

Today's Gospel consists of two sets of short sayings attributed to Jesus. The first set centers on the cost of discipleship while



the second focuses on hospitality. The themes are appropriate because this reading is part of what was traditionally called the "mission discourse." The saying that embraces the whole of the mission discourse is "Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." (Mt 10: 39). Are you willing to live the paradox?

When we offer even the smallest act of hospitality to someone, we affirm God's presence within them. These acts do not earn us our salvation: rather. through them we demonstrate our belief in the presence of Christ in our ur brothers and sisters all around us. Jesus never promises that following him would be easy. After today's Gospel reading, we understand anew that the road to Jerusalem is the road to the cross for Jesus and for us.

# Why the Season of Ordinary Time Isn't So Ordinary

here are many ways to celebrate a liturgy. As I have previously written about in past articles. there is a level of degree regarding liturgical celebration. The most common and simplest celebration is considered a 'ferial' day, meaning there is no special saint's memorial, feast day, or solemnity celebrated.



During these summer months of Ordinary Time, many of our week days are considered ferial days. On the other extreme, the more rare and higher celebrations are the great solemnities of Easter and Christmas, each of which contain an octave, 8 days of continued celebration.

The continuous weeks of Ordinary Time may at times become routine, going through the same motions and prayers. And this is where our liturgical life comes alive. Yes, throughout the year we have saint's memorials and feast days and solemnities, but during Ordinary Time these celebrations allow us to see God at work in the every day moments of life, calling us to holiness.

This week we celebrate two saints who were made saints within the last 100 years. In the United States, July 4 is Independence Day and there is a special liturgy with prayers 'for the nation.' But also on the same day, and celebrated as a Feast in Italy, is the feast of Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati. Frassati died in 1925 from polio at the age of 24. Frassati is known for his love for the outdoors. and also for the poor. He would talk about Jesus to

whoever he met, because Jesus was the center of his life. At his funeral, his family was shocked to see the streets of his hometown lined with the poor who he ministered to, people who saw Christ in his words and in his acts of kindness.

Additionally, on July 6, the Church celebrates the Memorial of St. Maria Goretti, one of the youngest saints in our tradition. Goretti died in 1902 at the age of 11, after defending herself against the sexual advances of her neighbor, Alessandro Serrenelli. He stabbed her 14 times and she died from her injuries but before she died, she said she forgave him and wanted him in heaven with her. And as Alessandro was in jail, Maria came to him in a dream, giving him 14 lilies for the 14 stabs wounds he inflicted on her, forgiving him of his actions. After Alessandro was released from prison, he became a lay brother of the Capuchin Franciscans in Italy, showing us that being forgiven changes us as well. Maria's mother, Assunta was present at the canonization mass in Rome in 1950 along with her children, and Alessandro.

These two young saints, inspire us on our journey of discipleship that God can be seen in the every day moments of life. That as Christians, we have an invitation in our belief in Jesus to be joyful witnesses of his love and mercy, and also to be forgiving for those who do us wrong, knowing hatred should not follow us to the grave. As we move further into Ordinary Time which will last until Dec. 3 with the start of Advent, let us use the memorials and feast days sprinkled throughout the calendar to awaken our call to holiness.

The Bible study sessions were enlightening and helped deepen my understanding of Scripture as we journeyed through the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. Our group nurtured my relationship with God each Tuesday night by conversing about the Scriptures and how the readings applied to our lives. Our discussions were both theological and practical, and we often text about the insights we shared in Bible study and reflected upon in the following days.

Being part of the Exodus 90 Group changed my life with its challenges to grow spiritually, physically, and mentally. I would only have done Exodus 90 with the Young Adult men at Holy Name Cathedral, led by Fr. Ton. The Young Adult Choir was a highlight of my time at Holy

Name Cathedral, even though it was only once a month. The music and worship were uplifting, and the sense of community among choir members was exceptional. The opportunity to use my talents to praise God alongside fellow young adults was a blessing.

In May, I moved to Cincinnati to work at Dynamic Catholic. There is a definite need for a Young Adult Ministry here, and thanks to my time at Holy Name with Fr. Ton, I know how to get young Catholics excited about the faith. I plan to join the local choir and ask to start a young adult choir, as young people will be eager to join regardless of skill level. I'll help lead the Bible study at my local parish and bring the same intellectual curiosity I gained at Holy Name. Once the time comes, I will start an Exodus 90 group of young men here and adapt it into an ongoing Men's Group.

Overall, the Young Adult Ministry at Holy Name Cathedral provided a supportive and nurturing environment for me to grow in my faith. I am grateful for the friendships I formed and the spiritual growth I experienced in this ministry. I highly recommend it to any young adult seeking a vibrant and engaging community to deepen their relationship with God.

# The Simple Brilliance of Stewardship Living

Today's readings take us back to some basics of stewardship living and demonstrate the genius of this way of life.

Our First Reading, from 2 Kings, shows us the necessity and power of hospitality. It recounts the story of a woman who showed loving hospitality to a visitor, inviting him to dinner with her family and arranging a room for him in their home so that he would have a comfortable place to stay during his travels through her town. She reached out to the man in a simple and practical

manner to make him feel welcome and was rewarded in an extraordinary way.

In our Second Reading, from the Letter to the Romans, St. Paul reminds us of the power of our Baptism and how this sacrament makes us disciples. What does that mean for us here and now? St. Paul tells us very clearly: "You must think of yourselves as dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus." We must live for Christ! Nothing less will do.

Our Lord proclaims this same instruction in a rather shocking way in our Gospel passage from Matthew:



"Whoever finds his life [by living for oneself] will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." But how do we lose our life? Precisely through loving actions towards others, loving them as if they were Christ. "Whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because the little one is a disciple... he will surely not lose his reward."

The simple brilliance of stewardship living — only our infinitely creative and compassionate God could conceive it!



# Cathedral Tours After 8:30, 10:30, 12:30 Masses Today

This Sunday, we have three options for tours of Holy Name Cathedral. Our Docents are excited to share with you the art, architecture and history of the Cathedral.

Every Sunday after the 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.

### What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose.
