"Parable of the Two Sons" (2012) by Andrei Mironov. (b. 1975-) Russia.

Today's parable from Matthew is part of Jesus' response to the religious establishment's question about his authority. In many ways, the parable



repeats a consistent emphasis throughout Matthew. In the parable, the difference between the two sons is that one fails to do what he says, and the other does what he fails to say. What matters is not what you hear and say but what you do (Matthew 7:21, 24). Note also how Matthew's Jesus ends this parable with multiple references to belief. Belief for Matthew is not something merely in one's head; a change of mind must involve a change in actions.

We find this emphasis on doing right not only in the mouth of Matthew's Jesus but also in the actions of Christ. Christ is praised for his coming in human form and dying on that cross, but the significance of these is set in the context of his deference to God and his generosity toward humanity - or what we do with and for others (see Matthew 25:31-46).

The Synod on Synodality Begins. Now Here's What it Means

■his Wednesday, Oct. 4, the universal phase of the Synod on Synodality will officially begin in Rome. Since October 2021, the Church has been preparing for this historic meeting in Rome. To prepare for this Synod, this gathering of various members of the Church from around the world, Pope Francis laid out the



groundwork. The diocesan phase was in October 2021. when parishes hosted listening sessions to hear from the faithful about the issues in the life of the Church at the foundational level. Then, the process moved to the national phase, where each country's Bishops Conference discussed the findings of the diocesan sessions, which then moved to the continental phase. The general themes were condensed into a working document and sent to the Vatican during this final preparation phase.

Synods are nothing new to the history of the Church. The word "synod" comes from Greek, meaning "to journey with." From the earliest days of Christianity, we have walked with each other, listened, and addressed issues. It was not until the Second Vatican Council that a regular schedule of Synod gatherings was formulated. Since 1965, the Synod of Bishops has served as an advisory council to the Pope on various themes ranging from Catechesis to the Eucharist to the Family. A Synod of Bishops is held typically every three to five years. The Synod on Synodality is the 16th Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops since 1965.

This Synod is groundbreaking in several ways. Of the 364 delegates either named by Pope Francis personally or voted by the national Bishops Conference of the country, not all are bishops. Some delegates are religious brothers and sisters, priests, and laity. And 54 are women. Even more remarkable is that all delegates will have voting power in document decisions made at the end of the Synod. Our pastor, Cardinal Blase Cupich, was appointed personally by Pope Francis and is attending the Synod

that will last for all of October.

A Synod on Synodality is crucial to the life of the Church. Pope Francis said during a September 2021 address to the faithful of Rome that "Synodality is an expression of the Church's nature, her form, style and mission." The Synod allows us as a Church to slow down and listen to each other. Listen to the desires of the heart, the groanings of the Spirit within us, and listen for the voices not being heard.

Pope Francis said, "The Spirit is always the protagonist of the Church's life." We believe the Spirit is at work in the life of the Church. And the Spirit unifies us on our common mission to share the joy of the Gospel that the Church is for all people. Jesus came to die for all and walked among us to call all people into relationship with him. The Synod is an expression of that desire, that hope, that we make room for all in the life and mission of the Church.

Everything we do as Catholics is rooted in the fundamental belief that Jesus of Nazareth is risen from the dead. We would not be the Church if that were not true. This Synod on Synodality is a crucial moment in the life of the Church to allow that message to continue to be believed and shared. As the Risen Lord stood before his Apostles the night of the Resurrection as fear filled their hearts, he said, "Peace be with you; receive the Holy Spirit." So, too, he does with us, as he gives us a share in his Spirit to go forth and change the world by our witness.

Discovering the Mother's Love — Part 1

hen I was 9,
my parish led a
pilgrimage to Our
Lady of Lavang. My mother
took me with her and hoped
for a miracle since the doctor
could not find the reason

for my persistent headaches. After a long 17-hour bus journey, we camped by the shrine with a few thousand people.

The following day, while I slept, the group left for holy water, wanting me to rest more before the long liturgy. Unfortunately, ushers woke me up, and in a half-asleep daze, I left camp, blending into the massive crowd. Panic ensued. My mother sought help from the priest to find her lost son while she scanned the crowd for any sign of me.

I still vividly recall the moment when her eyes locked onto mine in that sea of faces. She rushed toward me, arms wide open, and enveloped me in a warm, loving embrace. It was a reunion filled with an overwhelming sense of joy and relief. At that moment, I knew just how much my mother loved me. Her relief was palpable; it felt like she would grant me anything I desired. It remains one of my most cherished and joy-

filled moments, a testament to the powerful bond between a mother and her child.

October is the month of the Holy Rosary, when we are reminded that we all share a spiritual Mother. In Mary, we see glad tidings she wants to give her children. St. Irenaeus says, "Just as the former [Eve] was led astray by the word of an angel so that she fled from God when she had transgressed His word; so did the later [Mary], by an angelic communication, receive the glad tidings that she should be the bearer of God, being obedient to His word. And if the former did disobey God, yet the latter was persuaded to be obedient to God, in order that

the Virgin Mary might become the patroness of the virgin Eve."

Beautiful. At the end of the pilgrimage, my mother did witness a miracle — I no longer experienced the unexplained headaches. She attributed this miracle to Our Lady of Lavang.




