Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Our Lenten journey continues, and we are two weeks away from the start of Holy Week!

As our season of Lent moves into the last couple of weeks, taking an inventory of our Lenten journey is essential. Lent is both a time of giving up and an opportunity for giving. At the same time, we can place a positive spin on this Holy Season and filter life through a different lens — through the eyes of Christ. I share the following story as an opportunity to view Lent through the lens of Jesus.

How to Dance in the Rain

It was a busy morning, about 8:30am, when an elderly gentleman in his 80s arrived to have stitches removed from his thumb. He said he was in a hurry as he had an appointment at 9am. I took his vital signs and had him sit, knowing it would be more than an hour before someone could see him. I saw him looking at his watch and decided since I was not busy with another patient, I would evaluate his wound. On exam, it was well healed, so I talked to one of the doctors and got the needed supplies to remove his sutures and redress his wound.

While caring for his wound, I asked him if he had another doctor's appointment this morning, as he was in a hurry. The gentleman said no, that he needed to go to the nursing home to eat breakfast with his wife. I inquired as to her health. He told me that she had been there awhile and that she had Alzheimer's disease. As we talked, I asked if she would be upset if he were a bit late. He replied that she no

longer knew who he was, that she had not recognized him in five years now. I was surprised and asked him, "And you still go every morning, even though she doesn't know who you are?" He smiled as he patted my hand and said, "She doesn't know me, but I still know who she is."

"I had to hold back tears as he left. I had goosebumps on my arm and thought, "That is the kind of love I want in my life."

True love is neither physical nor romantic. True love is an acceptance of all that is, has been, will be and will not be. The happiest people don't necessarily have the best of everything; they just make the best of everything they have.

"Life isn't about how to survive the storm, but how to dance in the rain."

Lent isn't about how to survive the season but how to dance to Easter joy. At the same time, Spring Training for baseball has begun! The great manager Leo Durocher was asked who his favorite player he had coached was.

Many people were shocked when he named Dusty Rhodes, a little-known pinch hitter, not a big-name player. Durocher was asked, "What was so special about Dusty Rhodes?" He replied, "In a tight game, when I looked down the bench for a pinch hitter, some players would avert their gaze and refuse to look in my direction. But Dusty Rhodes would look me right in the eye, smile and tap on his bat." He was always available.

Am I making myself available this Lent to let the Lord Jesus transform and touch my life? Get in the game. Stay in the game called life and let the Lord Jesus surprise us in ways this Lenten journey we never imagined.

We rejoice in the salvation the Lord is giving us as we continue entering the discipline of Lent. Today is Laetare Sunday, meaning “rejoice”



Just as in last Sunday's Gospel when Jesus relieved the woman's thirst, today he gives the man born blind his sight – and the light of faith. In these stories (next week as well), God works through Jesus to transform the human condition, bringing healing for body and spirit. There are many types of blindness. We are blind to the gifts in our own lives; blind to the hurt we unintentionally cause others, and blind to the injustices all around us.

We see in today's Gospel reading that vision can come with a price: the man born blind is expelled from the synagogue because he speaks, without fear, the truth he knows in his heart: Jesus has healed his eyes, and only through God could this have come to be.

Let Us Rejoice These Two Lenten Solemnities This Week

Liturgically marking the Lenten season is the absence of the Alleluia and the Gloria. Though we only sing the Gloria on Sundays outside of Lent and Advent, major Feast Days and Solemnities of the Church, it is essential to note that within the Lenten season, there are almost always two Solemnities that we celebrate, which wake us up from our Lenten routines and allow us to rejoice with the saints. A solemnity is the highest-ranking liturgical celebration because it is a foundational event in the life of the Church. Examples include the Solemnity of the Resurrection of the Lord, the Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord, and the Solemnity of All Saints.

Every Sunday, even in Lent, is a solemnity because every Sunday is a mini-Easter. And since solemnities are the highest-ranking celebrations in the Church, no matter what day, the Mass marks the occasion with the Gloria and the Creed. These two pillars of the liturgy remind us of God's goodness, a song of praise (Gloria) that connects us through time and space with those who have gone before us (Creed). Even during Lent, when we celebrate a Solemnity (except on Sunday, then it is transferred to the following Monday), we recite the Gloria and the Creed, calling us to greater rejoicing.

March 19 is the Solemnity of St. Joseph, spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Although celebrated since the 10th century, it wasn't until 1570 that Pope Pius V formally included it in the General Calendar. With various other



changes, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, spouse of the BVM and patron of the Universal Church, was solidified in the calendar for March 19, 1955. On this day, we remember St. Joseph, who raised Jesus at their home in Nazareth with the Blessed Virgin Mary, who truly taught Jesus how to be the man he is. In this home, Jesus learned to worship, listen, and lead, all by the example of Joseph and Mary. And even though Joseph has no recorded words in Scripture, he is one of the greatest saints of our tradition.

March 25 is the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord. On this day, the Church celebrates Mary's 'Yes' to the Angel Gabriel, who God sent to reveal His plan of salvation. Nine months later, Jesus will be born in a cave in Bethlehem and placed in a manger. We celebrate Mary's 'Yes' and recall how when uncertainty and fear cloud our lives, we have a guide in Mary. We then see through her 'Yes' that salvation has come, that the moment she gave her fiat, the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we always rejoice to have hope, knowing that Jesus fully understands our humanity. And in Mary, we have a guide through moments of fear and doubt.

Our Lenten journey brings us to these holy days to call us out of reflecting on our sinfulness and focus our reflections on God's power and love. At first, Joseph and Mary did not fully understand what was asked of them in their lives, but by remaining close to God, all things become revealed, and God's power becomes magnified through his servants. As we celebrate St. Joseph and the Annunciation this week, may we follow Joseph's example of leading through example, and replicate Mary's Yes in our life, to bring about the kingdom of God.

Where is Fr. Ton? I am visiting my family in Vietnam after four years. Since I cannot bilocate like Padre Pio, you will not see me for a while. Know that you are in my prayers!



You might have heard me speaking about attending Mass at 4:30am as I get up early to celebrate or concelebrate daily Mass at my village in Vietnam. It is too early! Yet, the Eucharist and the community always bring me joy after struggling to get up early. People here go to Mass daily as if every day is Sunday. If you ask them, “Why do you go to Mass so often?” you might hear them reply, “It is a habit, and I wouldn’t feel normal to start the day without the Eucharist.” Or they might say, “My parents ask me to attend Mass,” or “Going to Mass is the most important thing I can do on earth!” Wow! I know. As we prioritize our life priorities, I remember a survey asking, “What were the main regrets people had as they were dying?” Here are a few:

- To have lived a happier life according to my dreams, not others.
- To not work too hard saving it all for retirement. To have enjoyed life more when I was younger as well.
- To have stayed in touch with family and friends more often.
- To have a firm conviction that I am loved and special in God’s eyes. Not to have too much wishful thinking but be pleased with what I have, including my strengths and weaknesses.
- To be more forgiving, have less expectations towards myself and others, and live holy the present moment.

Going to Mass is the most important thing I can do on earth! Yes, it is indeed. In Mass, we fulfill our hopes and dreams. Together with the choir of angels and saints, we praise God and receive the food of eternal life. Inaugural awards presented

We will present the Inaugural Heart of Holy Name Award and Mother Cabrini Legacy Award during the evening.

The Heart of Holy Name Award honors an individual who exemplifies the spirit of our faith community as he or she lives out the parish vision: “A World in Communion with Jesus Christ.” This year’s awardee is Deacon Stan Strom, a man of faith, a leader and a friend to many. The Mother Cabrini Legacy Award honors an organization that embodies the legacy of Mother Cabrini and her extraordinary service to those in need including the immigrant and underserved. This year’s awardee is Bethany House of Hospitality, a safe haven for young immigrant women seeking asylum offering them housing and support services as they journey to independence.

An Asylum Seekers Ministry Update & Papal Inspiration

As we finish delivering the Asylum Seekers Care Packages and Clothing, we have learned a lot ... and know we have even more to learn. In listening to the feedback from the recipients of our recent work, there are multiple other ways we can serve this community, especially since a second hotel has opened in Streeterville with approximately 300 additional new residents, nearly doubling the number in our neighborhood.

We invite you to read these excerpts from Pope Francis's Lenten message, for inspiration on ways you can help us to further develop our Asylum Seekers Ministry.

“Lenten penance is a commitment, sustained by grace, to overcoming our lack of faith and our resistance to following Jesus on the way of the cross...We need to set out on the journey, an uphill path that, like a mountain trek, requires effort, sacrifice and concentration....

The first path has to do with the command that God the Father addresses to the disciples on Mount Tabor as they contemplate Jesus transfigured. The voice from the cloud says: “Listen to him” (Mt 17:5). The first proposal, then, is very clear: we need to listen to Jesus. Lent is a time of grace to the extent that we listen to him as he speaks to us. ...

What's Next? A Spring Meal Program

Based on the needs' feedback, we would like to add a hot meal program for residents of the Tremont Hotel on Chestnut and the Inn of Chicago on Ohio Street and St. Clair. Fourth Presbyterian has generously offered their commercial kitchen for us to prepare and serve the meals. We are organizing a team to oversee the meals –culturally appropriate menu development, food & beverage ordering, cooking, serving, and volunteer coordinator. If you have interest in participating in any

part of the program, please scan the QR code to sign up (select Asylum Seekers). Our coordinators will be in touch on next steps. Thank you for your generosity!

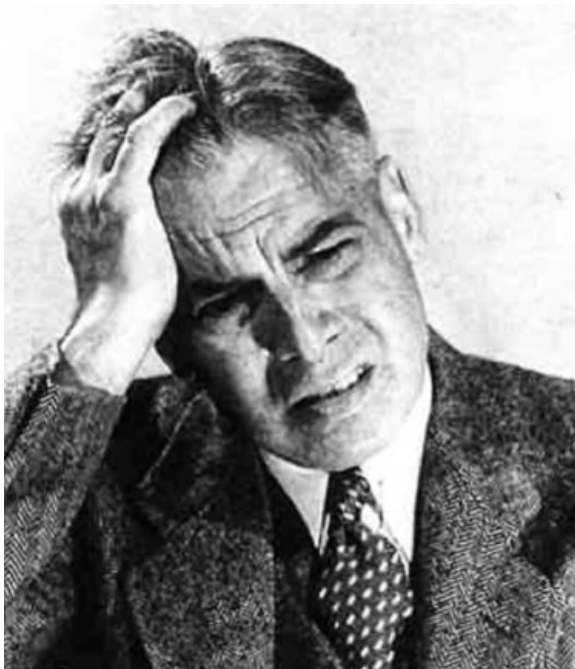


Thank you for your support!

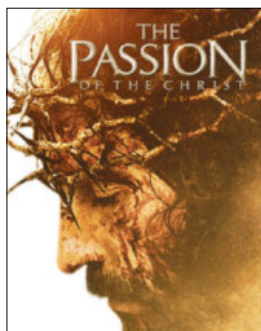

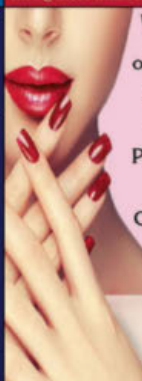
