Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God:

Our Season of Lent is rapidly coming to a close. Next Sunday, we begin Holy Week. We always

speak of Lent in terms of fasting. Lent should be more than a time of fasting. It should also be a joyous season of feasting. Lent is a time to fast from certain things and to feast on others. The Notre Dame Center for Pastoral Liturgy wrote the following beautiful reflection in their January 1993 journal - Assembly. Read and reflect. Pray and ponder. Share with family and friends.

Fasting and Feasting

FAST from judging others. FAST from emphasis on differences. FAST from apparent darkness. FAST from thoughts of illness. FAST from words that pollute. FAST from discontent. FAST from anger. FAST from pessimism. FAST from worry. FAST from complaining. FAST from negatives. FAST from unrelenting pressures. FAST from hostility. FAST from bitterness. FAST from self-concern. FAST from personal anxiety. FAST from discouragement. FAST from facts that depress. FAST from lethargy. FAST from suspicion. FAST from thoughts that weaken.

FAST from shadows of sorrow. FAST from idle gossip.

FEAST on the Christ within them. FEAST on the unity of life. FEAST on the reality of lights. FEAST on the healing power of God. FEAST on phrases that purify. FEAST on gratitude. FEAST on patience. FEAST on optimism. FEAST on divine order. Trust in God. FEAST on appreciation. FEAST on affirmatives. FEAST on unceasing prayer. FEAST on nonresistance. FEAST on forgiveness. FEAST on compassion for others. FEAST on eternal Truth. FEAST on hope. FEAST on verities that uplift. FEAST on enthusiasm. FEAST on Truth. FEAST on promises that inspire. FEAST on the sunlight of serenity. FEAST on purposeful silence.

At the same time, Lent is a time of feasting in terms of sharing. Keep reading...

The old man placed an order for one hamburger, french fries and a drink. He unwrapped the plain hamburger and carefully cut it in half, placing one half in front of his wife. He then carefully counted out the french fries, dividing them into two piles and neatly placing one pile in front of his wife. Again, the young man came over and begged them to let him buy another meal for them. This time the old woman said. "No, thank you, we are used to sharing everything."

Finally, as the old man finished and was wiping his face neatly with the napkin, the young man again came over to the little old lady who had yet to eat a single bite of food and asked. "What is it you are waiting for?" She answered, "His teeth."

Sharing is great, but I do suggest keeping your own teeth!

It's Time for Passiontide, the Final Movement of Lent

ith the fifth Sunday of Lent, we enter into Passiontide, the final movement of our Lenten journey. The readings in our daily Masses focus on the immediate coming of the passion of the Lord and the darkness that surrounds those events of God dying in the flesh. These two weeks prepare us for the sorrow



we will experience and feel at the passion and death of Jesus. It has been a common practice in the Catholic Church from about the year 900 to veil crosses, statues, and images with a purple cloth as a psychological reminder to help the faithful concentrate more on the salvific events which will soon take place.

The Preface before the Eucharistic Prayer changes, along with the daily Gospels and the option of veiling crosses, images, and statues. Preface I of the Passion of the Lord is said Monday through Saturday of the fifth week of Lent. Preface II of the Passion of the Lord is said Monday through Wednesday of Holy Week. Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Holy Saturday (Easter Vigil) each has a proper Preface for the day. Preface I of the Passion focuses on the power of the cross, while Preface II focuses on the victory of Christ's passion. Aside, there are over 30 different Prefaces in the Roman Missal for particular seasons and days. After the Second Vatican Council, the practice of veiling statues, images, and crosses was generally discontinued. However, each national Episcopal Conference has the right to allow the veiling of statues, images, and crosses in churches. Here in the United States, each pastor has the right to restore the practice of veiling crosses, images, and statues beginning with the fifth Sunday of Lent, with crosses remaining covered until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday. Statues and images remain hidden until the beginning of the Easter Vigil.

Regardless of your preference for veiling statues, images, and crosses, Passiontide invites us to deepen our awareness of the events that will soon unfold in our liturgies and spiritual lives through the Gospel readings and Prefaces. Jesus of Nazareth, God in the flesh, will soon enter Jerusalem amid shouts of exultation saying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord," only to have those same people shout, "Crucify him!" a few days later. Passiontide is a gift from the Church to prepare us for the Holy Triduum, the Paschal Mystery of Jesus: his passion, death, resurrection, and ascension. Are we ready to walk with our Lord?

All are welcome to join us next Sunday, April 2, at 3pm for Stations of the Cross and an hour of Eucharistic Adoration to prepare our hearts and minds for Holy Week and the saving acts that will take place. Now is a very acceptable time; now is the day of salvation.

Inaugural awards presented

Service

Asylum Seekers Spring Meals Program

As we have shared in past articles, we currently have nearly 700 new neighbors residing in two local hotels. In addition to the clothing/food drive and care packages, we know there is a strong need to provide a meals program to supplement their current offerings. This program would also alleviate the pressure on other existing programs that currently serve other local people in need like our Thursday/Friday Suppers Ministry.

Our plan is to add a hot meal program for residents of the Selina Hotel (formerly the Tremont Hotel) on Chestnut and the Inn of Chicago on Ohio Street. Fourth Presbyterian has generously offered their commercial kitchen for us to prepare and serve the meals. We are organizing a team to oversee the meals – culturally appropriate menu development, food & beverage

ordering, cooking, serving, and volunteer coordinator. If you have interest in participating in any aspect of the program, scan the QR code and select Asylum Seekers Ministry. We welcome everyone!




