Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

August is upon us, and summer is moving much too quickly. We must realize that every day is a gift from God as our lives also move too fast. Where have the years flown?

A.J. Picard puts a beautiful perspective on this gift called life.

Every minute someone leaves this world behind.
We are all in “the line” without knowing it.
We never know how many people are before us.
We cannot move to the back of the line.
We cannot step out of the line.
We cannot avoid the line.

So while we wait in line...

Make moments count.
Make priorities.
Make the time.
Make your own gifts known.
Make a nobody feel like a somebody.
Make your voice heard.
Make the small things big.
Make someone smile.
Make the change.
Make love.
Make peace.
Make up.
Make sure to tell people they are loved.
Make sure to have no regrets.

At the same time, we must always be willing to reach out and heal a broken and hurting world. We need to love this world back into life. Author and lecturer Leo Buscaglia once discussed a contest he was asked to judge. The purpose of the competition was to find the most caring child. The winner was a four-year-old child whose next-door neighbor was an elderly gentleman who had recently lost his wife. Upon seeing the man cry, the little boy went into the old gentleman's yard, climbed onto his lap, and just sat there. When his mother asked what he had said to the neighbor, the little boy said, “Nothing. I just helped him cry.”

And Fr. Pedro Arrupe, S.J. shares a perspective that should be at the heart of the behavior:

Nothing is more practical than
finding God, than
falling in love
in a quite absolute, final way.
What are you in love with,
what seizes your imagination
will affect everything.
It will decide
what will get you out of bed in the morning,
what you do with your evenings,
how do you spend your weekends,
what you read,
what breaks your heart,
and what amazes you with joy and gratitude.
Fall in love.

Stay in love, and it will decide everything.

And on a lighter note...

There is a story about a priest who was upset with the man who lived across the street from the church. The man was Catholic, but he never went to church. As the priest entered and left the church each morning, the man was outside cutting his grass, weeding, or watering his flowers. But the man never walked a couple hundred feet across the street to attend mass. Every so often, the priest gave the man a special invitation, but the best he ever got in return was a smile or a wave of the hand.

Finally, for whatever reason, the man told the priest that he would be coming to church the following Sunday. So, the priest spent a lot of extra time working on his homily to make sure the man would be deeply touched so that he would come back every Sunday from then on.

A week after the man's church visit, the priest saw him watering his grass. He went over and asked him what he thought about the mass. “Well, Father, I'll say this about your Sunday homily...It kept me awake most of the night.” The priest was thrilled and beamed as he said, “I'm glad my words so inspired you to come to church regularly.” “Oh, it wasn't that, Father,” said the man. “When I nap in the daytime, I can't sleep that night!”

"The Transfiguration," by Francisco Labarta, St. Therese of the Child Jesus, Barcelona

Jesus' transfiguration impels us to transform the world by letting our faces shine like the Son and by shining the Light of Christ on others.



Every year on Aug. 6, the church takes a break from the normal cycle of readings to reflect on Jesus' transfiguration. Each Gospel tells of this event or alludes to it, but its meaning for Jesus' mission and our own discipleship remains a mystery. This year, the transfiguration account comes from the Gospel of Matthew, who understands it as a moment of new awareness. The disciples came to see Jesus as God saw him.

The disciples realized that Jesus was the Messiah but struggled to understand what that meant. What God showed Peter, James, and John on the mountain revealed Jesus as God's beloved Son whose teaching and example they should follow without fear. Jesus' transfiguration reveals to his disciples that he is that being. A cloud surrounds him, his face and clothing glow, and God reveals a Father's love.

Answering Frequently Asked Questions on the Eucharist

Among Catholics, we are known for the many rules we have. No meat on Fridays during Lent.

Fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Go to Mass on the five Holy Days of Obligation throughout the year and every Sunday. But we have some rules that need to be known or understood. And two rules have been asked of me frequently over the summer months, and now is an excellent time to clear the air. Both rules are associated with Holy Communion.

The first question is about the Eucharistic Fast. The Code of Canon Law, the official text regarding Church Law for Roman Catholics, says, “A person who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain for at least one hour before Holy Communion from any food and drink, except for only water and medicine.” (Can. 919 § 1).

This law has been through a few changes. In 1957, Pope Pius XII changed the law, which required Catholics to fast from Midnight to when they received Communion in the morning to only three hours before. I can see why early Masses were so popular. So from 1957 to 1964, the requirement was to fast three hours before receiving Holy Communion. Then in 1964, St. Pope Paul VI, during the Second Vatican, changed the law to what it is currently, one hour before the reception of Holy Communion. The law does not say to fast an hour from the start of Mass; instead, to fast an hour from the reception of Holy Communion.

So now we ask, why do we need to fast? Because we are receiving the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ. Fasting is a spiritual practice we undertake throughout Lent to prepare ourselves for the glorious victories over the grave of Jesus our Lord, who shares that victory with us through baptism. So fasting before the reception of the Eucharist is an act of spiritual preparation and reverence for the Sacrament, making our



bodies and minds aware of the mysteries we are about to encounter.

This answer leads us to the second question: how many times can I receive Communion in one day? The Code of Canon Law says, “A person who has already received the Most Holy Eucharist can receive it a second time on the same day only within the Eucharistic celebration in which the person participates” (Can 917).

So short answer, anyone may receive Holy Communion two separate times in a day, with the second reception in the context of a Mass. Though not explicit, the Latin word ‘*interum*’ used in the canon means a second time and not again and again. The answer to this second question invites us to realize what happens when we receive the Eucharist. This law allows us not to assume that the more we receive Communion, the holier we become. The law reminds us of the Eucharist’s gift and not an entitlement that some associate with the reception of the Holy Eucharist.

When we extend our hand, we receive the host, which contains Jesus of Nazareth. And so, we fast to call to mind that incredible gift we are receiving in the Eucharist — the gift of eternal life and food for the journey. And then we limit ourselves to receiving only twice a day to not take for granted that gift. We allow the grace that comes from the Eucharist to begin to change us from within. This is what our Eucharistic Revival is all about, allowing us to change through this encounter with the Lord in the Eucharist. As St. Augustine says, we continue to see what we believe in and become what we receive.

Msgr. Bernard J. Quinn (1888-1940) was the founding pastor of St. Peter Claver Church, the first parish established for Black Catholics in the Diocese of Brooklyn in 1922. Later, in 1932, he opened the Church of St. Benedict the Moor in Jamaica, New York. Msgr. Quinn also founded Little Flower House of Providence Orphanage, which the Ku Klux Klan torched. In response,

Quinn rebuilt a fireproof building. In 2008, the Diocese of Brooklyn opened a “canonical inquiry” into the cause of sainthood for Msgr. Bernard J. Quinn. Later that year, he was declared “Servant of God” by the Congregation of the Causes of Saints. Join us for a discussion on Fr. Quinn, led by Dr. Eileen Quinn Knight, niece of this advocate for justice. We will meet in the Club Room. No registration is needed.

On Mother Teresa: “I Am a Little Pencil in God’s Hands”

What should we do when we feel discouraged and not at our best self? What is the purpose of life? Or when we are doubting God’s existence? The secular advice might be to drink a few glasses of beer or devour tons of delicious food. But what would happen after having that kind of “delightful moment”? One feels dizzy or guilty and exercises to burn off those consumed calories.



A better way to face those down moments is to read stories of the saints. Mother Teresa of Calcutta (1910-1997) left her home at 18 to join the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Ireland to be a religious sister. She was assigned to teach Mary’s School for Girls. She loved the Lord and her vocation. Suddenly, in 1946, she heard Jesus whispering, “I thirst,” while she was on a train from Calcutta to Darjeeling for her annual retreat. Later on, Mother Teresa knew that Jesus wanted her to care for the poor, the neglected in poor villages. She then devoted her life to serving the poorest of the poor.

We might have thought this saintly woman was always

filled with God’s joy and consolation. In reality, Mother Teresa wrote, “In my soul, I feel just that terrible pain of loss — of God not wanting me — of God not being God — of God not really existing.” What??!! And this struggle/dry prayer life/night of the soul lasted more than 40 years. Yet Mother Teresa persevered with her solid prayer life, received sacraments frequently, did holy hours, served the poor, and loved the Lord and her vocation.

I end this article with two of her beautiful quotes:

- “I am a little pencil in God’s hands. He does the thinking. He does the writing. He does everything, and sometimes it is really hard because it is a broken pencil, and He has to sharpen it a little more.”
- “I am a little pencil in the hand of a writing God who is sending a love letter to the world.”

Friends, we only have a specific number of years to live on earth; how many love letters do we allow the Lord to write through us? As many young people attend the World Youth Day in Lisbon, Portugal, we pray for them through the intersection of St. Teresa of Calcutta, the patron saint for the WYD. JMJ. I love being a priest!

Join Our Ministry of Care

Serving Our Local Hospitals And Homebound

Ministry of Care to the sick is a pastoral ministry of caring for those who are hospitalized, in nursing homes, hospice, or confined to private homes. This ministry is provided by lay men and women, deacons, religious sisters and brothers and priests. Ministers of Care are trained and formed to conduct pastoral visits with time to listen and pray about the concerns of the sick or shut-in person and to share Eucharist with them. Each minister must complete 10 hours of training. Holy Name is blessed to have a cadre of priests and deacons who collaborate with Lori Doyle, Director of Service Ministries, to design and deliver the training. Our training is primarily an in-person training with opportunities to practice patient interactions over two Saturdays in the Fall of 2023 (dates TBA).

This year, our drive will focus on preschool through 8th-grade children. We are supporting the children of The Academy of St. Benedict the African, located at 6020 S Laflin Avenue in West Englewood, and the migrant children residing right in our neighborhood at the Inn of Chicago in Streeterville. Teachers work hard to create a warm and inviting environment for their students. The difficulty is that many teachers do not have the resources to decorate, let alone provide the basic tools and supplies their students need to be successful in the classroom. Giving Back to Others

Every day, we can listen to Jesus and reflect on all that He has given us. While doing so, we can think of how we can give back to others for all He has provided for us. One way to do that is to support the mission and ministries of Holy Name Cathedral with a gift from your individual retirement plan (IRA) that benefits you and our parish. A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) allows individuals age 70½ or older to authorize their IRA administrator to make a direct transfer of funds from their IRA to qualified charities, tax-free.

There are three main benefits of giving with a QCD:

1. If you are 72 years old or older, the amount you transfer can satisfy all or part of your required minimum distribution.
2. The amount transferred directly to charity does not generate taxable income, which may reduce your annual income level. This may help lower your Medicare premiums and decrease the amount of Social Security that is subject to tax.
3. Your gift will be immediately used, allowing you to see the impact of your gift now.
