Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

I had the best Mother in the whole world! Mom died in January 2020. My Mother was loving, caring, humorous, compassionate, faith-filled, always giving, and my best friend. About 15 years ago, I asked Mom her definition of Motherhood. She paused and said:

“A willingness to be inconvenienced.”

As a child, I took my Mother for granted. Mom is Mom — you know, the one who picks up after you, cooks, cleans, drives you to baseball, football, and basketball practice, rushes you to emergency rooms for stitches, stays on your case for three hours to clean your room when she could have completed the task in 15 minutes and serves as a referee between my brother, sisters and me. The list is endless.

In the last 10 years before Mom died, I came to appreciate the gift of my Mother more deeply. Sometimes, we gain the wisdom of the years to help us better understand the gifts God has given us.

I can only “see” Mothering through the eyes of a son. What goes through the minds and hearts of all our Mothers? What are we celebrating today on this Mother’s Day? I recently received this powerful poem entitled: “A Message for Young Mothers” by Mary Costello which I would like to share with all of you.

A Message for Young Mothers (Things I Wish I’d Known)

I’ve learned a lot in my old age. I’ve even learned a thing or two about myself.

I used to think I was a terrible housekeeper because I could never keep up with the laundry, the dirty ice cream bowls on the countertops, and the newspapers on the floor.

One year, when we finally got to the bottom of the piles in the laundry room, we found clothes that hadn’t fit anybody in years. In fact, we found shorts and shirts we had never seen before.

There was a time when I couldn’t find a safety pin, a sewing needle, or a piece of blank paper to leave someone a message, much less a pen to write with. I

thought I was a rotten manager. Why didn’t I have more drive or ambition?

I tried not to make commitments. When I did, I let people down. I’d promise to attend a meeting, for example, and chair a committee. Then I’d have to cancel at the last minute because the baby got sick.

For years, I thought I was a terrible person because I could never say a prayer without an interruption, and even if I didn’t have an interruption, I could only pray about things like “Please, Lord, let the stain in this shirt come out. It cost too much to be ruined.” Then the kids grew up and left home.

I found I was not a terrible housekeeper; instead, I’d been surrounded by a bunch of normal, wonderful, messy kids. I hadn’t had any energy because I had been working very hard. I wasn’t even a rotten manager; it’s just not possible to keep up with so many people.

I wish I’d known that then! I wish I had acknowledged that having dishes on the counter and newspapers on the floor is OK because the most important thing is rocking a baby. I wish I could say: “I’m terribly sorry I cannot come to your meeting.

Maybe someday I’ll be able to get involved and contribute toward a more loving world. But right now, I have to stay at home and make sure we have a loving world here on Bradfield Drive.”

I wish I had understood that Jesus was saying: “When you rock that baby and sing that baby to sleep, that is your very best prayer. By loving that child, you are loving Me. All I ask of you right now is to model my love for your partner and your children. All I expect you to do today is love.”

We are called to love. That’s all. I wish I had realized it earlier. God had truly blessed my family through the love, care and patience of our Mother. Mom, I love you very much, and yes, I have inconvenienced you a thousand times!!

A Blessed, Joyous & Peaceful Mother’s Day to all our Moms and all women who love in a motherly way.

Love and law are usually thought to be opposites. The Pharisees were loveless legalists. Obeying the laws—all the laws—was their



thing, and their only thing. Jesus was often seen as the opposite: pro-love and anti-law. That's a mistake. He was anti-legalism but not anti-law. He said, “If you love me, you will keep my commandments.” Love is not a feeling. It is a willing, a choice. That's why love is commanded by Christ. You can't command a feeling. How silly would it be to say, “I command you to feel sweet feelings of compassion or desire or concern for me.” To love God is simply to say, “Thy will be done,” and mean it, and live it. And that will of God for us is expressed by laws, by commandments. We cannot will feelings into existence, but we can will love into existence because love is not a feeling but a free choice.

Diaconate Ministry is a Vital Part of Our Catholic Church

This past weekend, we celebrated Diaconate Ordination at the Cathedral for 23 new deacons who will serve in parishes across the Archdiocese of Chicago. Four of them are transitional deacons, meaning they will move to priesthood ordination in May 2024, and the remaining 19 are permanent deacons, most of whom are married and have a family. At diaconate ordination, the promise of celibacy is taken for the rest of the individual's life if they are not married at the time of ordination. No canonical or sacramental difference exists between permanent and transitional deacons; they are all ordained into one diaconate.



We trace the ministry of deacon back to the early Church. In Acts of the Apostles, chapter 6, we read about seven reputable men who were chosen and filled with the Holy Spirit, had the Apostles lay hands on them. One of these seven men was Stephen, the first Martyr, who died professing that Jesus of Nazareth is risen from the dead. Around the fifth century, the diaconate ministry began to fade from the Church and would remain so until the Second Vatican Council. In 1967, St. Pope Paul VI restored the practice of men being ordained deacons of those who did not want to become priests, now understood as the permanent diaconate.

The diaconal ministry then, as it still is today, is focused on three areas of ministry. The deacon functions as a minister of the liturgy, a minister of the Word and a minister of charity.

During the Rite of Ordination for a Deacon, the bishop hands the Book of the Gospels to the newly ordained and vested deacon (who wears the stole and the dalmatic, symbols of the diaconal office) and says, "Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe and practice what you teach." This simple phrase goes to the depths of the diaconal ministry. Because deacons preach the Word of God, they celebrate the Sacraments of Baptisms and Weddings, assist at the altar, and support the poor and outcast.

Deacons assist the priest at Mass, preach the Gospel, prepare the altar, welcome all to share the sign of peace and dismiss the congregation at the end of Mass. Deacons preach the Word by offering retreats and days of renewal, going to prisons and nursing homes, and celebrating Communion Services. Deacons perform acts of charity by serving in food pantries and soup kitchens and assisting those in need.

Deacons, fundamentally in their being, are agents of service. This purpose is why every ordained priest has been a deacon, and their call of service does not go away when a transitional deacon is ordained a priest or even when the priest is ordained a bishop. Please pray for those newly ordained men who have had Cardinal Cupich lay his hands upon them, filled with the Holy Spirit and ready to continue the work of the early Church in an unbroken line of ordaining to serve. Also, pray for an increase in vocations to the diaconate and to serve God's people in the Church so that more people may hear God's voice through actions of love and service.

Putting Christ Above All Else

On this sixth Sunday of Easter, our readings remind us that God must come first in our lives, and that love of God shows itself in concrete actions — this is precisely why the stewardship way of life is so necessary.

Our second reading, from St. Peter, challenges us to, “Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts.” In other words, we are to put Christ first above all else in our lives. His role is not merely as Savior of our lives, as significant as that role is — He is to be “Lord” of our lives as well. As His disciples, we are called to make Him ruler of all aspects of our lives — our time, talent, and treasure.

The beauty of the stewardship way of life is that it offers us a concrete means to show that Christ truly is Lord of our lives, to “prove” our love, in a manner of speaking, because true love is not a mere sentiment. “Whoever has my commandments and observes them is the one who loves me,” Jesus tells us in our Gospel passage from John.

True love is an act of the will. It requires obedience to all of God's commandments. This requires courage, humility, and deep trust in Him.

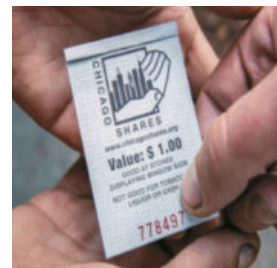

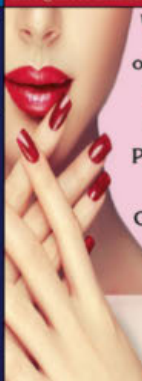
