

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

In Holy Week, we celebrate the most sacred mysteries of our Christian faith when we gather to celebrate Christ's dying, through which he destroyed our death, and His rising, through which he restored our life. The mysteries we celebrate during these days are not

only long ago, something far away, but are as close as our own and our world's struggle with living and dying.

To deepen our experience of life together and celebrate Christ's dying and rising to new life, we need to gather to tell the stories of God and to break bread together. We need to celebrate together, be at peace with one another, and give thanks as people who continually grow in faith.

The liturgies of Holy Week invite us to ponder the meaning of Christ's life, death and resurrection. I encourage you — yes, I urge you — to be present at the celebrative moments in the life of the Christian Faith Community, for it is when we gather that we are most truly Church — the People of God.

Our complete Holy Week schedule is on Page 6 of this bulletin and our website.

As we begin Holy Week, ponder this reflection by the late Bishop Kenneth Untener:

Mark's Gospel has no heroes but Jesus. Everyone fails one way or another. The good news is that failures don't have to be fatal.

By describing the failures of the "great ones," Mark teaches us: Don't underestimate the struggle of staying with Jesus or overestimate your own strength. The disciples' faith in Jesus did not come easily or by their own doing. Ours doesn't either.

Most of all, Mark wanted to encourage us. By God's grace, no failure need ever be fatal.

At the beginning of our Lenten journey, I mentioned a small book by Max Lucado entitled Grace for the Moment, which has become a part of my daily prayer. I share two of his reflections which may assist our Holy Week walk with the Lord Jesus.

I like the story of the little boy who fell out of his bed.

When his Mom asked him what happened, he answered, "I don't know. I guess I stayed too close to where I got in."

Easy to do the same with our faith. It's tempting to stay where we got in and never move.

Pick a time in the not-too-distant past. A year or two ago. Now ask yourself a few questions. How does your prayer

life today compare with then? How about your giving? Have both the amount and the joy increased? What about your church loyalty? Can you tell you've grown? And Bible study? Are you learning to learn?

Don't make the mistake of the little boy. Don't stay too close to where you got in. It's risky resting on the edge.

In Jesus' day, the washing of feet was a task reserved not just for servants but for the lowest of servants. Every circle has its pecking order, and the community of household workers was no exception. The servant at the bottom of the totem pole was expected to be on his knees with the towel and basin.

In this case, the one with the towel and basin is the king of the universe. Hands that shaped the stars now wash away the filth. Fingers that formed mountains now massage toes. And the one before whom all nations will one day kneel now kneels before his disciples. Hours before his death, Jesus' concern is singular. He wants his disciples to know how much he loves them. More than removing dirt, Jesus is eliminating doubt.

Our Holy Week has begun — may we take the time to put life into perspective. Make the time to journey to the Cross with Christ, and together may we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus — from death to eternal life. Jesus promises each one of us love, forgiveness and eternal life. If you get a better offer — take it!

When the great crowd that had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they took palm branches and went out to meet him,

Look, the whole world has gone after him."

Deepen Your Encounter with Christ During This Holy Week

e enter a sacred time this week, Holy Week, a very symbolic time for our life of faith. We come into Jerusalem with the crowd waving palms as Jesus enters the Holy City. On Tuesday, the archdiocesan priests, deacons and parish representatives gather for the Chrism



Mass. At this Mass, the priests renew their priestly promises. Cardinal Cupich blesses the three oils — Sacred Chrism, Oil of the Sick, and Oil of the Catechumens — to be distributed throughout the Archdiocese for Sacramental use all year until the following Holy Week. And Thursday begins the Sacred Triduum, the three holiest days of the year, commemorating the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth.

The Triduum is three days, each having a distinct character on this continuous journey. We begin in the Upper Room on Holy Thursday evening with the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Only one Mass is allowed to be celebrated in each church today. The Mass does not end with the final blessing but moves to the altar of repose, a representation of Christ both in the garden and in prison awaiting trial. We watch and pray with our Lord as he awaits his condemnation by Pilate. Our Cathedral will be open until Midnight on Holy Thursday to allow many people to come and spend time in prayer.

Good Friday is the only day in the liturgical year that Holy Mass is not celebrated. The Service of the Lord's Passion is simply that, a service. The Eucharist offered during the Service is consecrated at Mass the day before, on Holy Thursday. The Good Friday service does not begin with the sign of the cross because it is a continuation of the liturgy on Holy Thursday, nor does it end with a final blessing, but in silence, because God has died in the flesh.

On Holy Saturday, just like Holy Thursday, only one Mass is celebrated in each church: the Great Vigil of Easter.

This Mass also does not begin with the sign of the cross but instead starts outside the church with the blessing of the fire that lights the newly blessed Easter candle. Only at the end of the Easter Vigil does the priest celebrant give a final blessing, concluding the three holy days, with the joy of "Go, and announce the Gospel of the Lord."

One service, often overlooked, is Tenebrae. Our Tenebrae service will be at the Cathedral on Wednesday, April 5, at 7pm. Tenebrae is a religious service that uses psalms and light as a tangible preparation for the Triduum. We extinguish a candle with each psalm or reading and dim the lights until we remove the final candle in the darkened church, only to return after the great "strepitus" or earthquake. The Christ candle shows us that even death cannot extinguish the light.

As we enter Holy Week, the Worship Pillar invites you to join us during these sacred days to deepen your encounter with the Lord as we walk together with him through his passion, death, and resurrection.

Christ's Emptying Himself Strikes a Chord with Believers

Fr. Cameli gave this reflection on Edouard Manet's painting "Jesus Mocked by the Soldiers" on March 23 at the Art Institute of Chicago

anet's painting invites a two-fold appreciation — as art and as a moment of faith. The alignment of shapes and colors with the "illuminated" Christ at the center offers us a powerful image.



When we approach this painting as believers, we realize that Jesus,


the one at the center, is a person with whom we are connected, with whom we have a relationship. And that makes a difference.

There is — again for believers — a troubling side to this painting. Jesus is in distress, and we can share that feeling in the measure that we identify with him. Let me suggest how this plays out.

I see this picture representing what I call a psychological kenosis. The word "kenosis" comes from Paul's letter to the Philippians chapter 2: "Christ emptied himself *ekenosen.*" He emptied himself unto death on the cross. What is represented here is prior to the cross and death, but it is already a kind of emptying.

A false, mocking and ironic identity is imposed on Jesus, as from the back a soldier places a royal cloak on his shoulders and from the front a soldier is handing him a royal scepter. In the meanwhile, a muscular and powerful soldier dominates him in a threatening way.

Absent here is the Jesus who is noble, perhaps even stoic



in his suffering — as might be depicted in many *Ecce homo* motifs. He is very much down and out. He looks like the suffering servant described by Isaiah "There was no beauty in him." He resembles a weak, beaten up, vulnerable street person.

Obviously, for believers this image will stir feelings, will move their relationship and connection with Jesus forward, and will be a source for their contemplative consideration. The realism of his "emptying out" strikes us with force. We comprehend how he has gone to the furthest edges of our human experience and taken on our suffering. In him, we know ourselves. As Pope St. Leo says, "True reverence for the Lord's passion means fixing the eyes of our heart on Jesus crucified and recognizing in him our own humanity."

In addition to the clothing/food drive and care packages, we know there is a strong need to provide a meals program to supplement their current offerings. This program would also alleviate the pressure on other existing programs that currently serve other local people in need like our Thursday/Friday Suppers Ministry.

Our plan is to add a hot meal program for residents of the Selina Hotel (formerly the Tremont Hotel) on Chestnut and the Inn of Chicago on Ohio Street. Fourth Presbyterian has generously offered their commercial kitchen for us to prepare and serve the meals. We are organizing a team to oversee the meals – culturally appropriate menu development, food & beverage


