

"Divine Mercy" by Eugeniusz Kazimirowski (1873-1939), at Sanctuary of the Divine Mercy, Vilnius, Lithuania

The resurrection's transforming power is apparent in today's readings. In the Gospel, the frightened disciples are changed as Jesus enters the



room in which they are hiding. With the greeting "Shalom Jesus," He offers them blessings on every dimension of their being. This blessing, translated at "Peace be with you" (Jn 20: 21), communicates God's mercy. Jesus goes further by extending the gift of the Holy Spirit to his disciples.

The risen Lord still bears the marks of his crucifixion. The apostle Thomas is not present on this occasion and refuses to believe the witness of the other disciples. Later, Thomas makes a confession of faith as he says, "My Lord and my God!" We are encouraged to live and grow in faith, even in moments when it seems that God is absent. This is not blind faith. Our faith is rooted in the encounters we have with the Lord Jesus and the witness of generations of faithful people.

Learn to Trust in Jesus on Divine Mercy Sunday

n April 30, 2000, St. Pope John Paul II canonized Sister Faustina Kowalska, a religious mystic from Poland who died in 1938. In the early 1930s, Sister Faustina reported apparitions of Jesus which eventually were approved as authentic apparitions by the Vatican. Finally, St. Faustina spoke with an artist who



painted the image, which is on the bulletin cover this week. The image of Jesus walking towards us, pulling back a part of his white gown, and white and red rays coming from his Sacred Heart is known as Divine Mercy. Below Jesus is the saying, "Jesus, I trust in You."

Since the canonization in 2000, the Second Sunday of Easter has been known as Divine Mercy Sunday. It is the final day in the Octave of Easter. Our liturgical year has two octaves: the Christmas Octave and the Easter Octave. The Octave allows us to celebrate eight times what is celebrated on the first of the eight days. So for eight days, the joy of Christmas and Easter is celebrated, the two pivotal moments in our faith: God becoming man and God rising from the dead. Both octaves culminate on the 8th day. For Christmas, the Octave reaches its climax on Jan. 1, formerly the naming of Jesus, but now celebrates Mary, the Mother of God. For Easter, the Octave reaches its climax with Divine Mercy Sunday.

Associated with a devotion to the Divine Mercy of God is the Divine Mercy Chaplet, inspired by the apparitions of Jesus to St. Faustina. The chaplet uses a regular rosary and is similar in the practice of repetition, repeating the same prayer on all the Hail Mary beads and the same prayer on the Our Father beads. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is an easy way to remind ourselves of God's endless mercy as we say, "Eternal Father, I offer you the body, blood, soul, and divinity of your dearly beloved Son, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world," as well as "For the sake of his sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

Every Sunday is a mini-Easter and a reminder of God's never-failing mercy for us. This celebration of Mercy is a daily reminder that just as Jesus is risen from the dead and offers us a share in his divine life through baptism, his mercy is also available for us every day. And by our baptism, by becoming a new creation in Christ, we are invited to share that love and mercy with others every day.

Let us always be reminded that God's mercy has also conquered the grave with the Resurrection. In his Divine Mercy, we learn to trust in Jesus and that no matter the darkness of our lives, Jesus always walks towards us, inviting us to eternal life.

Back to the Original!

ather, how was your trip visiting family?" Well, I would say, "It was sweet!" Interestingly, when asked, we tend to have a more



profound appreciation of our encounters or experiences. Besides spending time with family, one of the highlights from the trip was food hunting for original Vietnamese

dishes (think about your favorite dishes that you have been craving for a long time, and all were being presented in front of you — yes, yummy!").

Sometimes, a favorite dish is not fancy but contains fond memories, bringing back a sense of joy. I remembered eating a bony fish dish (which cost around \$10 for five people), which made my day. It brought me back to the joy of having something on the table during the depression in the economy in my village.

As we celebrate the Second Sunday of Easter, we invite you to reflect on the Divine Mercy. The mercy gave miraculous healing to the soldier, Longinus, who pierced our Lord's heart at Golgotha by the water and blood that fell from Jesus's side. The Lord gives mercy, as Peter in



today's second reading exclaims, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in his great mercy gave us a new birth to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead."

St. John Paul II echoes Peter's words saying, "There is nothing more man needs than Divine Mercy — that love which is benevolent, which is compassionate, which raises man above his weakness to the infinite heights to the holiness of God." Yes, at the moment of desperation because of our sins, the Lord has given us a new birth through Christ's death and resurrection, bringing us back to the original relationship with God the Father. So, when shopping for original clothing and hunting for authentic food, rest in the original love that the Lord has for us, especially in the Eucharist. I love being a priest! JMJ.


