

## Reflections from Our Rector \_\_\_\_



Dear People of God,

Our Easter season continues, and May is rapidly approaching. Daylight is "growing" along with the trees, grass and flowers. Life abounds around us, and the rolling back of the stone on Easter morn provides the doorway to enter a new life with our Lord Jesus Christ.

What does "new life" in Christ mean for all of us? What does walking together mean as a community of believers in the name of Jesus Christ? The following story provides a glimpse....

In the story, an older man is dying and calls his people to his side. He gives a short, sturdy stick to each of his many offspring, wife and relatives. "Break the stick," he instructs them. With some effort, they all snap their sticks in half. "This is how it is when a soul is alone without anyone. They can be easily broken." The old man next gives each of his kin another stick and says, "Put your sticks together in bundles of twos and threes. Now. break these bundles in half." No one can break the sticks when two or more are in a bundle. The old man smiles. "We are strong when we stand with another soul. When we are with another, we cannot be broken."

We are the Body of Christ and must stand strong together. Individually we can make a profound difference, and as a Faith Community, we can stand united to love this world back into life. Easter is more than a date on the calendar. Easter provides a point of reference for our life that shouts life so abundant we call it eternal -Resurrection!

Spring is a marvelous time of the year. The warmth of the sun and the greening of the earth's carpet give us a chance to bury the cold and dark days of winter and spark new life into us. Easter Season joy and hope provide new meaning to Malachi 3:3 – "He will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver." Keep reading. ...

This verse puzzled some women in a Bible study, and they wondered what this statement meant about the

character and nature of God. One of the women offered to find out how to refine silver and get back to the group at their following Bible study. That week, the woman called a silversmith and made an appointment to watch him at work. She didn't mention anything about the reason for her interest beyond her curiosity about the process of refining silver.

As she watched the silversmith, he held a piece of silver over the fire and let it heat up. He explained that in refining silver, one needed to keep the silver in the middle of the fire where the flames were hottest to burn away all the impurities.

The woman thought about God holding us in such a hot spot: then she thought again about the verse that says: "He sits as a refiner and purifier of silver."

She asked the silversmith if it was true that he had to sit there in front of the fire the whole time the silver was being refined. The man answered that yes, he not only had to sit there holding the silver, but he had to keep his eyes on the silver the entire time it was in the fire. It would be destroyed if the silver was left a moment too long in the flames.

The woman was silent for a moment. Then she asked the silversmith, "How do you know when the silver is fully refined?"

He smiled at her and answered, "Oh, that's easy - when I see my image in it."

If you are feeling the heat of the fire today, remember that God has His eye on you and will keep watching you until He sees His image in you.

May the fire of our Easter Season spark new life into our lives. Remembering – life is a coin. You can spend it any way you wish, but you can only spend it once.

When Jesus interpreted all the passages in the Scriptures that referred to him, everything made sense for the two disciples. How did Jesus light up



the Scriptures? What was Jesus' method? It worked. for the text said, the two disciples said, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?" Jesus spoke to the heart, not just the head. And the disciples got it because their hearts were seeking it, their hearts were right, their hearts were in love with the right thing, the thing the Messiah was designed to bring them; salvation from sin, sanctity, charity, love. Jesus' explanation worked because it was heart to heart, not just head to head. And 'heart' here means something much deeper than feeling or emotion. It was wisdom, intuition, spiritual intelligence, understanding, seeing deeply because you love deeply that which is most deeply worth loving.



### The Easter Candle is a Powerful Symbol of the Risen Lord

ne of the markings of the Easter season is the Easter (Paschal) Candle. Every year at Easter Vigil, parishes bless a new Easter Candle. The candle is then lit from the fire, giving it a 'blessed' flame. From that flame, at the Vigil, every baptized person lights their candle, illuminating the darkness



around us. The Easter Candle symbolizes the Risen Lord signifying the Lord who descended into the darkness of death and brought his light to those in darkness. We are given the same light at our baptism to dispel the evil of sin and death in our lives.

But it also has Old Testament roots. As the Israelites were fleeing slavery in Egypt and walking towards the promised land, God guided their steps, during the day as a column of cloud, and at night, as a pillar of fire (Exodus 13). Since the Vigil begins after sunset and retells our salvation history, we follow, like the Israelites, the pillar of fire from darkness and sin into light and freedom.

The candle itself contains symbolism as well. These symbols are the cross, the year, and the first and last letter of the Greek Alphabet. The priest celebrant either cuts these symbols into the candle or the candle maker paints on the symbols. And each symbol has a specific meaning. The priest says, "Christ yesterday and today (vertical line for the cross), the beginning and the end (horizontal line for the cross), the Alpha (letter A), and the Omega  $(\Omega)$ . All time belongs to him (adds number 2), and all the ages (adds number 0) to him be glory and power (adds number 2) through every age and forever. Amen." (adds number 3). Because these symbols (including the new year) are etched into the candle's wax, we always have a new candle each year. Five grains of incense, or nails, are added to the candle to symbolize the five wounds of Christ on the cross. As the priest places the nails into the candle, he says, "By his holy and glorious wounds, may Christ the Lord guard us and protect us, amen."

After the blessing of the fire and the new candle, the priest lights the candle from the blessed fire by saying, "May the light of Christ rising in glory dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." Then the procession to the darkened church begins by following that single flame, that pillar of fire. From there, the Easter Vigil follows, when we proclaim Christ risen from the dead.

Each parish needs a new Easter Candle every year to symbolize the resurrection, and practically as the candle shrinks in size over the year. The Easter Candle is lit every day for 50 days during the Easter season and then for funerals and baptisms throughout the year as a symbol of life beginning and ending in Christ.

Whatever Catholic Church you walk into, look for the Easter Candle and admire its beauty and uniqueness as each parish finds its own style. And remember that this candle symbolizes Christ, who conquered the grave and offers eternal life to those who follow the light.




### **Holy Thursday**

## **Light a Prayer Candle**




