

The three things Jesus says in today's Gospel are all about the Church. The first thing is about the authority of the Church to mediate disputes.



Step one: "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone..." Step two is the secular public, beginning with the smallest number: "If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, so that 'every fact may be established on the testimony of two or three witnesses." That is the Old Testament formula for fairness and truth in the simplest court cases. Step three is ecclesiastical courts. "And if he refuses to listen to them, tell the church. If he refuses to listen even to the church, then treat him as you would a Gentile or tax collector. That is called excommunication. Notice that when Jesus uses the word "even," he implies that the Church is the highest authority of all.

Pray to the Blessed Mother and Remember Her Sorrows

evotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary has been a pillar of our Tradition from the early Christian communities. In our Tradition, many titles, devotions, and feast days are associated with the Blessed Mother. They range from First Saturday devotions, the Rosary, Holy Days of Obligation such



as the Immaculate Conception and the Assumption, to the various titles – Cause of Our Joy, Queen of Martyrs, Mother of Good Counsel, to name a few, all dealing with the Blessed Mother.

And it is necessary again to reiterate that we, as Catholics, do not worship Mary as we worship God. Instead, we seek her intercession. We pray through and with her, for she is the model of Christian discipleship who we profess is in Heaven, praying for us to her Son, Jesus Christ.

We often think of Mary, the Mother of Jesus, as a pure, angelic person who always leads us deeper into our faith. And often, we fail to remember that even Mary had sorrows in her life. Annually, on Sept. 15, we celebrate the Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows.

Devotion to Mary as Our Lady of Sorrows began around 1232 with the creation of the Servite Order in Tuscany, which developed devotions surrounding the Sorrows of Mary.

And according to Tradition, Mary had seven sorrows. The Seven Sorrows of Mary are:

- 1. The Prophecy of Simeon
- 2. The Flight into Egypt
- 3. The Loss of the Child Jesus in the Temple

4. Meeting Jesus on his way to Calvary

- 5. The Crucifixion
- 6. Jesus being taken down from the Cross
- 7. The Burial of Jesus in the Tomb

These sorrows of Mary are unique to her life and are different than the Five Sorrowful mysteries of the Rosary, which focus on the life of Jesus.

In popular art around Our Lady of Sorrows, Mary is depicted with either one or seven swords about the first sorrow, the prophecy of Simeon during the Presentation in the Temple where he said, "and you yourself a sword will pierce" (Luke 2:35). The seven swords go through her heart, symbolizing the pain associated with each of the sorrows.

Liturgically speaking, the feast began to develop in 1668

when the Servites petitioned Rome for a Feast of the Seven Sorrows of Mary. The petition was granted and celebrated on the third Sunday of September, but only for the Servites. Pope Pius VIII added it to the General Calendar in 1814. The liturgical reforms of St. Pope Pius X in 1913 moved it to Sept. 15, the day after the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, celebrated on Sept. 14.

Every part of our liturgy, all that we do, points to a deeper reality. The gradual process of creating the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows shows us that our life as Christians can be challenging and not always joyful. There is sorrow, there is pain. But as Mary shows us again as the

discipleship model, we must endure the sufferings for the joy to come that lasts for eternity. This Friday, as we remember the Seven Sorrows of Mary, let us ask her for her guidance and intercession that whatever sword is piercing our heart, we know it is only temporary, for the glory of God is for eternity.

Filling Your Spiritual Backpack: Sr. Thea Bowman

Sunday, Sept. 17, after the 5:15pm Mass, in the Parish Center Club Room

Born Dec. 29, 1937, in Mississippi, Sr. Thea Bowman became Catholic at age nine and entered the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration at age 15. Sr. Thea began a unique ministry of breaking down racial and cultural barriers through lively gatherings that combined singing, gospel preaching, prayer, and storytelling, rooted in African-American Catholicism. She died in 1990 after a six-year fight with breast cancer. The U.S. Bishops endorsed the sainthood cause for Sr. Thea, and was granted the first step of the process by the Vatican. This "Filling Your Spiritual Backpack" session will be facilitated by David Thompson, catechist, who is from the same area as Sr. Thea in Mississippi.

The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life, and Church regulations call us to hold it in the highest honor and give it the greatest care. In the coming months, Holy Name Cathedral will dedicate a new tabernacle as the sacred dwelling place for



the Blessed Sacrament. As we dedicate a new tabernacle, we will also purchase new ciboria. The ciborium is the sacred vessel used for distributing Holy Communion and reserving the consecrated hosts in the tabernacle. Holy Name Cathedral's new ciboria will be gold-plated and available for engraving.

Fourteen (14) new ciboria will be available for engraving for use at daily and weekend Cathedral Masses, as well as all highly attended Cathedral Masses, including Holy Thursday, Easter, Christmas, the Chrism Mass, and Ordination Masses.

be invited to a special blessing to see the engraving and present it during the Mass.






Come to Holy Name's Annual Tolton Tea


What is a Mass Intention?
