Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Life speaks to us in various ways and on many levels. Do I “listen to life” and permit experiences to teach me lessons and touch my heart? Who are our life’s teachers? Profound joy and peace are found in simple ways — if we are willing to listen and learn through

the eyes of faith.

Don’t run after life — absolute joy is attained in simplicity, for God runs after us. I share this beautiful story given to me. Enjoy and share with family, friends and co-workers.

God Lives Under the Bed

My brother Kevin thinks God lives under his bed. At least that’s what I heard him say. He was praying out loud in his bedroom, and I stopped outside his door to listen. “Are you there, God?” he said, “Where are you? Oh, I see. Under the bed.” I giggled softly and tiptoed off to my room.

Kevin’s unique perspectives are often a source of amusement. But that night, something else lingered long after the humor. I realized for the first time the different world Kevin lives in. He was born 30 years ago and is developmentally disabled due to difficulties during labor.

Apart from his size (he’s 6’ 2”), there are few ways in which he is an adult. He reasons and communicates with the capabilities of a 7-year-old, and he always will. He will probably always believe that God lives under his bed and that Santa Claus comes every Christmas.

I remember wondering if Kevin realized he was different. Is he ever dissatisfied with his monotonous life?

Before dawn each day, he was off to work at a workshop for the challenged, home to walk our dog, back to eat his favorite macaroni and cheese dinner, and then to bed. The only variation in the schedule is laundry, when he hovers excitedly over the washing machine like a mother with her newborn child.

He seems satisfied. He lopes out to the bus every morning at 7:05am, eager for a day of simple work.

He wrings his hands excitedly while the water boils on the stove before dinner, and he stays up late twice a week to gather our dirty laundry for his next day’s laundry chores.

On Saturdays, my Dad takes Kevin to the airport to have a soft drink, watch the planes land and speculate loudly on the destination of each passenger inside. “That one’s goin’ to Chi-car-go!” Kevin shouts as he claps his hands.

And so goes his world of daily rituals. He doesn’t know what it means to be discontented. His life is simple. He will never know the entanglements of wealth or power, and he does not care what clothing brand he wears or what food he eats. His needs are always met, and he never worries that they may not be one day. His hands are diligent. Kevin is always happier when he is working. When he unloads the dishwasher or vacuums the carpets, his heart is entirely in it. He does not shrink from a job when it starts and only leaves it once finished.

But when his tasks are done, Kevin knows how to relax. He is not obsessed with his work. His heart is pure. He believes everyone tells the truth; promises must be kept, and you apologize instead of arguing when you are wrong.

He is free from pride and unconcerned with appearances. Kevin is not afraid to cry when hurt, angry, or sorry. He is always transparent, always sincere.

And he trusts God. Not confined by intellectual reasoning, he comes as a child when he comes to Christ. Kevin seems to know God — to be friends with Him in a challenging way for an “educated” person to grasp. God seems like his closest companion.

Then, I realize that perhaps he is not the one with the disability — I am. My obligations, fear, pride and circumstances become disabilities when I do not trust them to God’s care. Who knows if Kevin comprehends things I can never learn? After all, he has spent his whole life in that kind of innocence, praying and soaking up the goodness and love of God.

And one day, when the mysteries of heaven open, and we are all amazed at how close God is to our hearts, I’ll realize that God heard the simple prayers of a boy who believed that God lived under his bed. Kevin won’t be surprised at all!

May we all learn a life and faith lesson from Kevin.

In today's Gospel passage, Jesus wins the argument without being trapped because it assumes that everyone agrees with



a principle: having your image on something signifies possession. From that principle, one must agree that coins bearing Caesar's image belong to Caesar. The second deduction that leaves Jesus' opponents speechless is that humans, bearing the image of God, belong to God. While these deductions are derived from the same premise, they represent a contrast. What does that mean for imperial claims being made on people who belong to God? What does it mean regarding Caesar's coins which Jesus' imperative says to 'repay' or 'give back'? We are created in the image and likeness of God. All we say and do reflects God's image in us. Through our actions, we show others how God rules with justice and equality.

Catholic Illuminations

Remember St. Pope John Paul II Today on His Feast Day

Often, when we think of the saints, we think of those who lived centuries before us in a world much different and, some argue, more manageable than the one we live in today. To be a saint is not a call for the select few and not a call only for those who are ordained or make vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience in religious life. The call to be a saint is for each of us who has passed through the waters of baptism. The Second Vatican Council Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, *Lumen Gentium*, says, “Therefore in the Church, everyone, whether belonging to the hierarchy or being cared for by it, is called to holiness, according to the saying of the Apostle: “For this is the will of God, your sanctification (1 Thess. 4:3)” (LG, 39).



Oct. 22 is the feast day of St. Pope John Paul II, the pope from October 1978 to April 2005. I was in elementary school then, but I remember his final months of suffering before he returned to God on April 2, 2005. Elected Pope on Oct. 16, 1978, at 58 years old, John Paul II took the name of his immediate predecessor, John Paul I, who was Pope for only 33 days. With the election of John Paul II, he was the first non-Italian Pope in over 455 years.

During his historic 27 years as Pope, John Paul II traveled to 129 countries. He is widely credited with bringing down Communism and the Iron Curtain through reason, not violence or force. He also reestablished diplomatic ties with the United States in 1984, initially cut in 1867 due to anti-Catholic beliefs surrounding the assassination of President Lincoln in 1865. He canonized over 482 saints in his 27 years as Pope, a significant increase from the 300 or so canonizations in the previous 600 years. He also began World Youth Day, a gathering of the youth of the Church from around the world, showing that the Church is alive in the next generation.

John Paul II took as his papal motto, *Totus Tuus*, reflected on his coat of arms, with the Cross and the letter “M”

beneath it, in reference to Mary, the Blessed Mother who stood beneath the Cross of her crucified Son. Throughout his pontificate, the Holy Father always turned to Mary as a model and guide on the path of discipleship. In 2002, in his Apostolic Letter *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, he added the Luminous Mysteries to the meditations of the Rosary. Suffering from Parkinson’s and arthritis, he continued with his public schedule and Masses, showing the world the value in redemptive suffering joined to the sacrifice of Christ on the Cross.

As we celebrate the Month of the Rosary, a personal devotion of St. Pope John Paul II, let us look to Mary to guide us closer to her Son, the Redeemer of Man, who is our life and resurrection. John Paul II, canonized by Pope Francis in 2014, shows us that even today and in this century, people are answering the call of their baptism to be saints. Let us look to John Paul II, and strive to bring Christ to the world, and continue to open the doors to Christ.

Book of Remembrance

As we prepare to enter November, the Month of Remembrance, beginning on November 1, the Book of the Dead will be available near the reliquary at the foot of the steps in front of the tabernacle, near the doors to the courtyard,



for you to inscribe the names of your loved ones who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith. Once the book is filled, we place it on the Mary altar for the remainder of the month, and a new book will be available for more names to be inscribed. This practice allows us to remember with gratitude those who have died, with the hope and faith knowing that for “God’s faithful people, life is changed, not ended.”

Lord, we raise Israel and Gaza to you, and pray for those suffering. We ask that you provide peace in this crisis, and protection and comfort for all those who have been impacted.

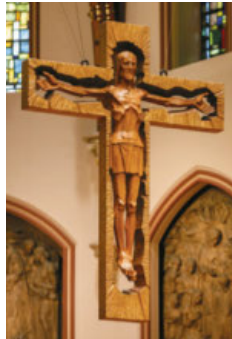

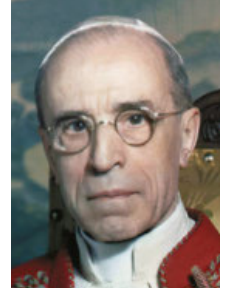

Salon Series Continues with Controversial Pope Pius XII

Our Salon discussion on Oct. 28 in the Club Room will focus on the Pope Pius XII. Cardinal Eugenio Pacelli was elected Pope Pius XII in 1939, on the eve of the Second World War. During his pontificate (which lasted until 1958), Pius XII sought to lead the Church through one of the most demanding and perilous political environments in human history. Claimed as a saint by his supporters, and "Hitler's Pope" by his critics, Pope Pius XII's leadership remains deeply controversial to this day.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We, the Catholic bishops of Illinois, write with a sense of urgency. Unless the General Assembly acts to renew the Invest in Kids scholarship program, more than 9,000 children currently relying on this program to attend a non-public school may have their educational path disrupted. Without an extension of the program in Illinois law now, no scholarships will be awarded for the school year that will begin in September 2024. Most of these children will have to leave the school their families determined was their best chance to receive a high-quality education in a safe and wholesome learning environment. This is an injustice that should and can be avoided, but only if the General Assembly acts when it reconvenes on October 24, 2023.

Invest in Kids has proven to be a beacon of hope for thousands of Illinois students and their families. Children receiving Invest in Kids scholarships come from lower-income families who could not otherwise afford tuition at the Catholic or another non-public school that is the best fit for their child. Childhood is a limited time in the life of a human being and primary and secondary education is not something that can be put off to some future date when it is convenient for adults. This is our one chance to offer these Illinois children a good start. Please help keep education options available and a brighter future possible by contacting your state senator and state representative and telling them to continue the Invest in Kids Program.

Since its inception six years ago, Invest in Kids has generated overwhelmingly positive results. Nearly 40,000 scholarships have been awarded to students attending non-public schools across Illinois. Demand for scholarships is very high - for every scholarship granted, three students are turned down due to lack of funds. Contrary to what you may have heard, this is not a voucher program, nor does it take state funds away from the public schools. These scholarships are funded through contributions from donors who receive a tax credit for their donation on their Illinois state income tax.

What can you do to help? Please contact your state senator and state representative to let them know of your support for extending the Invest in Kids tax credit scholarship program in Illinois. We also encourage you to urge your fellow parishioners to do the same. Our collective voice is vital to the continued help for Illinois families. Pope Francis begins his message by stressing that “a great river of poverty is traversing our cities and swelling to the point of overflowing; it seems to overwhelm us, so great are the needs of our brothers and sisters who plead for our help, support and solidarity.”

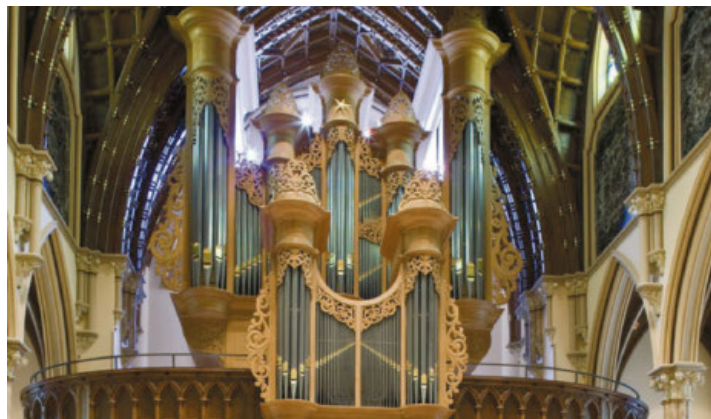
