

Dear People of God,

The loyalty (though frustrated) of Cubs, Bears & White Sox fans in Chicago and across the country is staggering. Win or lose, Chicago sports followers never lose hope and display their loyalty in good times and bad (however, we have reached our

breaking point with the Chicago Bears!).

Can the same be said of us as followers of Jesus Christ? Are we loyal to our Lord Jesus Christ in good and hard times? This question has always haunted me – If we were arrested for being Christians, would there be enough evidence to convict us? Do we lose hope when life throws us a curve? The Lord Jesus says, "Follow me." It demands loyalty, faith, trust, letting go, and enthusiasm. Living is never easy, and life is what happened while I was making other plans!

Matthew's Gospel parable extends the metaphor the earlier readings of God's people as a vine that God has planted deliberately and carefully. The Gospel refers to God as a



landowner who planted a vineyard and rents it out to tenants, but these tenants end up trying to take over the vineyard with violence, include the killing of the landowner's slaves and heir.

We are the people of God's vinevard. God looks out for us and tends to our needs. God cherishes us, saves us, and grants us peace as we journey to Jerusalem with Jesus. God gives us the responsibility to produce fruit in the divine vineyard. The arrogance and selfrighteousness of the chief priests and elders have no place in the vineyard of the kingdom. Rather, the virtues of truth, honor, justice, purity, love, and grace are ours to adopt as we produce fruit. They are the way of humanity, the way of the Cross, the way of Jesus. ### Catholic Illuminations Clearing Up Misunderstandings over Anointing of Sick

he Anointing of the Sick is one of the Church's seven sacraments. Along with the Sacrament of Reconciliation, they are the sacraments of healing. There has been a lot of misunderstanding surrounding the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, and many incorrectly associate it only to be



celebrated in the hour of death. But the reality is the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, like the other six Sacraments, is for the living. We celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick at moments in our life when we need healing, though sometimes that healing also occurs at the moment of death.

Like all Sacraments, the Anointing of the Sick brings one into an encounter with Jesus Christ. The Sacrament enables sick persons to find solace and comfort during their illness and allows them to live out their call of discipleship in their condition. The beginning pages of the *Praenotanda* of the Ritual for the Anointing of the Sick says, "By their witness, the sick show that our mortal life must be redeemed through the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection" (Pastoral Care for the Sick, 3). We see that the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus have touched everything that happens in this life.

The celebration of the Anointing of the Sick is personal and communal, that is, something that belongs to the individual and the Church community. It is personal because the individual receives the grace of the Holy Spirit. It is communal because the church community unites in prayer for the ill person. This approach stands in sharp contrast to the way sick people are sometimes treated in our society. Before the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), the Anointing of the Sick was celebrated in extremis as a person approached death. So, it was known as "Last Rites" and "Extreme Unction. The Council affirmed that this was indeed a sacrament for the sick and not only for those near death (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, n. 73). The personal and communal aspects of the Sacrament show that Anointing can be done in a hospital room, or within the context of a Mass.

Since Anointing is not only for those on their deathbed, those who are seriously ill, people about to undergo surgery, older people who struggle with declining health, people with chronic illnesses, and those with a mental illness can also be anointed at any point in their life. It also means the Sacrament can be celebrated again when needed. It is not a Sacrament that can only be celebrated once, like Baptism or Confirmation.

We will have a Healing Mass on Saturday, Oct. 14, at our 9:00am Mass. It will be a Mass with the Anointing of the Sick for those who have come to reflect on the Sacrament and their current health issues and avail themselves of this Sacrament. Next week, we celebrate the Feast of St. Luke, patron of physicians. How appropriate then to approach the divine physician, through the celebration of the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, to seek healing in mind, body, and spirit, so the sick can draw close to Christ and see suffering as a participation in the world's salvation.



# Remembering 'A Wonderful Priest and Bishop'

Most Rev. Kevin M. Birmingham, auxiliary bishop for the Archdiocese of Chicago and former secretary to Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, archbishop of Chicago, passed away unexpectedly Monday, Oct. 2, 2023. He was 51 years old, a few days shy of his 52nd birthday.

Birmingham was born on Oct. 7, 1971 in Oak Lawn to Jeanette Ann Larsen and Joseph James Birmingham. He attended Quigley Preparatory Seminary, Niles College Seminary and the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary.

Birmingham was ordained to the priesthood on May 24, 1997, by Archbishop Francis George,



and he celebrated his first solemn Mass on May 25 of the same year at Our Lady of the Ridge Parish in Chicago Ridge.

As Birmingham said in a Chicago Catholic interview in 2020, the Oblate Sisters of Jesus the Priest from Mexico City, who ministered at Niles College and Mundelein Seminary, arranged for his second Mass as a priest to be celebrated from the main altar at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. He made the trip to Mexico after his ordination to give thanks to Our Lady of Guadalupe, to whom he developed a devotion while he was in seminary, especially when he spent time in Morelia, Mexico, learning Spanish.

After ordination to the priesthood, Birmingham served as associate pastor at St. Peter Claver Mission in Robbins, St. Benedict Parish in Blue Island and St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Orland Park. He was pastor at St. Anne Parish in Hazel Crest (2005–2011) and Maternity BVM Parish on North Avenue in Chicago (2011–2014). Birmingham served as administrative secretary to Cardinal Cupich from 2014 to 2020, during which time he was also a resident at Holy Name Cathedral.

"The Church has lost a wonderful priest and bishop today and I lost a dear friend and valued colleague," said Cardinal Cupich. "From the start of his ministry, Bishop Kevin Birmingham was a devoted and joyful priest. He felt called to serve Latino Catholics especially, and he learned Spanish in order to do so. He served in my office for six years as priest-secretary, always with dedication and attention to every detail, a role in which his reputation for kindness only grew.

May we honor his memory by continuing to do as he did, and model the love God has for his children in all we do."

Birmingham was appointed director of the Department of Parish Vitality and Mission in July 2020 for a year. On Sept. 11, 2020, Birmingham was appointed auxiliary bishop of Chicago and Titular Bishop of Dolia. He was ordained a bishop on Nov. 13, 2020 by Cardinal Cupich at Holy Name Cathedral and became Episcopal Vicar of Vicariate IV. Last month, after the retirement of Bishop Joseph Perry, Birmingham was assigned to oversee Vicariate VI.

Sarah Machaj, senior administrative assistant in the Archbishop's Office, had worked with Birmingham from 2015 until 2020. "Bishop Kevin lit up every room he walked into and brought with him his dry wit and just a little bit of mischief," Machaj said affectionately. "He was an incredibly hard worker, but never asked for recognition. He was humble, truly kind and had a laugh that was contagious. He was the most genuine person I've ever known, and he will be greatly missed."

## **Discovering the Mother's Love – Part 2**

he room behind the tabernacle often raises questions from visitors, especially in the hustle and bustle before Mass. This area is known as the sacristy, where we meticulously prepare for the liturgy. Amid the busy preparations, we have some meaningful conversations as well. Once, George asked, "What is the



difference between looking at the golden calf versus the serpent in Exodus?" The short answer is humans crafted the golden calf in defiance of God (idol worshipping), while they fashioned the bronze serpent in obedience to God to remind them of the one true God. This distinction lays the foundation for understanding the significance of various religious symbols.

A young adult inquired about honoring Mary through statues and icons, wondering if it is a form of idol worship. In response, we turn to John Damascus, who emphasized that the honor directed at images is not meant for the depictions but for the individuals they represent. Adoration, he stressed, is reserved solely for the one true God. The Scriptures reinforce this understanding. When Jesus uttered, "Father, into your hands, I commend my spirit" on the cross, it became evident that prayers




and adoration should be directed to God. Similarly, St. Stephen implored, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit," addressing his plea to God the Son. The Apostle Paul's words affirm the universal authority of Jesus, declaring that every knee should bow and every tongue should confess His lordship to the glory of God the Father.

In light of these insights, venerating Mary through statues, icons, or special devotions finds its place. It serves as a means of honoring her as the vessel of grace and our intercessor with God. Think about me running to the market to buy some fresh fruits (prayers); upon my return, I requested assistance from these sisters (Mother Mary/Saints) in arranging them beautifully. In short, we worship One God and enrich our faith journey by honoring/ venerating Mary and the Saints who aid us in deepening our love for the Divine. I love being a priest. JMJ.

Our Parish Day of Service is back! Join us for a day of service together as a Faith Community for our local community. Our focus area for 2023 will be to understand better how we can assist our local homeless. We will start and finish in the Courtyard (assuming weather cooperates!).

New this year! We will begin the day with a continental breakfast and panel of local experts who will share their nonprofit's mission to help people experiencing homelessness and explain the root causes and solutions. Our panelists include:

• Shiloh Capone, Executive Director of Street Samaritans, a group that intervenes in the cycle of homelessness and poverty by connecting people to solutions and walking with them on their journey.

• Hector Perez of Union League Boys & Girls Club will discuss the challenges and ways they have been serving the migrant individuals who have entered Chicago.

• Sr. Stephanie Baliga, from Mission of Our Lady of the Angels, spends most of her time moving people, resources, and money to help support families with food and other needs. She organizes a large charity team through the Chicago Marathon to support the Mission — and she wants you on her team! She also teaches K-8 religion at St. Sylvester School.

• Paul Gilmet, Regional Director of Rosecrance, will speak on mental illness and substance addiction concerning homelessness.

Here are a few of (but not limited to) the nonprofits we've partnered up with to provide opportunities to serve:

1. Union League Boys & Girls Clubs at the Barreto Club for Smart Girls is a program designed to help preteen







girls develop and adopt a healthy attitude and lifestyle and acquire and maintain a positive self-concept, sound decision-making skills, and mentor relationships. Volunteers will spend the day with our Smart Girls, participate in arts and crafts, design bulletin boards for fall, and decorate home herb gardens while providing a moment of mentorship.

2. Covenant House builds a bridge to hope for young people facing homelessness and survivors of trafficking through love, respect, and support through programs designed to empower young people to rise and overcome adversity. Projects our volunteers will undertake include landscaping and beautification of the facilities' parking lot green areas and repainting of the parking lot wall.

**3. The Mission of Our Lady of the Angels** is a missionary outreach to the poor in W. Humboldt Park, Chicago. Mission OLA currently supports 3,000

families monthly with food and other essential resources. The Mission directly supports senior citizens, families, and, additionally, children

through a partnership with the YMCA. The Mission provides opportunities for Catholics to live out their faith through retreats and by working with us in our outreach to the poor. "We'll have a work day — cleaning, sorting food, and working in gardens. This is a fabulous place to volunteer, and many of our parishioners have already done so." — Sister Stephanie Baliga.

We will also have other projects in our immediate area as well onsite if you are not able to travel. We will finish the day with reflections followed by pizza and refreshments.
