Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

"Desiderata" is an early 1920s prose poem by the American writer Max Ehrmann. In the 1960s and 1970s, the poem's text was widely distributed in poster form. I first discovered this poem while a young seminarian at Niles College Seminary of Loyola

University in the early 1970s. I read it often and reflected upon its meaning. Though about 100 years old, it is still relevant today. By the way, '*desiderata*' means 'things that are desired.' Enjoy and pass it on ...

Desiderata

Go placidly amid the noise and the haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence. As far as possible, without surrender, be on good terms with all persons.

Speak your truth quietly and clearly; and listen to others, even the dull and ignorant; they too have their story.

Avoid loud and aggressive persons; they are vexations to the spirit. If you compare yourself with others, you may become vain and bitter; for always there will be greater and lesser persons than yourself.

Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs; for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals; and everywhere life is full of heroism.

Be yourself. Especially do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment, it is perennial as the grass.

Take kindly the counsel of the years, gracefully surrendering the things of youth.

Nurture strength of spirit to shield you in sudden misfortune. But do not distress yourself with imaginings. Many fears are born of fatigue and loneliness.

Beyond a wholesome discipline, be gentle with yourself. You are a child of the universe, no less than the trees and the stars; you have a right to be here.

And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should. Therefore, be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be. And whatever your labors and aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace with your soul. With all its sham, drudgery, and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be careful. Strive to be happy.

Catholic Illuminations

Like the Immaculate Conception? Thank Papal Infallibility

ne of the main differences that sets Catholics apart from our Protestant and Orthodox brothers and sisters is understanding the Papacy. Papal supremacy is held by Catholics but not by Protestants or Orthodox. To the Protestants, there is no need for a pope, and for Orthodox, they view the Pope as an equal to



other leaders of their local churches and not, as Catholics believe, "first among equals." And an added layer to the Papacy is the notion of papal infallibility, which is accepted only by Catholics as well. Papal supremacy can be traced to Matthew's Gospel, where Jesus says to Peter: "Upon this rock, he will build his church and will give him the keys to the kingdom of heaven and will have power to bind and loose in heaven and on earth." (Matthew 16:18-19)

Pope Pius IX called the First Vatican Council (1869-1870) to address the issues presented to the Church in the 19th century, rationalism, liberalism, and materialism. The Council, cut short due to the Capture of Rome in 1870, which was the final movement of capturing the Papal States and unifying the Italian peninsula as the Kingdom of Italy, with Rome being the new capital. Vatican I is known for the short length of the Council but also for the declaration of Papal infallibility, reserved for the Pope when he speaks about faith and morals ex cathedra, or from the chair, to be free from error on doctrine. Papal Infallibility does not mean everything the Pope makes an official pronouncement on faith and morals as definitive doctrine, it must be accepted by the faithful.

Since the declaration of Papal Infallibility in 1870, there have only been two times that the Pope exercised this authority. The first example, the proclamation of the Doctrine of the Immaculate Conception by Pope Pius IX, was grandfathered in since this pronouncement was made in 1854. This fundamental belief is that Mary was conceived without original sin and celebrated every year on Dec. 8. The second example of papal infallibility is from 1950; Pope Pius XII issued an Apostolic Constitution on November 1 entitled "Munificentissmus Deus" meaning "The most bountiful God" where the Holy Father laid out the doctrine of the Assumption of Mary. The most important lines in the text were: "By the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory."

Since this proclamation, the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we celebrate on Aug. 15, a Holy Day of Obligation. We honor Mary completing her earthly journey and being assumed, body and soul, into heaven, the reality promised to each of us in baptism on the Last Day. Due to the Holy Day, masses will be offered on Monday, August 14, at 5:15pm for the Vigil of the Assumption, and Tuesday, Aug. 15, at 7:00am, 8:00am, 12:00pm and 5:15pm. Please join us as we glorify God for his goodness and honor the Blessed Mother on this sacred day.

Amid the Hustle, Don't Forget to Stop and Give Thanks to God

s a child, I didn't like gardening because I associated it with hard work. Helping the family do farming chores on top of schoolwork felt like too much work. However, now working with our faithful gardening volunteers, it is very relaxing. Have you ever experienced running from one thing to another



without pausing to see the beauty of the fruit of your labor? Or perhaps you suddenly stop, and a moment of grace fills you with a joyful surprise? One day, volunteers and I were running around the Courtyard trying to get the tasks done before a wedding Mass. I noticed the hydrangeas were blooming beautifully. The flowers were savoring the morning sun and enjoying a calming breeze.

Moreover, there were little butterflies admiring the beautiful flowers. It was a quiet reminder to slow down and focus more on the present moments. Friends, it does take time for the hydrangeas to grow and bear beautiful flowers. And all this has been in the mind of the Lord.

I invite you to reflect upon an excellent excerpt from "The Soul of The Apostle" by Dom Jean-Baptiste Chautard. "My activities are so crushing that they ruin my health, disturb my piety, and teach me nothing new. I have got to control them. God has given me the grace to recognize that the big obstacle to acquiring a peaceful and fruitful interior life is my natural activity and my tendency to be carried away by my work. And I have recognized, besides, that this lack of interior life is the source of all my faults, all my troubles, my dryness, my fits of disgust, and my bad health."

Then, the author gave two suggestions to himself. We can benefit from learning about them from him.

"#1: I will always take more time than is necessary to do everything. This approach is the way to avoid being in a hurry and getting excited. #2: I invariably have more things to do than time to do them, and this prospect preoccupies me and gets me worked up. However, I will stop thinking about all I must do and only consider the time at my disposal. I will use that time without losing a moment of it, beginning with the most essential duties. And I shall be okay with the other items that may or may not get done."

Summer is halfway over. I hope and pray that we are not overwhelming ourselves with activities and forgetting to pay attention to our interior desire, our primary focus in life — to give God praise and thanks for the marvelous works that He has done in our lives. I love being a priest. JMJ

Filling Your Spiritual Backpack on the Life of Msgr. Bernard J. Quinn

Msgr. Bernard J. Quinn (1888-1940) was the founding pastor of St. Peter Claver Church, the first parish



established for Black Catholics in the Diocese of Brooklyn in 1922. Later, in 1932, he opened the Church of St. Benedict the Moor in Jamaica, New York.

Msgr. Quinn also founded Little Flower House of Providence Orphanage, which the Ku Klux Klan torched. In response, Quinn rebuilt a fireproof building.

In 2008, the Diocese of Brooklyn

opened a "canonical inquiry" into the cause of sainthood for Msgr. Bernard J. Quinn. Later that year, he was declared "Servant of God' by the Congregation of the Causes of Saints.

Join Our Ministry of Care, Serve in Local Hospitals and to the Homebound

Ministry of Care to the sick is a pastoral ministry of caring for those who are hospitalized, in nursing homes, hospice, or confined to private homes. This ministry is provided by lay men and women, deacons, religious sisters and brothers and priests. Ministers of Care are trained and formed to conduct pastoral visits with time to listen and pray about the concerns of the sick or shut-in person and to share Eucharist with them.

Ministry of Care to the Sick is a service offered to people at vulnerable and painful times in their lives. The person who cares for the sick and shut-in needs to have specific qualities and gifts, including a listening presence, compassion and empathy, a non-judgmental mindset, confidentiality, commitment and follow-through, prayerfulness, a gentle demeanor and commitment to continuous training and spiritual development.

Each minister must complete 10 hours of training. Holy Name is blessed to have a cadre of priests and deacons who collaborate with Lori Doyle, Director of



Service Ministries, to design and deliver the training. Our training is primarily an in-person training with opportunities to practice patient interactions over two Saturdays in the Fall of 2023 (dates TBA).

Stewardship Reflection Keep Your Eyes on Christ

Stewardship spirituality invites us to surrender control of our lives to God in grateful recognition that all that we have is a gift from Him.

While today's readings remind us that, of course, God is always in control of His creation and His creatures, they illustrate what amazing things can happen when we fully permit God



to take charge of our lives — in other words, what can happen when we embrace the stewardship way of life.

When we take our eyes off God, we fail to see that all is a gift from Him, we lose trust in Him and we do not make our lives a grateful response to Him.

Peter makes this mistake in our Gospel passage from Matthew. Jesus sends the disciples in a boat ahead of Him to the other side of the shore. Later that evening, Jesus casually strolls up to the boat, walking on the sea. He invites Peter to join Him. As Peter begins to walk on the water, he momentarily takes his eyes off Jesus to notice the strong wind surrounding them. With that, he sinks.

But what if Peter had not taken his eyes off Christ? What a grand adventure he could have had out there walking on the sea with Jesus! When we take our eyes off Christ, the many blessings He has given us, and the loving way He treats us, we sink, too.

But when we embrace the stewardship way of life, letting go of a tight hold over our money, time, and talents, our lives become a grand adventure, rooted firmly and gratefully in the God Who always cares for us.
