

# **Reflections from Our Rector**



#### Dear People of God,

Driving a car may appear easy, but tremendous concentration is needed. We must keep our eyes on the road and know what is happening around us. The rearview and side mirrors are essential to provide views from other angles. Texting while driving is not an option!

The image of a car can be likened to our individual lives. We need to keep our "eyes on the road" of life. However, it is important to let our Lord Jesus do the steering. We are not always in control. We must keep our hands on the wheel but allow the Lord to grasp the wheel with us.

Unfortunately, too many people spend their life only using the rearview mirror. What do I mean?

It is impossible to properly drive a car with your eyes riveted only on the rearview mirror. The vehicle moves forward, but our vision in the rearview mirror focuses on what is behind us. Too many people spend their entire life living in the past. Life moves forward, but some people cannot let go of past experiences. The Lord Jesus says, "I love you and I forgive you – let it go." God never clings to the past. We cling to the past many times, unable to forgive or let go.

We need to live in a balance between the past, present and future. All are important. However, we find God in the present moment. Our individual past experiences are essential, but living life only in the past robs us of the beauty and joy of the present moment. Life is a profound gift connecting the past, present and future. I share a reflection written by an individual on his 70th birthday some years ago. Enjoy and pass it on...

Lord, you know better than myself that I am growing older and will someday be old. Keep me from the fatal habit of thinking I must say something on every subject and every occasion. Release me from craving to straighten out everybody's affairs. Make me thoughtful but not moody; helpful but not bossy. With my vast store of wisdom, it seems a pity not to use it all, but You know, Lord, that I want a few friends at the end. Keep my mind free from the recital of endless details - give me wings to get to the point. Seal my lips on my aches and pains. They are increasing, and the love of rehearsing them is becoming sweeter as the years go by. I dare not ask for grace enough to enjoy the tales of others but help me to endure them with patience. I dare not ask for improved memory but a growing humility and lessening overconfidence when my memory seems to clash with the memories of others. Teach me the glorious lesson that, occasionally, I may be mistaken. Keep me reasonably sweet. I do not want to be a saint - some of them are so hard to live with -but a sour old person is one of the crowning works of the devil. Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected places and talents in unexpected people, and give me the grace to tell them so. Amen.

And, by the way, turn your problems and concerns over to God this evening before you go to bed - God will be up all night anyway!

### Catholic Illuminations Ordination Season Has Arrived at Holy Name Cathedral

uring Lent, I wrote about Archdiocesan liturgies at the Cathedral. These liturgies include the Rite of Election for those who will receive the Sacraments of Initiation — Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation — enter their final stage before the Great Vigil of Easter, as well as Chrism Mass during Holy Week



when the Cardinal blesses the Sacred Oils used in our Sacraments.

Another Archdiocesan liturgy celebrated with great joy in the Cathedral is Ordination, when men are ordained to serve the People of God throughout the Archdiocese. They come from parishes and faith communities, from families and unique backgrounds to the diocese's mother church, where the Cardinal will ordain and send them out on their mission.

This year on May 13, the Archdiocese of Chicago will ordain 20 permanent deacons and four transitional deacons (to be ordained as priests in May 2024). Then, on May 20, the Cardinal will ordain five new priests. One of the seven Sacraments of the Church, Holy Orders has three levels: Diaconate, Priesthood, and Episcopal.

There are many moving parts in an Ordination liturgy. Those to be ordained are first called by name and then affirmed of their calling by the congregation. After the homily, those to be ordained make their promises in front of Cardinal Cupich and then individually pledge their respect and obedience to the Cardinal. Following the promises, they prostrate on the ground while the cantor sings the Litany of Saints, invoking the saints to help and guide as they minister to God's people. This part is my favorite moment in the Ordination liturgy. We rarely hear the Litany of Saints in liturgies. The only other time we pray the litany is during baptisms, religious professions, and the Easter Vigil. It can also be sung on All Saints Day, during the consecration of an altar, and the Conferral of Confirmation.

The essential section of any Ordination liturgy is the laying on of hands and the Prayer of Ordination (cf. Ordination of a Bishop, of Priests, and of Deacons, 7). The laying on of hands finds its origin in the Acts of the Apostles, "The Apostles laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit" (Acts 8:17). After the Bishop concludes the Prayer of Ordination, the newly ordained deacons and priests are dressed in their proper vestments. Then, deacons are handed the object of their ministry: the Book of the Gospels. For priests, the Cardinal anoints their hands with Sacred Chrism, and they receive the vessels of their ministry: the chalice and paten with bread and wine. Following the Rite of Ordination, the liturgy concludes with the sign of peace from the Cardinal, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist proceeds as usual.

As we move closer to the Ordination of Deacons and Priests in the Archdiocese of Chicago, let us pray for the men who will lay down their lives in service to God's people. We pray the work that God has begun in them may be fulfilled and the Lord of the harvest may call more laborers for his harvest.

# What is a Mass Intention?


