Dear People of God,

Hay fever season is upon us! Keep reading ...

The Sneeze

They walked in tandem, each of the 92 students filing into the already crowded auditorium. With their rich

maroon gowns flowing and the traditional caps, they looked almost as grown up as they felt.

Dads swallowed hard behind broad smiles, and Moms freely brushed away tears.

This class would NOT pray during the commencements because of a recent ruling prohibiting it. The principal and several students were careful to stay within the guidelines allowed by the order.

They gave inspirational speeches, but no one mentioned divine guidance, and no one asked for blessings on the graduates or their families. The speeches were nice but routine until the final speech received a standing ovation.

A student walked up to the microphone. He stood still and silent for a moment, and then, it happened ... one of the 92 students, suddenly SNEEZED. The student on stage looked at the audience and said, 'GOD BLESS YOU!' and walked off the stage.

The audience exploded into applause. This graduating class had found a unique way to invoke God's blessing on their future with or without the ruling.

I genuinely admire how this graduating class stuck together most creatively! We must connect the mystery of God with the mystery of our lives and stick together. God is within us, and we never have to walk alone ... Keep reading. ...

Duke University did a study on "peace of mind." Factors found to contribute significantly to emotional and mental stability are:

• The absence of suspicion and resentment. Nursing a grudge was a major factor in unhappiness.

• Not living in the past. An unwholesome preoccupation with old mistakes and failures leads to depression.

• Not wasting time and energy fighting conditions you cannot change. Cooperate with life instead of trying to

run away from it.

• Forcing yourself to stay involved with the living world. Resist the temptation to withdraw and become reclusive during periods of emotional stress.

• Refuse to indulge in self-pity when life hands you a raw deal. Accept the fact that nobody gets through life without some sorrow and misfortune.

• Cultivate the old-fashioned virtues -- love, humor, compassion, and loyalty.

• Do not expect too much of yourself. When there is too broad a gap between self-expectation and your ability to meet your goals, feelings of inadequacy are inevitable.

• Find something bigger than yourself to believe in. Self-centered, egotistical people score lowest in any test for measuring happiness.

Great food for thought, and the last point leads beautifully to how our lives should be conducted as followers of Jesus Christ...Enjoy the following...

One day a pig and a cow had a deep conversation. The pig complained to the cow that nobody had a kind word to say about him. "Look at the way I give of myself," he said. "I produce bacon, ham, and pork chops. The bristles of my skin are used for brushes, my hide for luggage.

"The Delivery of the Keys to Saint Peter" by Pietro Perugino in Sistine Chapel. Vatican City.

In Galilee, a few miles from the present border between Lebanon and Svria is a place called Caesarea Philippi in Jesus' day.



Here, dwarfed by a huge rock cavern and temples, Jesus asks his Disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" They answer, evoking the haunting memory of John the Baptist, the passionate preaching of Jeremiah, and the legendary expectation of Elijah. Then comes Jesus' direct question: "But who do you say that I am?"

After the storm, the Disciples paid homage to Him and confessed him as the Son of God. Here all the confessional attention is fixed on Peter. He confesses more than he himself understands about the identity of Jesus. But now Jesus is going to tell him how the identity and mission of both are linked. Jesus pronounces a blessing over Peter because God's revelation gives him a new name and new mission. His as the 'rock' on which Jesus' church would be built is a wordplay between the Greek name, Petros (Peter) and petra (rock). Source: Living Liturgy 2023

Feel Adrift or Burdened in Life? Look to St. Augustine

very baptized Catholic is called to holiness. This is one of the foundational beliefs from the Second Vatican Council document *Lumen Gentium*, the dogmatic Constitution of the Church. It says that everyone is called to be a saint, no matter their vocational state or role in society. And in our Catholic tradition,



we have a lot of saints. The total number of saints is unknown because everyone enjoying the beatific vision of God in heaven is a saint. The Church recognizes over 10,000 saints, formally declared through canonization, each with a feast day. All Saints Day, on Nov. 1, a holy day of obligation, is the universal day to thank God for the lives of all the saints, known and unknown, in the life of the Church.

But nobody is born a saint. Every saint had their journey to holiness, with struggles, success, doubt and faith. St. Augustine, one of our greatest theologians, once said, "Every saint has a past, and every sinner has a future." And if you know his story, he was speaking from experience. His mother, St. Monica, prayed for Augustine's daily conversion for more than 10 years. As a child and as he grew into adulthood, Augustine would go from philosophical school to philosophical school in search of answers and from one relationship to another with different women. He was restless until he found Jesus Christ through the preaching of St. Ambrose, Archbishop of Milan. Augustine famously said, "Our hearts are restless until they rest in thee, O God."

Before his conversion, Augustine fathered a child out of wedlock named Adeodatus, which means "Given by God," and would tragically die when he was 18 years old. Augustine was baptized by St. Ambrose in 387, along with his son and a small group of friends. From his baptism to his death in 430, he would become a leader in rhetoric and thought in Western Christianity, writing on many topics such as grace, sacraments, and sin.

Augustine would eventually write his autobiography, *The Confessions*, one of the greatest works of Western literature. It is one of those timeless books you can read repeatedly and get a new insight each time. If you want a new book to read, buy a copy of Augustine's *The Confessions*.

Augustine teaches us that God continually seeks after us but does not force his love upon us. He was given the title Doctor of the Church and his feast is celebrated on Aug. 28, with his mother, St. Monica, celebrated on Aug. 27. May we look to Augustine as we continue our journeys of holiness and discipleship and not be weighed down by our faults but rise to the heights of heaven through God's grace and love.

Join Our Ministry of Care, Serve in Local Hospitals and to the Homebound

Ministry of Care to the sick is a pastoral ministry of caring for those who are hospitalized, in nursing homes, hospice, or confined to private homes. This ministry is provided by lay men and women, deacons, religious sisters and brothers and priests. Ministers of Care are trained and formed to conduct pastoral visits with time to listen and pray about the concerns of the sick or shut-in person and to share Eucharist with them.

Ministry of Care to the Sick is a service offered to people at vulnerable and painful times in their lives. The person who cares for the sick and shut-in needs to have specific qualities and gifts, including a listening presence, compassion and empathy, a non-judgmental mindset, confidentiality, commitment and follow-through, prayerfulness, a gentle demeanor and commitment to continuous training and spiritual development.

Each minister must complete 10 hours of training. Holy Name is blessed to have a cadre of priests and deacons who collaborate with Lori Doyle, Director of

Service Ministries, to design and deliver the training. Our training is primarily an in-person training with opportunities to practice patient interactions over two Saturdays in the Fall of 2023 (dates TBA).


