between persons. The parable of the unforgiving servant reminds us that we should do for one another what God has done for us. Today's readings from Sirach and from the Psalms also remind us that God is forgiving and does not judge or repay us with anger. We need to remember, be grateful, and be gracious to one another.

God's mercy and forgiveness is the opposite of wrath and anger. It is the epitome of justice, not injustice. We do not earn it; rather, we receive God's mercy freely given. When we hang on to wrath and anger because of wounds - however deep they are - we withhold forgiveness. Refusing mercy to those who harm us can leave us unable to accept forgiveness for our own. Sometimes, letting go of wrath and anger entails forgiving ourselves as compassionately as God forgives us. This will leave us free to forgive others. Source: The Almanac for Pastoral Liturgy

Celebrate Marriage, a Visible Expression of Christ's Love

oly Name Cathedral hosts many special liturgies throughout the year for the entire Archdiocese, gathering the faithful to celebrate and honor various aspects of our faith journey. This weekend, the Cathedral will host the annual Golden Wedding Anniversary Mass for couples married in 1973, where they will renew their wedding vows.



Holy Matrimony is one of the Church's seven Sacraments, often paired with Holy Orders under the term "Sacrament of Service/Vocation." Of the seven Sacraments, Marriage is the only one where an ordained clergyman is not the ordinary minister of the Sacrament. In the other six Sacraments: Baptism, Eucharist, Confirmation, Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick, and Holy Orders for a deacon, priest, or bishop is the ordinary minister. But in marriage, the bride and groom are the ordinary ministers (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1623). The deacon, priest, or bishop celebrating the wedding is merely a witness for legal purposes (here in the United States, the clergyman is the witness for both secular and religious).

According to the Catechism, the ends of marriage, meaning the purpose of marriage, are unity, openness to children and indissolubility (CCC 1664). One could add another goal to marriage, the end of any vocation: holiness. As husband and wife, as the ministers of the Sacrament who give of themselves totally and ultimately to the other and their children, if children result from their married life, they are meant to help each other get to heaven while striving for heaven themselves.

It makes sense then that in marriage, the husband and wife are the ministers because they are the ones who promise to be faithful to each other, in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love and honor each other all the days of their life. It is not the priest making these promises; it is not the community gathered who raised these two individuals. The bride and groom are making the promise to give of themselves to their spouse and potential future children and the world through their married life together. And through this self-gift, pave the way for holiness for each other and the world by this witness.

Marriage then becomes a visible expression of the love Christ has for the Church, giving his life for her salvation as he hung upon the cross and shed his blood. Married love is meant to be life-giving in whatever form possible. No marriage is without bumps in the road, but looking to Jesus and emulating Jesus in married life can all be conquered with love.

We join in congratulating the couples of the Archdiocese who celebrate 50 years of marriage this weekend as they gather for this Eucharistic celebration, the perfect form of thanksgiving, here at the Cathedral. We also pray for those who have lost a spouse before this milestone, aware that those who have gone before us participate in the same heavenly liturgy. We thank God for the Sacrament of Marriage, a tangible expression of Christ's love on the cross, shown through the married love of so many people.

Stewardship is Giving God Our Whole Selves – Inside & Out

Today's readings call us to look inward to the state of our hearts, our thoughts and emotions.

Our first reading, from Sirach, addresses the emotion of anger. "Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the Lord?" We have all been wounded by others at some point, some perhaps quite deeply. Our emotions are gifts from God. But we must steward them well, rather than allowing them to overcome us.

We embrace the stewardship mindset — not brooding over hurts, but recalling all the gifts our good God has given us, all the love He continually pours out upon us, and we put our focus and trust in Him. In our Gospel from Matthew, Jesus reminds us of our true position before Him, comparing the kingdom of heaven to a "king who decided to settle accounts with his servants." In the parable, a debtor is brought before the king, owing a debt that could not possibly be repaid. Yet, the king is filled with compassion, forgives the debt, and lets him free.

Doesn't that sound like our relation to the King of Kings? The Father has given us life and sent His only Son to die for us to free us from our sins "debts" and make eternal life possible for us. It is impossible to repay this debt. We can only thank God by giving our whole selves.

An Uplifting Street Encounter — "You Are The Priest!"

s I hurriedly approached Northwestern Hospital, a sudden greeting interrupted my steps. "You are the priest!" I stopped and scanned my surroundings to locate the source of the voice. "Yes, I am a priest. How can I help you?" I replied, my curiosity piqued. "You're the priest



who celebrated Mass today at 10:30am. We're from Detroit, just in town for a visit, and since the Cathedral is just a few blocks away, we decided to attend Mass." Then, with excitement, they began to share their faith journey. They spoke about how reading Scriptures and listening to Catholic talks, like those by Bishop Robert Barron from "Word on Fire," had played an essential role in deepening their faith. These experiences ignited a newfound enthusiasm for living out their marriage vocation joyfully. Our conversation flowed seamlessly, weaving through Michigan Avenue as we made our way to Huron Street. I knew I had to keep moving for the anointing, but the couple's infectious zeal kept me engaged.

Friends, that evening was late and tiring, but that conversation filled me with boundless energy. In my mind,

I couldn't help think, "Yes, yes, yes, you get it!" Can you tell that this couple was evangelizing in their unique way? The couple does indeed encounter the Lord and have an active relationship with Him. They are like Jeremiah 20:9: "But then it [God's Word] becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones; I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it."

I was so pumped! I wish my words speak out loud of the joy, love, energy, hope, and excitement I felt during that encounter. Well, I pray that you feel it. So, what is evangelization? Bishop Barron nicely says, "Evangelization is not just sharing ideas about Christianity, as important as that is ... But evangelization is introducing someone into a friendship with Jesus Christ, into a relationship with him." He continues, "One of the reasons that we do not evangelize effectively is that a lot of even professed Christians do not walk personally with Jesus ... that is Christianity in a nutshell: to walk personally with Christ. Once you do that, once you address him with the word 'thou,' once you know that you have a friendship with the Lord, you can share it. And that is what real evangelization is all about." How is our progress in cultivating a personal relationship with Jesus? How are we doing with evangelization? I love being a priest! JMJ.

Filling Your Spiritual Backpack: Sr. Thea Bowman

Sunday, Sept. 17, after the 5:15pm Mass, in the Parish Center Club Room

Born Dec. 29, 1937, in Mississippi, Sr. Thea Bowman became Catholic at age nine and entered the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration at age 15. Sr. Thea began a unique ministry of breaking down racial and cultural barriers through lively gatherings that combined singing, gospel preaching, prayer, and storytelling, rooted in African-American Catholicism. She died in 1990 after a six-year fight with breast cancer. The U.S. Bishops endorsed the sainthood cause for Sr. Thea, and she was granted the first step of the process by the Vatican. This "Filling Your Spiritual Backpack" session will be facilitated by David Thompson, catechist, who is from the same area as Sr. Thea in Mississippi.
