Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Lent is a beautiful opportunity to let God touch and work through us. How? All is a gift! Give it away! Give it away! One experiences true joy when one realizes all is God's gift and makes their life a gift to others. The following story expresses it best ...

Babs Miller was bagging some early potatoes for me. I noticed a small boy, delicate of bone and feature, ragged but clean, hungrily appraising a basket filled with freshly picked green peas.

I paid for my potatoes, but the fresh green peas also drew me in. I am a pushover for creamed peas and new potatoes. Pondering the peas, I couldn't help overhearing the conversation between Mr. Miller and the ragged boy beside me.

"Hello Barry, how are you today?" "Hi, Mr. Miller. Fine, thank you. Those peas look great." "They are good, Barry. How's your Ma?" "Fine." "Good. Anything I can help you with?" "No, Sir. Just admiring the peas." "Would you like to take some home?" "No, Sir. I have no money." "Well, what have you to trade me for some of those peas?"

"All I have is my prize marble," said Barry. "Is that right? Let me see it."

"She's a dandy." "I can see that. Hmmmmm, the thing is, this one is blue, and I sort of go for red.

Do you have a red one like this at home?" "No, sir, but almost." "Tell you what. Take this sack of peas home with you, and next trip this way, let me look at that red marble." "Sure will. Thanks, Mr. Miller."

Mrs. Miller, standing nearby, came over to help me. With a smile, she said, "There are two other boys like him in our community; all three are in very poor circumstances. Jim loves to bargain with them for peas, apples, tomatoes, or whatever. When they come back with their red marbles, and they always do, he decides he doesn't like red after all, and he sends them home with a bag of produce for a green marble or an orange one, perhaps."

I left the stand smiling to myself, impressed with this man. I moved to Colorado a short time later but never forgot the

story of this man, the boys, and their bartering. Several years went by, each more rapid than the previous one. I recently visited some friends in that old Idaho community and learned that Mr. Miller had died. They were having his viewing that evening, and knowing my friends wanted to go, I agreed to accompany them. Upon arrival at the mortuary, we fell into line to meet the deceased's relatives and offer whatever words of comfort we could.

Ahead of us in line were three young men. One was in an army uniform, and the other two wore nice haircuts, dark suits and white shirts, all very professional looking. They approached Mrs. Miller, standing composed and smiling by her husband's casket. Each young man hugged her, kissed her on the cheek, spoke briefly, and moved on to the casket.

Her misty light blue eyes followed them as each young man stopped briefly one by one and placed his warm hand over the cold, pale hand in the casket. Each left the mortuary awkwardly, wiping his eyes.

Our turn came to meet Mrs. Miller. I told her who I was and mentioned the story she had told me about the marbles. With her eyes glistening, she took my hand and led me to the casket.

"Those three young men who just left were the boys I told you about. They just told me how they appreciated the things Jim 'traded' them. Now, at last, when Jim could not change his mind about color or size ... they came to pay their debt. We never had a great deal of the wealth of this world," she confided, "but right now, Jim would consider himself the richest man in Idaho."

With loving gentleness, she lifted the lifeless fingers of her deceased husband. Resting underneath were three exquisitely shined red marbles.

Lent is not what I do but what I allow the Lord Jesus to do through me. Take the ride!

Today and for the next two Sundays, we will meet three fascinating Gospel characters: the Samaritan woman, the man born blind, and Lazarus. They will show us – those already baptized and those preparing for baptism at the Easter vigil (the elect) – how Jesus is constantly transforming us. All the Scriptures on these days present images of baptism and conversion.



The woman at the well did not know Jesus. She was not part of his people or his faith, and she was certainly not looking for anything remarkable to happen at the well that day. And yet she was the first to ask whether he could be the messiah. How often are we open to the unexpected gift of life-changing opportunity before us, even when it comes at an inconvenient moment when we think we have other priorities? Are we able to be open to the revelation of God's mystery in our day-to-day world?

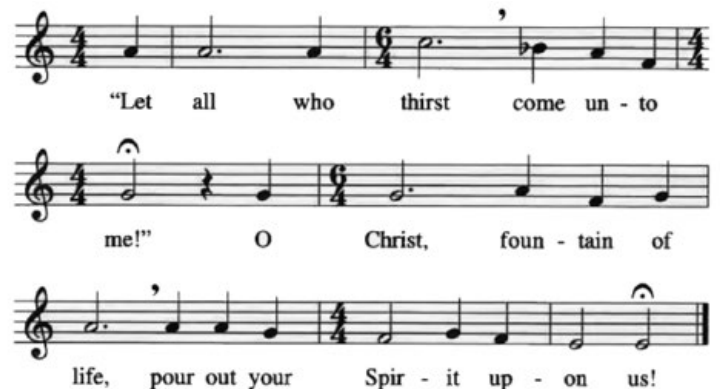

St. Patrick's Day is on Lenten Friday — Can You Eat Meat?

As a descendant of Irish Immigrants (my last name is Croatian, but my mom's side is from County Mayo, Ireland) and growing up in a predominantly Irish-Catholic city, March 17 is a day I look forward to each year. My mom makes corned beef and cabbage, I make Irish soda bread, and my brothers, who initially drank Green River soda, now drink Guinness, and we celebrate St. Patrick and the contribution of Irish culture in our life. But, for those of you who look ahead like I do, you know March 17 falls on a Friday this year, and we are in the season of Lent, which begs the question: can I have meat on St. Patrick's Day this year?



The Lenten observance of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent is a spiritual practice and part of Canon Law (1250-51). Friday marks the day our Lord suffered and died on the Cross. To refrain from meat is a way to reflect on the sacrifice that our society which, for most of us, eats meat as part of our everyday diet, makes us reflect on Christ's sacrifice. One would need a dispensation from the bishop to be allowed to eat meat on any Friday during Lent without having the Irish Catholic guilt weigh heavily on one's conscience (the tiny voice of God in your head).

For those who can remember, every bishop in the United States gave a dispensation from the faithful to attend Sunday Mass during the COVID-19 lockdown. The dispensation in Chicago was lifted on the First Sunday of Advent, Nov. 27, 2022. A dispensation must be given to eat meat on St. Patrick's Day. According to Church law, only the diocesan bishop can give dispensation from meat on Fridays in Lent (Canon 87).

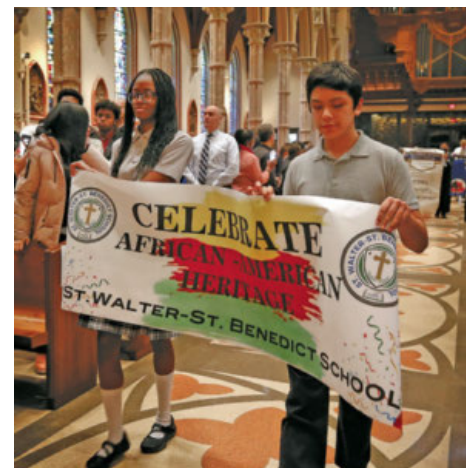
The position of the Archdiocese regarding the dispensation from meat on this year's St. Patrick's Day is as follows: "The Archdiocese of Chicago is not granting a general dispensation for the Memorial of St. Patrick from the obligation to abstain from meat on Fridays in Lent. Instead, Catholics who find themselves at an event where meat is served in celebrating St. Patrick may, in good conscience, substitute the general rule of abstinence with another form of penance or a significant act of charity that benefits the poor. Regardless, it is important to take seriously the obligation to observe Fridays in Lent as a way of uniting ourselves to Jesus who died on Good Friday. That should not be undervalued as we reflect on his sacrifice on the Cross for the salvation of the world in this holy season."

Meatless Fridays, particularly during Lent, are a cornerstone of our tradition during this holy season. Let us use this opportunity of St. Patrick's Day falling on a Friday during Lent to focus on the life of St. Patrick, who spread the Gospel to Ireland through his actions, and celebrate his life and the call we all share through our baptism to holiness.

RCIA Cohorts Move Closer to Full Initiation

On Feb. 26, 21 adults participated in the Rite of Sending from the Holy Name community, and joined child catechumens, for the Rite of Election. They joined hundreds of others from the archdiocese. The catechumens, referred now as the Elect, will experience the Rites of Scrutiny for the next three Sundays. The candidates join them for the final spiritual purging of the obstacles that may hinder their personal desire to become full members of the Catholic Church, Easter Vigil, 2023. With a few chairs, a rocky-shaped table, different plants, flowers, and a little artificial river running around the Blessed Mother statue, I was astonished by the serene garden before me, “You have a peaceful prayer corner at home,” I commented. To which the parishioner responded, “Thanks Father. It helps me to stay focused on my ultimate goal in life. I come here every morning to pray and, you know what? I am so blessed that the Lord has blessed us with the gift of knowing Him. I don’t have to wonder who created me or who I should give thanks to and worship. I love the Lord dearly...” and our conversation continued.

We all see similarities to that parishioner’s home, like a religious statue, plants, waters, etc., and some uncommon ones, such as the serene garden he designed. This spiritual garden helps the spirit to soar beyond the familiar towards Transcendence. We realize that God’s grace does stimulate the leap toward the Infinite. He activates our mind, heart, and will to leap beyond itself to taste supernatural things.

It reminds me of an analogy of an unknown author, “When God wanted to create, he spoke to the sea. When God wanted to create trees, He spoke to earth. 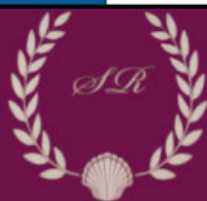

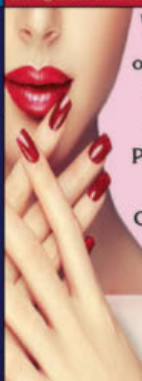

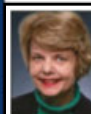
