Today's parable from Matthew compares the kingdom of heaven to a king and his lavish feast for his son's wedding.



The parable never

indicates who is making this comparison and that is part of Jesus' response to the religious leaders, who question his authority after his celebrated entry into Jerusalem and his cleansing of the Temple. The closing statement, "Many are invited, but few are chosen" (Matthew 22:14), may conclude Jesus' series of the three parables instead of just this one. Perhaps, the chosen may refer to people who reject this parable's comparison. As we continue our journey to the feast of the kingdom, our response to God's feast may ebb and flow. In prayer this week, consider your response to the invitation. Will you come or will you refuse? Will you be prepared.

Think on What is Above with Our Cathedral's Pipe Organs

■he Cathedral has many interesting facts and points of interest. If you haven't already done so, please stay for a quick tour of the Cathedral offered every Sunday after the 8:30 and 10:30am Masses by one of our trained and wonderful volunteer docents. Learn about the history and architecture



and interesting facts about the Cathedral in less than 20 minutes! For a more in-depth walking tour, join us after the 12:30pm Mass on the first or third Sunday of the month, where you will learn more about each element in our Cathedral, including our music elements.

Music is a crucial part of the Church's life because, at times, music adds to what the soul cannot say. We are blessed here at the Cathedral with a robust and talented Music Department under the beautiful direction of David Jonies, our Music Director and Organist, and Liz Vasiljevic, Associate Director of Music. Parishioners and worldwide visitors remark on the extraordinary music during our Cathedral worship services, from Sunday Mass to Holy Week Tenebrae to Advent Vespers. We are grateful for all our talented musicians who every week provide everyone who passes through the Cathedral doors an encounter with God in song and music.

Our gallery organ is one of the most memorable parts of our music program. It is a highlight of our tours and quite picture-worthy! After five years of work in the workshop of Flentrop Orgelbouw in Zaandam, Holland, the Flentrop organ was dedicated on July 19, 1989. The first song played on the organ was "Happy Birthday" as the donor, Mrs. Alice O'Malley Robinson, sat in the sanctuary, facing the organ, on her 101st birthday. The organ contains 5,558 pipes, 117 ranks in 71 stops, four keyboards and a pedalboard. It is the largest mechanical organ in the Chicago area.

Another unique feature of our organ is the zimbelstern. It is a special stop that allows the star in the center of the

organ to spin and produce a twinkling sound.

In 2007, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops released a document entitled "Sing to the Lord." Paragraph 88 says, "Pipe organs also play an important evangelical role in the Church's outreach to the wider community in sacred concerts, music series, and other musical and cultural programs." The music selected at the liturgy and for concerts should, foundationally, lead someone to ponder the wondrous mystery of God and raise the mind to, as St. Paul says, "Think on what is above" (Colossians 3:2).

We invite you to join us at the Cathedral on Thursday, Oct. 26 at 7:00pm for the 2023-2024 Cathedral Concert Series opening concert. Johann Vexo, choir organist from Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, will perform at this concert. For more details, go to Page 10 of today's bulletin, and please consider becoming a concert sponsor. Join us as we hear the wonderful music of our Catholic tradition played by one of the most gifted organists and hear our Flentrop organ's beautiful workings. This concert series is a way for us to realize all we have is a gift, and like coming together around the altar for Mass, every time we use the gifts God has given us, we give glory and honor to his most Holy Name.

Discovering the Mother's Love — Part III

s I wandered through the streets of Rome this past week, my steps echoing on the ancient cobblestones. I immersed myself in a journey of faith and reflection. The Eternal City bore witness to centuries of human devotion.



and creativity, leaving an indelible mark on one's soul.

Walking around 25,000 steps daily, the magnificent Basilicas drew me in. Their grandeur and beauty were aweinspiring. Every sculpture, every stroke of paint and every stained-glass window reflected the dedication and love of those who had poured their souls into creating these sacred arts. It was a testament to their unwavering faith and desire to express their love for the Lord. As I marveled at the intricate details, I whispered, "It is too beautiful. How could one not believe in God?"

One recurring theme that struck me through Rome was the depiction of the Assumption of Mary. Almost every church had a marvelous representation of this event. It was a reminder of Mary's profound love and devotion to the Lord. Mary's response to the angel's announcement was a model of faith. She "considered in her mind what sort of greeting this might be," engaging in an interior dialogue with the Word. The Assumption teaches that God took Mary's body and soul into heaven at the end of her earthly life. There are three other dogmas concerning Mary: The Mother of God highlights Mary's unique role as the mother of Jesus, who is both fully divine and fully human; The Immaculate Conception asserts that Mary was conceived without original sin; and the Perpetual Virginity affirms that Mary remained a virgin throughout her life.

Overwhelmed by the beauty of these sacred places and the faith and devotion depicted in the artwork, I couldn't help but ponder how we can emulate Mary's unwavering love for the Lord, capable of moving mountains, in our everyday lives. I love being a priest! JMJ

Salon Series Continues with **Controversial Pope Pius XII**

Saturday, Oct. 28 at 2:00pm in Club Room

Our Salon discussion on Oct. 28 in the Club Room will focus on the Pope Pius XII. Cardinal Eugenio Pacelli was elected Pope Pius XII in 1939, on the eve of the Second World War. During his pontificate (which lasted until 1958), Pius XII sought to lead the Church through one of the most demanding and perilous political environments in human history. Claimed as a saint by his supporters, and "Hitler's Pope" by his critics, Pope Pius XII's leadership remains deeply controversial to this day.

The assessment of his legacy has been further complicated by the release of thousands of new documents from the Vatican Secret Archives in March 2020. Please join us in the Rectory, where historian Dr. Edward E. Gordon will help us make sense of the complex decisions of the Vatican during the rise and fall of Nazi Germany. Who is Blessed Carlo Acutis?

You may have encountered the two groups who are discerning to become Catholic. Eventually, the groups will become one in November, preparing for full initiation at the Easter Vigil, 2024. It has become a practice for each cohort to gather under the patronage of a saint or one in the process of canonization. For this cohort, Blessed Carlo Acutis is the patron.

Born in 1991, Carlo grew up in an affluent yet nonreligious household. However, from his reception of the Eucharist at the age of seven, Carlo faithfully attended Mass daily. In his daily interactions, he defended those bullied and accompanied friends whose parents were in the process of divorce. He actively picked up trash, cared for a small ark of pets, prayed for others, and befriended children and adults without prejudgment.

Noteworthy was his skill in computer technology, skills congruent to college-level comprehension. He evangelized to those searching for purpose, seeking strength in faith journeys, and cataloging Eucharistic miracles and resources.

Diagnosed with leukemia, Carlo died in 2006 at 15 and was buried in a pair of Nikes, jeans, and tracksuit jacket. In 2020, Pope Francis declared Carlo Acutis "Blessed" one step away from sainthood.

What is the Parish Day of Service?

Once a year, we gather as many people as possible from our Faith Community to serve our local community. This year, we will be focusing on projects that help local homeless and have added a panel discussion with local experts.

What does the day look like?

Morning: We will meet up in the Courtyard (or Cafeteria if there is bad weather) for a light breakfast. Everyone will be assigned to a team with a designated team leader. This is a great way to meet new people and help to serve others at the same time.

Mid-Morning: A panel will discuss the causes of homelessness and solutions their organizations are working on to help. This will be followed by a short prayer service.

- · Shiloh Capone, Executive Director of Street Samaritans, a group that intervenes in the cycle of homelessness and poverty by connecting people to solutions and walking with them on their journey.
- · Hector Perez of Union League Boys & Girls **Club** will discuss the challenges and ways they have been serving the migrants who have entered Chicago.
- · Sr. Stephanie Baliga, of the Mission of Our Lady of the Angels, spends most of her time moving people, resources, and money to help support over 3,000 families each month with food and other basic needs.
- · Paul Gilmet, Regional Director of Rosecrance. will speak on mental illness and substance addiction concerning homelessness.

Late Morning/Early Afternoon: We will head out to volunteer at one of our partner organizations.







Transportation will be provided for those who don't have a car. Here are a few of the nonprofits we've partnered with:

- · Union League Boys & Girls Clubs at the Barreto Club for Smart Girls is a program designed to help girls ages 12-13 develop and adopt a healthy attitude and lifestyle. Volunteers will have the opportunity to spend the day with our Smart Girls, participate in arts and crafts, design bulletin boards for fall, and decorate home herb gardens while providing a moment of mentorship for our Smart Girls.
- · Covenant House builds a bridge to hope for young people facing homelessness and survivors of trafficking by means of unconditional love, absolute respect and relentless support of its programs. Our projects will include landscaping and beautification of the facilities' parking lot green areas and repainting of the parking lot wall.
- The Mission of Our Lady of the Angels is a missionary outreach to the poor in W. Humboldt Park. Mission OLA currently supports 3,000 families monthly with food and other essential resources. The Mission directly supports senior citizens, families, and, additionally, children through a partnership with the YMCA.

We will also have other projects in our immediate area as well as onsite if you are not able to travel.

Late Afternoon: Teams will return to the Cathedral where we will have an opportunity to share with one another what we learned during our projects. After, we will have time for fellowship with pizza and refreshments.
