecies. For Catholics, each of these O Antiphons references the coming of the Messiah fulfilled in the Lord's birth in Bethlehem. The world

longs for the coming of the Messiah, and as we know what happens on Christmas morning, our desire intensifies during these final days of Advent.

The seven O Antiphons are also, in the Latin translations, titles of Jesus:

- · Dec. 17: O Sapientia (O Wisdom)
- Dec. 18: O Adonai (O Lord)
- Dec. 19: O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse)
- Dec. 20: O Clavis David (O Key of David)
- Dec. 21: O Oriens (O Dayspring)
- Dec. 22: O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations)
- · Dec. 23: O Emmanuel (O With Us is God)

Rarely do we have four full weeks of Advent since Christmas Day moves each day of the week every calendar year. Next year, in 2023, Christmas Day is on Monday. Therefore, we will celebrate the fourth Sunday of Advent on Sunday, December 24, and Christmas Eve liturgically begins after 3pm on the same day.

As we move closer to the coming of the Lord in the flesh, and as the Church invites us to shout with joy our Advent anthem, Come, Lord Jesus! each day this week. We must never forget the Lord has come and comes among us every time we gather for Mass. May these days point the way to the Lord who humbles himself so that we may be set free from darkness, sin, and death and celebrate the fact that God is with us.

Theology 101

The Foundations of the Moral Life (part 2)

Part 1 of this column ran in the Dec. 11 bulletin

onsider this basic text for morality from the Book of Exodus (20:2), a verse that stands at the head of the Ten Commandments: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me." Then the other nine commandments follow.



Notice the foundation for morality contained in this one seminal verse.

The verse begins with God affirming his relationship with his people: "I am the Lord your God." From the beginning, there is a clear affirmation of a relationship between God and his people. This is not about abstract and external precepts or principles. Everything is rooted in a relationship. Secondly, God affirms that he "brought [his people] out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery." Not only is there a relationship, but there is also a history. God has taken the initiative and graciously freed his people from slavery. They have benefited from his grace and graciousness. Finally, after affirming the relationship and the grace, comes the moral consequence

or response: "you shall have no other gods before me."

The foundations of a moral life rest, then, on a living response to a loving and graced relationship for which God has taken the initiative. To be moral is to want to be true to that relationship and that grace. There is nothing external here. It is intrinsic to the relationship to want to respond to it. And that response becomes love answering love.

Similarly, in a specifically Christian context, Pope Saint Leo the Great in a Christmas homily explains the foundations of the moral life for those who are joined to Jesus Christ. They respond in love to the internalized relationship which has made them who they are: "Christians, recognize your dignity and, now that you share in God's own nature, do not return to your former base condition by sinning. Remember who is your head and of whose body you are a member. Never forget that you have been rescued from the power of darkness and brought into the light of the Kingdom of God."

So we come to understand the true foundations of the moral life. They belong to the response and responsibility we have to the loving relationship that God has initiated with us. And immersed in that relationship — with the deepest gratitude — we want to be true to it. That launches and sustains our moral direction, how we decide and how we act.



As our Advent preparations draw to a close and Christmas fast approaches, it is fitting that today's readings demonstrate the intensity of the Father's perfect and passionate love for each of us, culminating in the gift of His own Son, Jesus Christ, on Christmas Day.



In response to such an overwhelming gift, what can we do except offer our

lives as a gift in return, embracing a stewardship way of life with all the love and strength we have to give?

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, we find an unparalleled example of one who embraced this way of life in St. Joseph, as he obeys God's call to him through the message of an angel.

We never hear St. Joseph speak, but the Scriptures tell us he was always listening, attentive to the leading of the Holy Spirit for his family. It was Joseph who found the stable where the baby Jesus would be born. No doubt it was Joseph who cleaned it up and prepared it for Mary and Jesus since we know that Mary was about to give birth. Joseph protected the family, guarded them, and tended to their safety, their comfort, and their well-being at the expense of his own plans and preferences. Though we do not hear any words from St. Joseph his actions clearly show that he offered himself, his whole life, as a gift to his family through his strong guidance, protection, and service.

Let us imitate St. Joseph, then, as good stewards, giving our very lives to those around us in love and gratitude to God, who has given us everything we have, especially His own Son, Jesus Christ.
