# Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

We celebrate this weekend the Feast of the Epiphany as our Christmas season continues.

What does Epiphany mean? As many of you know, Epiphany means appearance or revelation. It means a showing, a direction for our search.

The scriptures imply it's a search that everyone must make. Luke, in the Gospel, has the poor searching in the form of shepherds. Matthew, in his Gospel, has the learned and rich searching in the form of the Magi. So, the message is there is room for everybody in this search for life's meaning and purpose, from no degrees to PhDs, from shepherds to executives.

And so to the Magi. They are three searchers who did not find the answer to life in their horoscopes, but took a long and difficult journey to another country in search of the Christ.

The Feast of the Epiphany means finding Christ and letting the Lord Jesus find us. It is not a one-time thing. Rather, finding the Lord is a lifelong quest, like a marriage or a profound friendship. And we, like the Magi, gather to focus on the One who loves us and abides with us. The more we connect the way of Jesus with our story — if searching is our road — then finding will be our home.

Epiphany is about dreams, hopes, searching and direction. The destination is not as critical as the journey. In our life, what are we searching for and what are we finding? We sometimes seek happiness in all the wrong places. Dream big dreams! However, in our search, always keep our eyes fixed on the Lord Jesus Christ and doors will open we never dreamed possible.

Reflect upon the following story ... And pass it on ...

#### TWO HORSES (Author Unknown)

Just up the road from my home is a field with two horses in it.

From a distance, each horse looks like any other horse. But if you stop your car, or are walking by, you will notice something quite amazing....

Looking into the eyes of one horse will disclose that he is blind. His owner has chosen not to have him put down but has made a good home for him.

This alone is amazing.

If you stand nearby and listen, you will hear the sound of a bell. Looking around for the source of the sound, you will see that it comes from the smaller horse in the field.

Attached to the horse's halter is a small bell. It lets the blind friend know where the other horse is, so he can follow.

As you stand and watch these two friends, you'll see that the horse with the bell is always checking on the blind horse, and that the blind horse will listen for the bell and then slowly walk to where the other horse is. trusting that he will not be led astray.

When the horse with the bell returns to the shelter of the barn each evening, it stops occasionally and looks back, making sure that the blind friend isn't too far behind to hear the bell.

Like the owners of these two horses, God does not throw us away just because we are not perfect or because we have problems or challenges.

He watches over us and even brings others into our lives to help us when we are in need.

Sometimes we are the blind horse, helping others to find their way. ...

Good friends are like that. You may not always see them, but you may trust that they are always there.

Please listen for my bell and I'll listen for yours.



## Reflecting on the Power, Meaning and Symbols of Baptism

very Catholic church throughout the world contains ■ the same essential elements and signs of our faith: the altar, the crucifix, the ambo, and the tabernacle. And almost immediately, before we enter any of these sacred spaces, we are greeted by holy water, the reminder of our baptism.



An often-overlooked element of any Catholic church is that, along with the other major 'pieces' in the physical structure, every church also has a baptismal font. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "the gathering of the People of God begins with Baptism; a church must have a place for the celebration of Baptism and for fostering remembrance of the baptismal promises (holy water font)" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1185). What is unique to each parish church, though, is the style of the baptismal font.

In early Christianity, the font was in the shape of a sarcophagus, representing the reality of what baptism celebrates. St. Paul says in his letter to the Romans, "Or are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life" (Romans 6:3-4). In baptism, we die to our former way of life, a

life of darkness and sin, and are reborn into the new life in Christ. That is why many elements of baptism (holy water, white garment, Pascal Candle) are the same symbols used at Catholic funeral liturgies.

Today, modern fonts have symbolism as well. The design of our sanctuary font at Holy Name Cathedral is for total immersion and simply pouring water over the head. Both basins are in the shape of an octagon, symbolizing the eight days of creation, the 8th day being a reality of new life in Christ, that in him, life never ends. Other fonts are circular, symbolizing the unbreakable bond of love and inclusion in the family of God. Every font's design should also allow the water to continue to circulate. Still water creates murkiness and algae, but constantly moving water is always clear. This design element reminds us, as disciples, to always move forward on the journey and not remain still, no matter how difficult times may be.

As we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord on Monday, Jan. 9, let us take this opportunity to reflect on what baptism means for us as individuals and as a church. To be baptized means to die in this life and be reborn into life in and with Christ. It means joining the community of disciples who seek to be the hands and feet of Jesus in our world today and always moving forward with each other. If you don't know your baptism date, find it, and celebrate it as another birthday. It is always a joyful moment to celebrate the day we conquered death and became alive in Christ for eternity.



# Like the Wise Men, Explore New Routes in Your Daily Life

ou are holding beautiful things! What do you have there?" I asked enthusiastically, hoping someone would respond since it was late in the evening.



One child joyfully raised her proud voice, "These are Christmas stars. And we made them." I continued our conversation, "Wow, that's amazing! How did you put the star together?" The girl replied, "I lined up the sticks, glued the paper to the sticks, and finished within an hour or two." I expressed my astonishment, "You are so talented. You guys can open a store." She quickly answered, "That's what my mother said, too." Seeing parents teaching their children our faith with such creativity is beautiful. Making stars is a way to prepare them for our big feast of Christmas.

In the Gospel reading this weekend, the star appeared as a sign to lead the Magi to the Lord. St. Gregory said in a homily preached in the year 591:

"We must look for why it was an angel who appeared to the shepherds in Judea at the birth of the Redeemer. While it was not an angel, but a star who led the wise men from the East to worship him." This insight comes from the fact that the Jews knew how to use their reason; it is a reasonable living being, here an angel, who was to inform them. The pagans, on the contrary, did not know how to use reason. They are brought to the knowledge of the Lord, not by words, but by signs. Hence Paul's words: 'Prophecies are given to believers, not to unbelievers, signs to unbelievers, not to believers' (1 Cor 14:22). The prophecies are given to the first as

believers, not unbelievers. And it is as unbelievers that the second, unbelievers, receive signs.

As we reflect on the entire salvation history and celebrate Christmas, we can embrace the historical event and, most importantly, the person of Jesus. And just as the Magi used different routes to return to their homes after the meeting with the Lord, we are invited to explore new avenues in our daily lives. Changing our routines can open a new route leading us to live a more holy life.

#### **Watching for God's Presence**

As our celebration of Christmas continues, today we observe the great feast of The Epiphany of the Lord. The word "epiphany" comes from Greek and means manifestation



or appearance. The stewardship way of life is one in which we live in grateful response to God's countless manifestations in our lives.

Our Gospel passage, from Matthew, has much to teach us about stewardship, through the actions of the magi.

As good stewards, the magi were watching for manifestations of God's presence in their lives. "We have seen the star at its rising," they say. Good stewards are keenly aware of the "star" of God's presence and His gifts in their lives. It is this awareness that fills them with gratitude and the desire to both worship God and share His gifts with others.

The magi, upon seeing the manifestation of God's presence in their lives, "were overjoyed." Good stewards, who live with the awareness of God's presence and gifts to them, simply can't help but be filled with joy. Not necessarily the fleeting and superficial kind of joy the world promises through wealth or power, but rather the deep, unalterable joy only God can give.

Finally, the magi were so filled with awe upon encountering the newborn Jesus, they prostrated themselves before him and "opened their treasures and offered him gifts." This is precisely why good stewards generously share their material gifts — as a loving act of worship to an extravagantly loving God.

Let us rejoice in God's manifestations in our lives and be watchful for the new ways He is calling us to share ourselves and our gifts in gratitude to our King in the year ahead.
