Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Our Lenten journey to the cross with the Lord begins this Wednesday. The ashes marked on our foreheads Ash Wednesday literally mark us --- remind us --- commit us to a season of repentance, change and prayer. Will this Lenten Season come and go like

any other 40-day period in our life? Or possibly, can the Lenten Season allow me to probe my heart and look for an area of my life that needs change, healing or growth?

Erma Bombeck, the well-known author, wrote the following reflection after she discovered she was dying from cancer. Bombeck's honest self-evaluation offers all of us an opportunity to look within our heart and change -- while there is still time! Take a read and pass on ...

If I Had My Life To Live Over

I would have gone to bed when I was sick instead of pretending the earth would go into a holding pattern if I weren't there for a day.

I would have burned the pink candle sculpted like a rose before it melted in storage.

I would have talked less and listened more.

I would have invited friends over for dinner even if the carpet was stained or the sofa faded.

I would have eaten the popcorn in the "good" living room and worried much less about the dirt when someone wanted to light a fire in the fireplace.

I would have taken the time to listen to my grandfather ramble about his youth.

I would have shared more of the responsibility carried by my husband.

I would never have insisted that the car windows be rolled up on a summer day because my hair had just been teased and sprayed.

I would have sat on the lawn with my children and not worried about grass stains.

I would have cried and laughed less while watching television and more while watching life.

I would never have bought anything just because it was practical, wouldn't show soil or was guaranteed

for a lifetime.

Instead of wishing away nine months of pregnancy, I'd have cherished every moment and realized that the wonderment growing inside me was the only chance in life to assist God in a miracle.

When my kids kissed me impetuously, I would never have said, "Later. Now go get washed up for dinner."

There would have been more "I love you's." More "I'm sorry's."

But mostly, given another shot at life, I would seize every minute... look at it and really see it...live it...and never give it back.

Never sweat the small stuff.

Don't worry about who doesn't like you, who has more, or who's doing what.

Instead, let's cherish the relationships we have with those who do love us (Including the Lord).

What can Lent 2023 be for you this year? Bring this on the Lenten journey with you to the Lord Jesus in prayer and spirit of repentance.

In Matthew's account of the Gospel, Jesus clearly builds on the passage from Leviticus. "Be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect." (5:48) To "be perfect"



is the same as to "be holy." Such holiness would mean that the individual is undivided in their interior and exterior lives. Jesus offers three succinct scenarios that reflect Mediterranean culture...All of these cultural situations required action to defend one's honor. Instead, Jesus advises a different approach. Find another way to respond that avoids violence. Rise above those insults. Use your imagination to discover how best to overcome the insult in ways that rise above it and beyond violence. Being holy not only includes spending time in prayer and meditation but requires active living on behalf of justice in the world. Faith and action go hand in hand.

Enhance Your Lent with Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving

This Wednesday, the Church will begin our journey through the desert in preparation for the joyful day of Easter Sunday, with Ash Wednesday. The ritual of marking ourselves with ashes as a sign of repentance from sin goes back to the Old Testament. Ashes signify humility and repentance, recognizing our sinfulness and desiring to be made new in God's sight. Throughout the Old Testament, many people marked themselves with ashes as they realized their sinfulness, recognizing their need to change their ways (2 Samuel 13:19, Esther 4:1,3; Job 42:6, Jeremiah 6:26). The usage of ashes in our Catholic tradition links us to our Old Testament roots.

Attending Mass or a prayer service on Ash Wednesday to get ashes on our forehead to "show off" to our co-workers, family members, or people on the street that we are Christian is not the spirituality of this day. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of our Lenten journey of ongoing conversion and repentance. It is a way for us as individuals to realize we are sinners, we are mortal, and we are dust. But with God, through our baptism and profession in Jesus Christ, we are redeemed and set free from sin and death. The use of ashes is a reminder to us in a very tangible way that we cannot do life alone. There is always a need for renewal and repentance, and by



journeying in the desert with Jesus for 40 days, we can focus on renewing our spiritual lives.

The three pillars of Lent are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Through prayer, we renew our relationship with God. We recognize how we need to become more dependent on God, his love, and his mercy. By fasting, we try to detach ourselves from worldly allurements and desires. We give things up during Lent to turn our attention to God, who fulfills our desires. By almsgiving, we seek to help those who cannot help themselves, restore the common humanity we all share, and strive to be agents of solidarity and accompaniment. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving should redirect our hearts and our minds towards God, assisting us in this sacred time to change our ways. And above all, help us to remember that we are dust and we shall return to dust, also reminding us to repent, and believe in the Gospel.

The Cathedral will offer Rice Bowls to provide a practical way of giving alms during Lent. The proceeds of our almsgiving will benefit Catholic Relief Services, the official relief and development agency of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. The money raised through Rice Bowls helps communities in over 100 countries alleviate poverty. We will collect the rice bowls during Holy Week.

As we enter this sacred season, may we be renewed in our hearts and minds that through the cross traced on our foreheads in ashes, we are saved, made free through the sacrifice of Christ, and promised eternal life through our baptism.

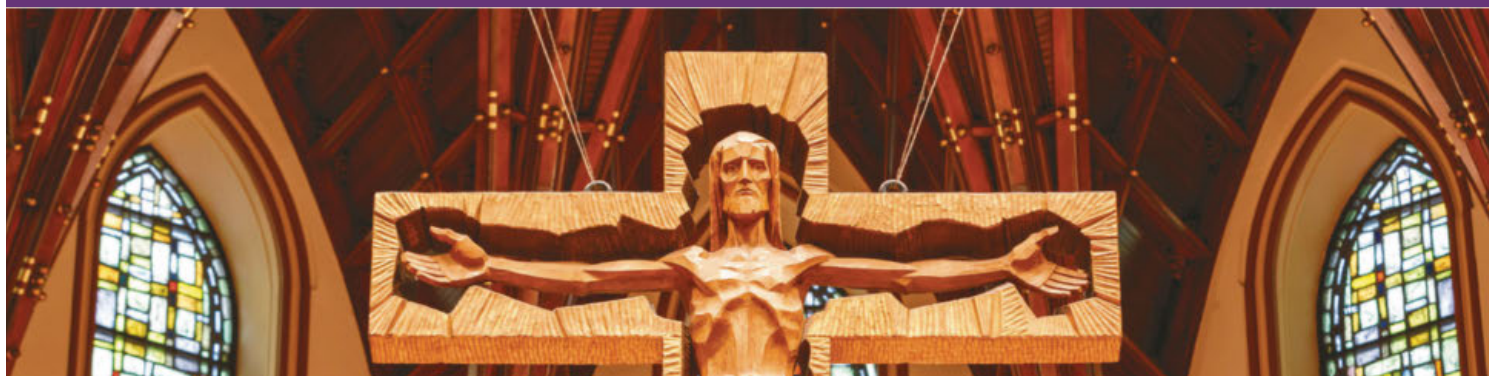

Make Good Choices During Your Upcoming Lenten Journey

I spent thirty minutes praying with the iBreviary, a free app many people use to pray with the Psalms daily. Afterward, I checked on my family on Facebook and noticed my friends posting exciting stories. Suddenly, a half hour passed. You might think, “Father, you forgot the Exodus 90 discipline: Not spending time on social media.” Yes, I know. We can learn two things from this experience.



The Freedom of the Will

God gives us the gift of free will, which is necessary to do good within reason. However, freedom is more than the possibility of making any choice. This type of thinking would be false freedom.

True freedom means possessing the power to desire what is good and having the ability to pursue the good. Freedom involves choice, of course, but it is only true freedom when the choice is made for good. This view is Augustine’s understanding of free will. Exodus 90 or

Lenten exercises will help us to strengthen our will to make good choices.

Patience

One daily reflection in Exodus gives two practical aspects of patience. “As joy and peace are the fruit of love, the first aspect of patience is hope. We need the patience to run the race of life. Do we find ourselves angered or depressed by the evil in the world? Are we discouraged by our failures or being stuck in a life or work situation that isn’t working well? We need patience.

Another aspect of patience is our attitude in daily life. A man with three young children shared, “Before I was married, I thought I was a patient person.” Instead of saying, “Now my children are driving me crazy,” he knew better. He realized the cause of his impatience was within himself. His children only provided occasions for bringing it out.

Patience is a combination of humility and charity. When things don’t go as planned, we need to “forbear in love,” be patient with others, and remember that others need to put up with us as much as we need to put up with them.” Make good choices, be patient, and have a blessed Lenten

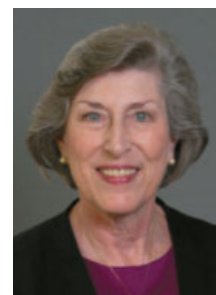

Help Blessings in a Backpack Fight Childhood Hunger

Many children will benefit from the National School Lunch Program on weekdays. But when the weekend comes around, these same children are faced with food insecurity, not knowing where their next meal will come from until the following Monday. Our Blessings in a Backpack program is one way to mitigate this problem by providing food for the weekend. We are serving the students of St Thomas of Canterbury School in Edgewater. We are especially looking for volunteers to drive, pack bags and help with raising money to keep the program funded. Some of the needs include:

Fundraising

Do you know groups willing to donate? We are looking for corporate donors who would be interested in helping feed the kids. We will be developing these potential donors and other strategies to raise funds for our program. We welcome volunteers to brainstorm ideas and build plans for fundraising.

Delivery Drivers

We need a team of volunteers — especially those with access to a van or SUV — so that this is not a burden to any one individual to deliver to St Thomas of Canterbury school (5525 N Magnolia Ave.). We can deliver Thursday or Friday during school hours.

Packing Weekly Bags

This involves packing the food sacks with the inventory



of items that have been selected for the week. Our food items are typically delivered to the Cathedral mid-week, so we typically pack on Thursday mornings in the Rectory. It usually takes about 90 minutes with a team packing 200 bags.

Backpack Additions

We welcome new ideas to add seasonal items or creative arts to add surprise elements to the children's bags. There are many ways to get involved in this worthy program. Perhaps come to one of our weekly packing sessions to meet other members of the ministry team. Just scan the QR code and our program coordinator will be in touch with you.

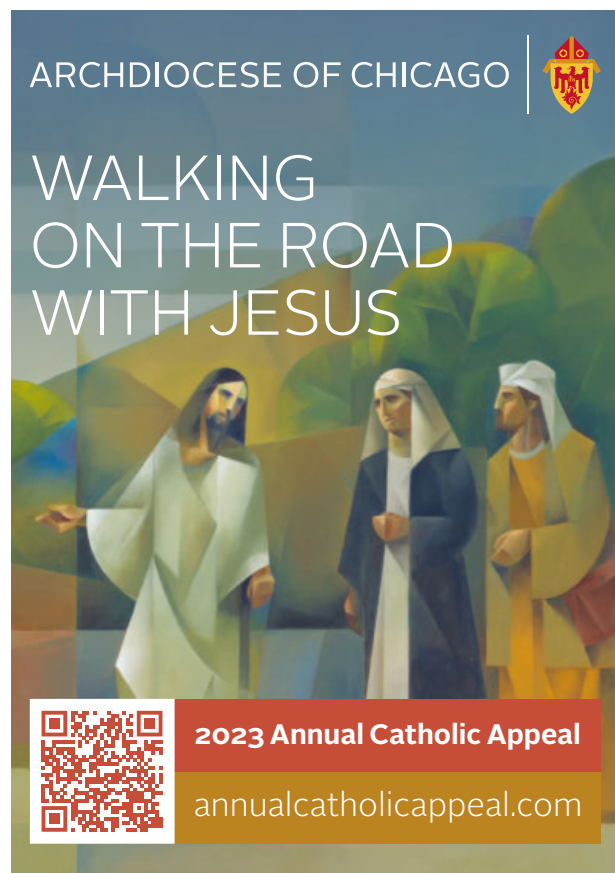
2023 Annual Catholic Appeal: Walking on the Road with Jesus
