Today’s readings highlight the mystery of kindness. Most of us think we know what kindness is so why call it a mystery?



We tend to think of a mystery as something hidden unknowable. But, in the biblical sense, a mystery is something that is hidden until God chooses to reveal it.

In today’s Gospel, Matthew provides parables that talk about the mystery of divine kindness. As is typical of parables, there are twists. The hearers of the first parable probably thought, “That master is not very smart about farming,” because he told his servants to wait until the harvest to separate weeds from the good grain. But the Gospel makes it clear that God does not behave as humans do. Rather, God is people-loving and will act in patience and restraint even to the end of time. God’s strength presents itself to us through loving kindness and forgiveness. We witness this divine strength in our relationships with one another – with those close to us and with strangers.

If Not in the Bible, Then How Do We Know Mary's Parents?

The Church celebrates the Memorial of Saints Anne and Joachim each year on July 26.

We believe they are the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary. And it makes sense that Mary had parents, but interestingly their names are not in the Old or New Testament. This omission leads us to the question of where we got their names. And the answer is Pious Tradition.

Logically speaking, Mary had to have had parents for her to be human. She had to come from someone, just as Jesus came from someone. That is why, as we profess, Jesus was born of the Virgin Mary and became man. Jesus is a divine person, the second person of the Trinity, who possesses two natures: human and divine. It was human nature that Jesus redeemed through his passion, death, and resurrection. As St. Athanasius said: "What is not assumed is not redeemed." Human nature begets human nature. He received His human nature from Mary, a human person with a human nature.

So where do we get the belief of Mary's parents? Unknown to many, the Church acknowledges apocryphal writings. These writings are books circulated and believed in various communities, although their authentic authorship is disputed. There are more books in the Catholic Bible than in the Protestant Bible because, during the Protestant Reformation in the 1500s, Reformation leaders questioned the authorship of some of the books in the Old Testament. Even the Jewish faith has differing books in its collection of Scripture. But just because the Church acknowledges these writings does not mean the Church endorses them to be valid and necessary for belief.

The life of Mary, including her birth, is included in the apocryphal writings of the infancy gospel of James, also known as the Protoevangelium of James. In this writing, we hear Mary's parents Joachim and Anne were childless, and an angel appears to each of them, saying they will



conceive a child whose name will be known throughout the generations. The conception of Mary in her mother's womb, we celebrate on Dec. 8 — the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. Nine months before her nativity (Sept. 8), this event reminds us that she was saved from the stain of original sin and therefore was a pure vessel to carry our Savior in her womb, allowing Jesus to become like us in all things but sin.

Also, in this apocryphal writing, we have grounding for the Feast of the Presentation of Mary, celebrated on Nov. 21. Mary was presented in the Temple at three years old and dedicated to a virgin life. So though not formally recognized as divinely inspired by God to be included in the approved canon of books included in our Bible, the Apocryphal writings have inspired our faith life. Even in the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom, the liturgical text used by many of our Eastern Catholic brothers and sisters, they invoke the intercession of Joachim and Anne at the end of each liturgy.

With all this background, we celebrate Saints Anne and Joachim each year on July 26, regarded as patron saints of grandparents. Regardless of the conception and upbringing of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we know she had parents who passed on the faith to her, allowing her to be receptive to the Angel Gabriel as he announced God's plan of salvation to her. As we celebrate Anne and Joachim, let us also thank God for our grandparents, who passed on the faith to us, allowing us to know God's goodness through their witness.

MOST REV. JOHN R. MANZ • 1945-2023

“Let Us Remember Our Beloved ‘Padre Juan’”

Most Rev. John R. Manz, auxiliary bishop emeritus for the Archdiocese of Chicago and former pastor of St. Agnes of Bohemia Parish, passed away Friday, July 14, 2023. He was 77 years old.

Manz was born on Nov. 14, 1945 in Chicago to Jeanne and Joseph Manz. He grew up in Chicago and Morton Grove. He attended Quigley Preparatory Seminary, Niles College Seminary and the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary in Mundelein. He began learning Spanish by working in the kitchen with religious sisters from Mexico and with landscaping crews in the summer. Later, he studied Spanish in college and became fluent. In the process he came to appreciate and revere the Hispanic people and their culture. His experience in agriculture led him to work in support of Mexican farm workers.

Manz was ordained to the priesthood on May 12, 1971, by Cardinal John Cody, and he celebrated his first Mass four days later at St. Martha Parish in Morton Grove. A nun who had told the mischievous young John that she would “roll over in her grave if he ever became a priest” attended his first Mass.

After ordination to the priesthood, Manz served as assistant pastor at Providence of God Parish, as associate pastor at St. Roman Parish and as pastor at St. Agnes of Bohemia where he served for 13 years. On Jan. 23, 1996, Manz was appointed as an auxiliary bishop by Pope John Paul II.

In an interview with Chicago Catòlico newspaper, Manz

traced his involvement with Hispanic immigrants to his assignment, at 25 years old, to Providence of God Parish where he started his work as an advocate for immigrant rights. “My first parish [Providence of God] was in the Pilsen neighborhood, on 18th Street. It's not there anymore. I was there for seven years. Back then, it was a poor area. I became very fond of that parish.”

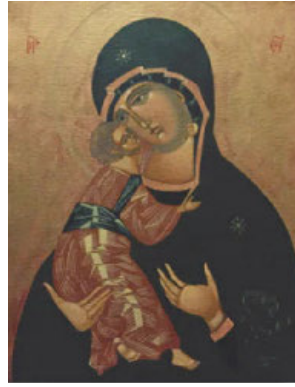
Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, archbishop of Chicago, said that “from his days as a college seminarian, Bishop John Manz grasped the meaning of authentic ministry. ‘It is not an abstraction, it begins by getting to know people. We all have our prejudices or stereotypes, but the only way to break them down is by getting to know the person. I am a big believer in a common humanity.’ Let us pray that all those preparing for ministry will

take those words to heart and in that way keep fresh the memory of this great priest and pastor.”

“Let us remember our beloved ‘Padre Juan.’” Cardinal Cupich continued with words Manz shared in an interview with Chicago Catholic newspaper on his retirement, “I feel very fortunate. I have had many experiences; I have never been bored and I think it is because I like people. As a priest, I believe I have received more than I have given.”

Manz is survived by his sister Linda Manz, of Richmond, Va., nieces Cara Haynie of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Diane Smith, Angela Heffner and Christina Hultgren of Richmond, Va., great nieces and nephews, and many relatives and close friends.
