Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Today we celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi — The Body and Blood of Christ. What is the real meaning of the Eucharist? Let me share a story.

A well-known speaker started his seminar by holding up a \$20 bill. In a

room of 200 people, he asked, "Who would like this \$20 bill?" Hands started going up. He said, "I will give this twenty-dollar bill to one of you, but first, let me do this.

He proceeded to crumple up the \$20 bill. He then asked, "Who still wants it?" Still, the hands went up in the air.

"Well," he replied, "What if I do this?" He dropped it on the ground and started grinding it into the floor with his shoe. He picked it up, now crumpled and dirty.

"Now, who still wants it?" Still, the hands went into the air.

"My friends, we have all learned a valuable lesson. No matter what I did to the money, you still wanted it because it did not decrease in value. It was still worth twenty dollars."

"Many times in our lives, we are dropped, crumpled, and ground into the dirt by the decisions we make and the circumstances that come our way. We feel as though we are worthless. But no matter what has happened or what will happen, we will never lose our value."

"Dirty or clean, crumpled or finely creased, we are still priceless to those who love us, and we are always loved and forgiven by God!"

"The worth of our lives comes not in what we do or who we know. But who we are."

"You are special — Don't ever forget it."

We gather as the Body of Christ every weekend, knowing God's grace is entwined with our freedom. We gather every weekend to be strengthened and nourished by the Lord's Word and fed around the Lord's table to "feed" our sisters and brothers — especially the poor, homeless, and impoverished in our city, country and world. The Lord has promised to be with us always and always be our hope, joy, and eternal food. We need to "flock" together as "church" — as God's people — to realize we are a pilgrim people — to be nourished, strengthened, and commissioned to reach out to others in His Name. The Lord feeds us, but the Eucharist also means we feed each other.

In his book, "The Great House of God," Max Lucado asks the following —

• What ignites your heart? Forgotten orphans? Untouched nations? The inner city?

• The outer limit? Heed the fire within!

• Do you have a passion for singing? Then sing! Are you stirred to manage? Then manage! Do you ache for the ill? Then treat them! Do you hurt for the lost? Then teach them!

As a young man, I felt the call to preach. Unsure I was correct in my reading of God's will for me, I sought the counsel of a minister I admired. His counsel still rings true: "Don't preach," he said, "unless you have to."

As I pondered his words, I found my answer: "I have to. If I don't, the fire will consume me."

What fire consumes you?

The Eucharist exists to change bread and wine and to change us. We need to love this world back into life.

You are the church, and together we are the Body of Christ.

Pope Urban IV instituted the solemnity of Corpus Christi, by the papal bull *Transiturus de hoc mundo* (Aug. 11, 1264). He ordered that the



famous corporal with the traces of the Eucharistic miracle that had occurred in Bolsena in 1263 be kept in Orvieto Cathedral — where it still is today.

As Christians, we are called to share in Christ's life and sacrifice. On this solemnity, we delve into Christ's willingness to sacrifice himself for others. God is always attentive to our needs and is ready to provide what is best for us. Jesus is the fullness of God's gift to us. Taking the Body of Christ through communion bonds us to Christ — God — one another, all of creation. Such bonding calls us to nourish others the way God nourishes us in Christ. If we become what we eat, then every aspect of our lives should reflect that. Everyone we interact with should be able to tell who has fed and nourished us.

Celebrating Corpus Christi Reminds Us of God's Love For Us

he Feast of Corpus Christi, where we celebrate the Real Presence of Jesus Christ, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity contained in the Eucharist, is a great treasure of our liturgical calendar. Common tradition tells us that the feast was added in 1264 by Pope Urban IV, and St. Thomas Aquinas wrote the



Eucharistic Hymn, *Pange Lingua*, to commemorate this feast. But there was a person who inspired Pope Urban while he was an Archdeacon years before his election to the Papacy.

Juliana of Liège, or Cornillo, was a Norbertine canoness regular who lived in modern-day Belgium. Tradition tells us she worked tirelessly to have the Church dedicate a feast solely to the Eucharist. Juliana was born in 1192/3, and the first Corpus Christi feast was celebrated in the diocese she lived in during 1246. She is known as the Apostle of the Eucharist for tireless efforts to promote Eucharistic devotion. She was canonized in 1869 by Blessed Pope Pius IX.

Many articles can be written on the Eucharist, its theological development, piety, devotion, and the like. Falling in the middle of the calendar year (depending on when Easter falls), this feast celebrates that Jesus remains with us in the Eucharist. This thought resonated with me as a second grader preparing for First Holy Communion. And since my First Communion, I heard the call to be a priest. And my greatest joy in life, though unworthy, is celebrating the Mass and allowing more people to know Jesus is here. That Jesus is alive. That Jesus remains with us.

The Feast of Corpus Christi is a day to stop our daily routines, as is every feast of our Church, and ponder God's wondrous mystery. Reflect on the fact that Jesus remains with us, hidden in the Eucharist. And to celebrate that fact as we receive him every time we approach the



altar. And how often we fail to remember this reality. How often we neglect the call to be changed by this meal, by this encounter.

Last year, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops kicked off a three-year Eucharistic Revival, culminating in a Eucharistic Congress in July 2024. The first year, 2022, was dedicated to the diocesan Revival. This year, on Corpus Christi, the Revival enters the Parish phase, which focuses on the community gathering for Mass, Adoration, missions, and movements of the Holy Spirit. Here at the Cathedral, we will continue to offer Eucharistic Adoration every Wednesday, from 12:30 to 5:00pm, and First Friday Adoration on the first Friday of the month, from 8:30am to 11:45am.

As a reminder, this weekend, the Precious Blood will begin to be offered to the faithful at the 10:30am Mass. We will have two stations at the front of the Cathedral near the altar. Please sit in the front two sections if you plan to receive from the cup. It is not allowed to dip the Sacred Host into the cup; you must physically drink from the cup. Please keep in mind that it is not mandatory to receive from the cup due to the Doctrine of Concomitance, which I wrote about in last week's column.

Celebrating Corpus Christi reminds us of God's love for us as we celebrate the Real Presence in the Eucharist. The fact that God remains with his people. The invitation is to receive him in the form of bread and wine, fully knowing the mystery within. May we continue to "see what we believe in, and become what we receive" (St. Augustine) so that the world may continue to be sanctified by Jesus, who works in us and through us.

xcited and caring, she tries to grip some food in her tiny beak. I whispered, "Canary, why don't you swallow your food? Do you want to exchange your food with this delicious chocolate cookie?" She flew toward the nest and fed her little birds. Wow, what love!



From that observation, I think about

the salangane, the type of bird that make its nests out of its saliva. It is a beautiful symbol of true love. It is emptying themselves and embracing those they love dearly.

With that image, we connect to the Solemnity that we are celebrating today, the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, also called Corpus Christi. Before the crucifixion, the Lord instituted the Holy Eucharist giving the Church her greatest treasure. St. Thomas Aquinas once said, "For on the altar of the Cross, He immolated to the Father His own Body as a victim for our reconciliation and shed His blood both for our ransom and our regeneration. Moreover, so that a remembrance of so many great benefits may always be with us, He has left us His Body as food and His Blood as drink under appearances of bread and wine." The salangane bird makes its nest out of its own saliva.

I hope we all have a great reverence and appreciation for receiving the Eucharist. And before that sacred time during the Mass, note the moment when the priest pours water and wine into the chalice. He makes a prayer asking God to let us mingle with the Divine to see our likeness in Him as His beloved Sons and Daughters.

June is also the Month of our Sacred Heart of Jesus. What should I do to foster this beautiful devotion? Have the heart of the Lord! But what does it mean? It means to follow him closely. As he has touched our hearts with compassion and love, so do we. We can spend a few minutes or an hour adoring the Lord in front of the Blessed Sacrament and bring Christ's presence to those we interact with daily. I Love Being a Priest! JMJ.


15-min. Cathedral Tours After 8:30am & 10:30am Masses

Scriptural Reflections

The Grace and Gratitude of Stewardship

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. Our readings are focused on the gifts of the Word of God and the Eucharist. This feast has deep significance to those of us living the stewardship way of life.

Why? As stewards, we recognize that all that we are and all that we have been given are



gifts from God. We are called to treasure these gifts and use them for God's glory. Our Solemnity today and the readings for this week invite us to a deeper gratitude and better stewardship of the two sublime gifts of God's Word and the Eucharist.

In our first reading from Deuteronomy, Our Heavenly Father (such a good teacher) reminds us that just as we experience physical hunger from lack of food, we become spiritually malnourished through a lack of feeding on the Word of God. It is that important.

And, just as the Word of God is vital to our spiritual nourishment, so, too, is the nourishment of the Eucharist. Jesus could not make this any clearer to us: "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you." Without the Eucharist, we die spiritually. But through the Eucharist, we experience a taste of heaven right now – "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life."

As Christian stewards, we must recognize that in the gifts of the Word of God and the Eucharist, we have everything we need to sustain us in this world and guide us to heaven. Let us resolve to steward these precious gifts well with all our hearts, always.
