He had to rise from the dead.

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear Easter People,

The Lord is Risen! Alleluia! The death of Jesus is not the final word. Life so abundant we call it eternal -Resurrection. This is the Word of Good News! Joy. Hope. Promise. Empty tomb. He is Risen!

The Gospels do not explain Easter — Easter explains the Gospels. Our lives do not explain Easter — Easter gives meaning to our lives. Faith is the story we tell with our lives.

Resurrection means Jesus lives. Our Lord discovered what to die for and what to live forever for. We are invited to do the same. For Easter speaks of new life and hope always in the name of the Lord Jesus. We have so many choices in life and demands are placed upon us. What are we choosing? What are we seeking? What are we finding in life? Easter is an opportunity to put life into perspective through eyes of "Easter faith."

I share with you a reflection given to me some time ago. It connects beautifully with the Easter journey with the Lord.

It was a busy day in our Costa Mesa, California home. But then, with ten children and one on the way, every day was a bit hectic. On this particular day, however, I was having trouble doing even routine chores – all because of one little boy.

Len, who was five at the time, was on my heels no matter where I went. Whenever I stopped to do something and turned back around, I would trip over him. Several times, I would trip over him. Several times, I patiently suggested fun activities to keep him occupied. "Wouldn't you like to play on the swing set," I asked.

But he simply smiled an innocent smile and said, "Oh, that's all right, Mommy. I'd rather be in here with you." Then he continued to bounce happily along behind me.

After stepping on his toes for the fifth time, I began to lose my patience and insisted that he go outside and play with the other children. When I asked him why he was acting this way, he looked up at me with sweet green eyes and said, "Well, Mommy, in kindergarten, my teacher told me to walk in Jesus' footsteps. But I can't see Him, so I'm walking in yours."

I gathered Len in my arms and held him close. Tears of love and humility spilled over from the prayer that grew in my heart – a prayer of thanks for the simple, yet beautiful perspective of a five-year-old boy.

Easter faith is lived through us and made visible by our actions. We are challenged to be the Risen Lord Jesus to all we meet. This is hard because life is difficult, but the Risen Lord is with us — offering us life so abundant we call it Eternal. Easter!

Jesus took a journey — a long walk — which ended not in death, but Resurrection. Jesus also took an inward journey trusting God, His Father. As we live our lives, we also make an inward journey. Paula D'Arcy beautifully reflects in her book, Gift of the Red Bird:

"Why are we willing to make an endless outer journey, but are loath to make the significant one: the journey within. The journey may frighten us, yet it is this journey which holds the real treasure. There God's spirit waits to reveal mysteries and beauty beyond our imagination: the secrets of what is holy, and the encounters with truth that change everything. It is the journey that opens the eye of the heart."

Laugh, cry and dance together with God, trusting God to lead and guide us through this Easter Season --- and all the days of your life. For Jesus is the Son of God, died and risen to eternal life, to show us how to truly live.

Catholic Illuminations Renew Your Commitment to Christ This Easter

s we stand in the excellent glory of the Risen Christ this weekend, we, as a faith community, renew our baptismal promises. These promises are renewed annually on Easter Sunday as a reminder of what Baptism means. Baptism, as St. Paul tells the Romans, is the participation in the death and



resurrection of Jesus Christ (Romans 6). As we become adopted children of God, we receive a share in his Spirit (Romans 8). Baptism is the first Sacrament anyone receives and done for most of us when we were infants.

The practice of renewing our baptismal promises allows an opportunity for each of us as individuals to give our consent to the claims we are professing. When we were infants, our godparents and parents spoke for us when the priest or deacon proclaimed the promises. After the age of reason (around seven), we take ownership of these promises. Thus, on Easter Sunday, when we recall the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we renew our baptismal promises because we renew our commitment to the Risen Lord. We stand in community and profess our faith in Jesus Christ.

However, the promises are not just about what we profess but also what we reject. We first reject Satan, sin, and evil. Then we profess our belief in God. There was an ancient practice of turning to the west, the setting sun, the area of darkness when one would renounce Satan, the prince of darkness. Then after the rejection, the believer would turn east towards the rising sun, a symbol of the resurrection, and profess the faith we desire to live out.

Baptism should change us. Because in Baptism, we are no longer slaves to sin and death (Romans 6). We become a new creation (2 Corinthians 5). Thus, on this faith journey that begins in Baptism, of allowing Jesus to continue to grow in us so that "he may increase, and I may decrease" (John 3). We need to be renewed in this reality. Before our Confirmation, we renewed these promises every Easter Sunday, strengthening the Spirit given to us in Baptism and ultimately sealed in us in Confirmation. However, every time we use Holy Water, we renew our commitment to the Lord and the reality of baptism: new life in Christ.

In this liturgical act, we renew our commitment to living for Jesus. We renew our commitment to being missionary disciples, bringing the joy of the resurrection to those we meet on life's journey. May this day serve as a reminder of our new life in Christ, that through our Baptism, we are no longer slaves to sin or death. We are promised the gift of eternal life, and we are called to go out and share the joyful news that Christ has conquered death with all people.

Divine Mercy Sunday

Next Sunday, on April 16, we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday. On the Second Sunday of Easter of the Jubilee Year 2000, at the Mass for the Canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Pope John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter be called "Divine Mercy Sunday."

St. Faustina was a Polish nun who received visions from Jesus, including one of Jesus wearing a white garment with beams of red and white coming from His heart, which came to be known as the image of Divine Mercy. In her diary, she wrote that He said:

"I want the Image to be solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter, and I want it to be venerated publicly so

that every soul may know about it...My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners.

I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy."

In a special connection, Holy Name Cathedral has a relic of St. Faustina in our reliquery, which can be viewed along the wall north of the door to the courtyard.

Divine Mercy Sunday focuses on the gift of mercy and love given through Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. As Pope John Paul II stated, "Divine Mercy reaches human beings through the heart of Christ crucified."

In addition to the Cathedral's regularly scheduled Sunday masses, we will also celebrate the Divine Mercy Hour at 3:00pm. Please join us for this special time of mercy.

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received.
