Not Just the Last Rites: All About Anointing of the Sick

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is one of the seven sacraments of the Church.

And it is one of the two Sacraments of Healing, the second being the Sacrament of Reconciliation. There is a lot of misunderstanding around this Sacrament, and I hope this article and the article for next week will clear up any confusion. **On Saturday, Feb. 11, the 9am Mass will be a Healing Mass**, so within the Mass, the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick will be conferred upon those who have determined they require the grace found in this Sacrament.

Until the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), whenever the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick was celebrated, it was often only on the literal deathbed. The Sacrament was more well known as Last Rites or Extreme Unction. In their 1963 Document on the Liturgy, the Vatican Council said the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is not only for those near death (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 73). This thinking moved the understanding of the Sacrament from only in time of death to any sick person. Since then, believers can receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick multiple times.

The Sacrament of Anointing is in sacred scripture,



namely in Mark 6, and very explicitly in the Letter of James, which we read during the Rite. “Is anyone among you sick? He should summon the presbyters of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint [him] with oil in the name of the Lord, and the prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven (James 5:14-15). Since the Sacrament of Anointing also has the power to forgive sins, only a priest or bishop is allowed to celebrate this Sacrament.

The forgiveness of sins is often linked to physical healing. We see this in the Gospels, such as the healing of the paralytic. Preferably, a person confesses their sins before the Sacrament. If the person is unconscious, perhaps someone near death, the forgiveness of sins is celebrated in the Rite. The Sacrament includes anointing the forehead and hands with blessed olive oil. Traditionally, the bishop blesses the oil at Chrism Mass during the year’s Holy Week with the following prayer: “Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May he who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up.” This formula has been used for centuries, linking us to the millions of Christians who have found comfort in these words as they endured illness and prepared for death.

A New Way to Extend Your Spiritual Lenten Practice

The homemade chocolate cookies looked crunchy and delicious. Sam offered them to the Bible Study group; of course, I took one. When the tray went to Matt, he said, “Thanks, man, but I will pass.” Sam realized that Matt was doing Exodus 90. Why not have sweets during this time of the year since Lent is not yet here? What is Exodus 90? Sometimes, you hear people talking about taking cold showers, praying daily, checking with their anchor, eating healthy, etc. These are signs that they are doing an extended spiritual Lenten practice called Exodus 90, a 90-day spiritual exercise for men.



Based on Christ’s roadmap to freedom, Exodus 90 has three parts: prayer, asceticism, and fraternity. Men who desire to grow in their spiritual life and gain more freedom will form a fraternity of five to seven men who agree to follow a set structure of prayer, asceticism, and fraternity for 90 days. During this time, they will read a daily section from the book of Exodus, paired with daily reflections. This year, Exodus 90 started on Jan. 9, but I started on Jan 16, so I need to catch up. And like everything in life, it has challenges and joys



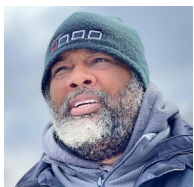

Join Our Lenten Program Caring for Our New Neighbors

The Gospel reminds us that we are called to root our lives of faith in the authentic love of our neighbor. Pope Benedict XVI reflected on this call when he wrote about “the unbreakable bond between love of God and love of neighbor.” (Deus Caritas Est, no. 16). He continued: “One is so closely connected to the other that to say that we love God becomes a lie if we are closed to our neighbors or hate him altogether. St. John’s words should rather be interpreted to mean that love of neighbor is a path that leads to the encounter with God, and that closing our eyes to our neighbor also blinds us to God.”

We invite our Faith Community to participate in showing love for our new neighbors, migrant families from Central and South America — approximately 370 individuals currently housed at the former Tremont Hotel, a few blocks from the Cathedral. We are organizing a Lenten program to provide immediate assistance to these families in collaboration with Fourth Presbyterian Church, which has already begun supporting our new neighbors. There will be opportunities to assist with collecting clothing, providing meal programs, Spanish translation for social services, and developing special Lenten worship programs. There will be something for everyone — make this a part of your Lenten almsgiving. Please help us welcome our new neighbors in their time of transition as their long journeys bring them to their new home in Chicago.
