

Our summer season is truly upon us. I pray you will find the time to relax and be with family and friends. We all know summer moves much too quickly!

I share a beautiful prayer written by Father James Martin, SJ. Wonderful

words to reflect upon as we continue summer.

A New Serenity Prayer

God, grant me the serenity to accept the people I cannot change, which is pretty much everyone, since I'm clearly not you, God. At least not the last time I checked.

And while you're at it, God, please give me the courage to change what I need to change about myself, which is frankly a lot since, once again, I'm not you, which means I'm not perfect. It's better for me to focus on changing myself than to worry about changing other people, who, as you'll no doubt remember me saying, I can't change anyway.

Finally, give me the wisdom just to shut up whenever I think that I'm clearly smarter than everyone else in the room, that no one knows what they're talking about except me, or that I alone have all the answers.

Basically, God, grant me the wisdom to remember that I'm not you. Amen.

And I close with this beautiful story... please pass it on ...

A woman went shopping with her six-year-old daughter. It was pouring outside. They stood with other shoppers under the awning inside the door. The little girl said, "Mom, let's run through the rain." "What?" Mom asked. "Let's run through the rain," she repeated. "No, honey. We'll wait until it slows down a bit," Mom replied.

Today's readings remind us that human expectations will be overturned by the wonderfully paradoxical reality of God and his kingdom.



The Gospel turns upside down all our conceptions of God and his son, Jesus. This gracious God, Jesus says, hides his wisdom from those who claim to be wise and reveals it to the little ones (Hebrew, *nepioi*, meaning 'infants' or 'unlearned'). They are the ones who are invited to bring their burdens and rest in Jesus. How? By joining themselves to his yoke (a wooden bar placed over the shoulders so two can pull together) and learning what it means to be meek and humble.

God the Father reveals the mysteries of the kingdom to us who are meek and humble of heart. This week find ways to open yourself to the grandeur of faith's mysteries that surround you.

Need a Better Work/Life Balance? Look to St. Benedict

ife is all about balance. We balance work, relationships, personal time, faith, fun and everything else. And certain times in the year, we are confronted with a reality check on how that balance is going. Sometimes we get into arguments with friends or family, and are told we do not make time for them.



Other times we are running on empty due to the demands of life, and we feel almost burnt out. This balance is very delicate and very real.

On Tuesday, July 11, we celebrate the memorial of St. Benedict of Nursia, the father of Western Monasticism. Born into a wealthy Italian family in 480, he left his education in Rome, due to a lack of moral character among his classmates, to find solace in a cave in Subiaco. During this time, he attracted those who were fleeing cities to encounter God in silence, prayer and community. Coincidentally, his twin sister, St. Scholastica (Feb. 10), founded a woman's religious community around the same time.

In his life, Benedict founded 12 monasteries, culminating in one central location, Montecassino, which is still in use today. For centuries, these monastic communities have protected treasures of Western civilization in art, literature and goods. They show us that ordered and productive lives can withstand the crumbling societies around them. today as the Benedictines, have the motto *Ora et Labora* — Work and Pray. The motto serves as a balance to life. Work and Pray. Work in the world, in the fields, in the community, in relationships, and pray to the source of all that is good. Work and Pray is not only for those in religious communities who adopt the Rule of St. Benedict, but can be applied to daily life. How is the balance of my work and my prayer? Is one favored over the other? Is one lacking in attention?

Also attributed to St. Benedict is the St. Benedict medal, a popular sacramental found on rosaries, bracelets and necklaces. Tradition tells us that Benedict was almost poisoned twice, once through a cup of wine and second through a loaf of bread. The raven came and took the bread before he ate it, and as he blessed the wine, the cup shattered. On the front side of the medal, St. Benedict is often depicted with the raven and the cup of wine. On the backside of the medal are the first letters of a series of Latin sentences, translated as: "The Cross of our Holy Father Benedict. May the holy cross be my light! May the devil not be my leader. Be gone, Satan! Do not persuade me of wicked things. What you offer me is evil. Drink your poisons yourself."

The widespread use of the medal has a connection to protecting against evil and many people wear the medal to be guided closer to Jesus and away from sin. St. Benedict is also attributed, along with St. Joseph, as patrons of a happy death. St. Benedict teaches us to work and pray, and through this rule of life, we continue to walk on the journey of discipleship, finding balance in our lives to be with the Lord in the future.

The communities who follow Benedict's Rule, known

Gatherings called Salons opened in bars and homes where experts and artisans were connected with everyday folks to discuss the issues of their time.

Holy Name Cathedral will present its twist on this tradition. Join us at our own Salon, as we explore the new and fascinating ways Catholicism is continuing to contribute to the human endeavor, and bring about the greater glory of God. This series is hosted by James Keene from Holy Name Cathedral's Evangelization group.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus Himself speaks to the Father about the privileged role that humble souls play in God's plan of salvation. "I give praise to you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to little ones."

What does it mean to be a "little one"? It means that we acknowledge we don't have it all figured out, but that we are very much in need of a savior. It means we recognize that all we are and all we have been given is a gift from God. It means we embrace the stewardship way of life.

It is not easy, but deep peace and consolation come with this way of life. Jesus offers these warm and encouraging words to entice us to embrace them. "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light."

Let us resolve to follow in the footsteps of our Savior, embracing the humble path of stewardship. It is the path that leads to peace here and now, and ultimately leads us to heaven.
