

Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

Our Lenten journey has begun, and I have spent time each morning in reflective prayer. The early morning is quiet, and I am making the extra time to pray every day this Lenten season. I share with you several short pieces that have touched my heart. May the

Lord Jesus touch your heart as we continue our Lenten journey. Go to the Lord Jesus just as you are -- and let the Spirit of God transform, change and surprise you in ways you never expected!

Your goal is not to live long; it's to live.

Jesus says the options are clear. On one side, there is the voice of safety. You can build a fire in the hearth, stay inside, and stay warm, dry, and safe...

Or you can hear the voice of adventure -- God's adventure. Instead of building a fire in your hearth, build a fire in your heart. Follow God's impulses. Adopt the child. Move overseas. Teach the class. Change careers. Run for office. Make a difference. Sure, it isn't safe, but what is?

And the late Bishop Kenneth Untener wrote this in the "Little Black Lenten Book" ...

"Sometimes we think of the sacrifices of Lent. The word sacrifice means to "make holy." It's a gift that we give to God as we take away anything that stands between us.

When we bring things to the altar -- we call them sacrifices. It is a gift to God, and it's the best gift we could ever give to ourselves because it makes us holy, closer to God. It eliminates something between us and God."

And our Lenten season can also be a time of added stress - too much to do and not enough time to accomplish all these "important" tasks. The following story may put stress and our Season of Lent into a better perspective.

A lecturer, when explaining stress management to an audience, raised a glass of water and asked, "How heavy is this glass of water?" Answers called

out ranged from 20g to 500g. The lecturer replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long you try to hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance. In each case, it's the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes." He continued, "And that's the way it is with stress management. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry on.

"As with the glass of water, you have to put it down for a while and rest before holding it again. When we're refreshed, we can carry on with the burden. So, before you return home tonight, put the burden of work down. Don't carry it home. You can pick it up tomorrow. Whatever burdens you're carrying now, let them down for a moment if you can. Relax; pick them up later after you've rested. Life is short. Enjoy it! Hand your problems over to the Lord!"

Lent is a time of repentance and change. It is also a time to let go of life's burdens and stress and invite the Lord Jesus to carry the load. It is never too late to change, but we have to know what to look for with the help and grace of God.

As I have said many times: You can never go back and start a new beginning, but starting today, you can make a new ending with the help and grace of God.

In Scripture, the desert is a place of testing and isolation: there Jesus encounters the devil. Like all temptations. this one appeals to Jesus' self-identity. The



devil begins with "if you are..." (Matthew 4: 3, 6). He's inviting Jesus to flaunt his identity and mission, perhaps even challenging it genuineness. On this first Sunday of Lent, we hear stories about temptation and sin: Eve in the Garden and Jesus in the desert. Yet rarely do we experience sin in such dramatic and straightforward ways. Often our sins are difficult to recognize and harder to acknowledge. What could help us learn how sin is working in our life?

We are reminded that is is "not bread alone" that feeds us (Matthew 4:4). We are called to a deeper reality — a union and communion with the Word made flesh whose love for us so great that he suffered and died so that could live.



Come to the Parish Mission and Deepen Your Prayer Life

parish mission, usually offered in Advent or Lent but anytime throughout the year, is an opportunity for the faithful to gather, away from Sunday Mass, to be renewed in their spiritual life. The Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, and gathering every Sunday as a family of



faith is our primary call as a Church. But we set aside time for a mission, as Jesus took time aside to pray, to focus on our spiritual life. Attending Mass every Sunday is a commandment, a precept of the Church. Attending a parish mission is entirely voluntary.

So why consider attending our parish mission in the Cathedral next Monday, March 6, through Wednesday, March 8, at 7pm? Our Mission Speaker is Fr. Tom McCarthy, OSA. Fr. McCarthy is known throughout the country as a vibrant speaker, gifted retreat master, and experienced teacher with a profoundly pastoral heart. During the extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy in 2015, Pope Francis named missionaries of mercy throughout the world, priests who are given the faculties to forgive certain sins typically only forgiven by the Holy See. They also to promote the Sacrament of Reconciliation in their ministry. Fr. McCarthy is a missionary of mercy, sent into the world to share God's mercy with those he ministers to.

Fr. McCarthy grew up on the south side of Chicago, attending St. Adrian Parish in Marquette Park. He made his solemn vows in the Augustinian Order (Order of St. Augustine) in 1993 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1994. Fr. McCarthy has served at St. Rita High School on 77th and Western and Villanova University in Philadelphia. He served on the Pontifical Council for the Promotion of the New Evangelization in Rome, Marylake Shrine in Ontario, and as Vocations Director for the Midwest Augustinian Province.

On a personal note, Fr. McCarthy preached at the first Mass I celebrated as a priest in May 2021. There is a

tradition among newly ordained to ask a priest you look up to, who has guided you to ordination, which you have learned from, to preach at your first Mass. Practically, this tradition is because celebrating your first Mass has many moving parts, and having someone else preach takes some pressure off. More profoundly, a new priest cannot preach about the reality of priesthood connected to the day's scriptures because he just became a priest. My first Mass was on Ascension Sunday, 2021. Fr. McCarthy preached about the joy of priesthood, knowing that Jesus remains with us in the priest and the people of God we minister to.

Please come and attend one or all three nights of our parish mission. Fr. McCarthy will preach at all Masses next weekend to promote the mission. If you are looking for something new to do during Lent, if you are looking to break up your routine, if you are looking to deepen your prayer life, please come to the mission.

How is this story connected with Jesus going into the desert to be tempted by the devil for forty days?

- 1. Lenten Practices: As we are in the Lenten Season, take advantage of the opportunity to form good habits or to get off some attachments. It might seem challenging to start, but it will be worth it! Your spiritual life will surely get healthier with God's grace and your cooperation.
- 2. Overachiever: At times, we have so much excitement to deepen our love for the Lord that we want to do everything at once. Well, don't overdo it! Pay attention to the Lord's invitation for appropriate practices. St. Benedict says, "Listen carefully, my child, to your master's precepts, and incline the ear of your heart. Receive your loving father's advice willingly and carry it out effectively, so you may return to Him by the labor of obedience."
- **3. Persevere:** If you are experiencing achiness with Lenten practices, remain committed to your goals. St. Vincent de Paul says, "Perfection consists in a constant perseverance to acquire the virtues and become proficient in their practice, because on God's road, not to advance is to fall back since man never remains in the same condition." Clothing & Food Drive Saturday & Sunday, March 4 & 5

As we shared a few weeks ago, we have new neighbors currently staying at the former Tremont Hotel. These asylum seekers have arrived with virtually nothing. But you can help! We are holding a clothing and food drive to restock the Clothing Closet and Food Pantry at Fourth Presbyterian Church. Due to their proximity, their services have been in great demand. This food and clothing drive is just one of the programs we are working on with Fourth Presbyterian to assist our new neighbors.

Take a look in your closet and see how you can help these men and women finish out the winter and early spring. We do not need any children's clothing at this time. The only current clothing need is for men's and women's winter coats and any type of winter boots. Please donate only clean new or "gently used" clothing. We have no process to clean donated clothing.

Food items should be only cans and packages that are shelf stable, meaning non-refrigerated, pantry style items. Please do not donate expired food as we are required to throw it out.

Also, toiletries are needed: deodorant, shampoo, razors, toothbrushes, toothpaste, lotion, soap and body wash,

Cars will be parked on State Street on March 4 & 5 to collect items so you can drop off your donations before entering the Cathedral. You can also bring them to the Soup Dinner in the Parish Center Cafeteria on March 6, 7, and 8 before our Parish Mission.

Help Restore the Church, and Build the Future

Collection for Central and Eastern Europe This Weekend at All Masses

In late February 2022, Russian forces invaded Ukraine in a nationwide assault involving ground forces, armored vehicles, warships, and airstrikes. The need for humanitarian aid and pastoral support for the Ukrainian people was great and immediate.

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Subcommittee on Aid to the Church in Central and Eastern Europe was poised to provide immediate aid to Ukraine thanks to well-established, decades-long relationships with Catholic organizations in the region. Through the generosity of parishioners to the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe, nearly 50 emergency aid grants, totaling more than half a million dollars, brought help to victims and refugees in Ukraine, Poland and Slovakia.

Your support for the collection is crucial to helping the Church fulfill its mission to minister to people's spiritual and material needs in Ukraine and more than 25 other countries throughout Central and Eastern Europe, especially in times of serious hardship.

Our Stewardship Journey Toward Easter

As we begin the beautiful and challenging season of Lent, our readings this week remind us why we need these 40 days so much. They also suggest a particular



strategy we Christian stewards might take as we make the journey toward Easter.

Our first reading takes us all the way back to Genesis, reminding us of our Creator and the loving care and lavish gifts He gave to our ancestors, Adam and Eve. He created them out of pure love and provided abundantly for them.

Life was good in the Garden! Until the first couple allowed just a sliver of doubt in the goodness of God to enter their minds.

Swayed by the words of the serpent, they became ungrateful and distrustful despite God's great love for them and all the gifts of creation He had provided. Sound familiar? These are the same temptations that threaten to pull us away from God today.

Our Gospel passage from Matthew shows us by the example of Jesus Himself one way that we can attain spiritual strength and grow to become more effective disciples and stewards. In this passage, we find our Lord in the desert, fasting for 40 days and 40 nights. Like Adam and Eve, He is confronted by the evil one. But unlike our fallen parents, our Lord triumphs definitively over the devil's lies and sends him slithering away.

How did He do it? By knowing the Scriptures and by proclaiming them confidently. And by His perfect trust in the Father.

This Lent, let us embrace this 40-day spiritual reset. Let us prioritize our use of time by committing to prayerful study of the Scriptures and trusting more deeply in the Father's love. We will surely be better stewards by Easter.
