

Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

As a child, I always enjoyed Halloween. Choosing a costume and mask filled my calendar while watching the Chicago Bears on a Sunday afternoon! My earliest Halloween costume recollection was in kindergarten. I walked around the neighborhood as

Mr. Magoo — the wonderful TV cartoon character!

Halloween connects with costumes, treats — and masks. However, many of us wear a mask to cover our pain, anger, disappointment and fears the entire year. We spend much energy focusing on what we do not have forgetting the many gifts God has blessed us with — or we cover life's hurts and pain with a mask.

We celebrate Halloween this Tuesday, All Saints' Day on Wednesday and All Souls' Day on Thursday — a day to remember all our loved ones who have gone home to God. We give thanks to all who have gone before us.

With Halloween this week, I share a reflection given to me years ago ... Read ... and pass it on. ...

Please Hear What I'm Not Saying

Don't be fooled by me. Don't be fooled by the mask I wear.

For I wear a mask; I wear a thousand masks; masks that I'm afraid to take off, and none of them are me.

Pretending is an art that is second nature to me, but don't be fooled. I give the impression that I'm secure, that all is sunny, unruffled with me, within and without; that confidence is my name and coolness is my game; that the waters are calm and that I'm in command, and I need no one. But don't believe it.

My surface may seem smooth, but my surface is my mask, my every-concealing mask. Beneath lies smugness, no complacency. Beneath dwells the real me in confusion, fear and loneliness.

But I hide this; I don't want anybody to know it. That's why I frantically create a mask to hide behind, a nonchalant, sophisticated façade to help me pretend, to shield from the glance that knows.

But such a glance is precisely my salvation, my only salvation, and I know it. That is, if acceptance follows that

glance, if it is followed by love. It's the only thing that can liberate me. I am afraid that you will think less of me, that you'll laugh, and your laugh will kill me.

I'm afraid that deep down inside I'm nothing, that I'm just no good, and that you see and reject me. So, I play my desperate, pretending games with a façade of assurance on the outside and a trembling child within.

So begins the parade of masks, the glittering but empty parade of masks and my life becomes a front. I chatter with you in surface talk. I tell you everything that's nothing, nothing that is everything, of what's crying within me.

Do not be fooled by what I'm saying while going through my routine. Listen carefully and hear what I'm not saying; what I'd like to be able to say, what for survival, I need to say, but I can't say. I dislike hiding. I dislike the superficial, phony games I'm playing. I want to be genuine, spontaneous, and me, but you must help me. You have to help me by holding out your hand, even when that's the last thing I seem to want or need.

Only you can call me into aliveness. Each time you are kind, gentle, and encouraging, each time you try to understand because you really care, my heart begins to grow wings. Very small wings. Very feeble wings, but wings. With your sensitivity and sympathy and your power of understanding. I can make it.

Only you can wipe away the blank stares of the breathing dead from my eyes. Please choose to. You alone can break down the wall behind which I tremble: you alone can remove the mask; you alone can release me from my shadow world of panic and uncertainty, from my lonely prison.

So, could you not pass me by? Please don't pass me by. It won't be easy for you. A long conviction of worthlessness builds strong walls, and there lies my only hope.

Please try to beat down those walls with firm, but with gentle hands, for a child is very sensitive, and I AM a child.

Who am I, you may wonder? I am someone you know very well. For I am every man, every woman, every child ... every human you meet.

When Jesus is asked about the greatest commandment, he replies with a dual commandment: love of God and love of neighbor. There is neither



opposition nor separation between these two loves. as if one must choose one over the other. One cannot have one without the other. Jesus has no problem then, loving people by understanding their need for food or by healing them on the sabbath, a day that some think should be reserved solely for loving God. The way Jesus juxtaposes these two loves as dual, and the greatest commandment implies that the violation of neighbor violates God and the commandment.

To live as imitators of the Lord is the heart of discipleship. In our journey through Matthew's Gospel, Jesus has taught us through word and action how we too are to heal, nourish, welcome, and love not only our neighbors but also our enemies, strangers, and those deemed the least by society. We are to imitate his way of compassion and love. This is the way of the cross, the way of life, and the way of the kingdom of God.

November is Upon Us, the Month in Which We Remember

e frequently refer to November as the Month of Remembrance for a few reasons. First, we begin November with the celebration of the Solemnity of All Saints on Nov. 1. We remember those holy men and women who have gone before us and inspired us on our journey of discipleship, showing us



holiness is possible for everyone, not a select few. We then remember our beloved dead on All Souls' Day, Nov. 2. At the end of the month, we celebrate the Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, a time to remember Christ's place in history - the savior of humanity. The one in whom we live and move and have our being. The One who creates us, calls us into being and back to Himself through the embrace of death.

Depending on how the dates fall on the calendar, we typically begin the season of Advent in the final days of November, but this year, we start our Advent journey on Dec. 3. Regardless of the date, Advent is a season to remember that God kept his promise of sending a savior, his Son, Jesus Christ, into the world.

As Catholics, we are a people who remember. We remember the saints and those who have died. Whenever we gather for Mass, we remember Christ's death and glorious resurrection from the dead. We remember our baptism by blessing ourselves with holy water as we enter this sacred space, and through our baptism, we remember our call to be saints. And by extension of remembering our baptism, we remember that in those waters of rebirth, we have died with Christ and have risen to glory with him, meaning, like Christ, we have defeated death. That is why at funeral liturgies, the priest sprinkles the casket with holy water and then covers the casket with a white pall, a reminder of our baptism and our victory over death.

And we remember because we profess our belief in the

communion of saints when we recite the Creed. The saints have traveled the path of discipleship with perseverance, love, and hope and are enjoying God's face for eternity. We do not know how many saints are in heaven because everyone in heaven is a saint, so we celebrate All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day. We have a call to pray for those who have died and are in purgatory, that they may soon enjoy the vision of God, and pray for us and with us as the saints do. Ultimately, everything we do in worship reminds us of God's goodness, faithfulness, and love.

All Saints' Day, Nov. 1, is a Holy Day of Obligation. Join us at any of our liturgies on Tuesday, Oct. 31, at 5:15pm or Wednesday, Nov. 1, at 7:00am, 8:00am, 12:00pm, or 5:15pm. On Thursday, Nov. 2, we will celebrate All Souls' Day with Mass at 7:00am, 8:00am, 12:00pm, or 5:15pm. At the 5:15pm Mass on Nov. 2, our talented choir will sing the Requiem Mass composed in 1947 by French composer Maurice Duruflé while we remember in a particular way those buried in the Cathedral in the past year. Let us gather during these sacred days to remember and thank God for our call to holiness and our loved ones and pray we may all enjoy the face of God for eternity.

Book of Remembrance

As we prepare to enter November, the Month of Remembrance, beginning on Nov. 1, the Book of the Dead will be available near the reliquary at the foot of the steps in front of the tabernacle, near the doors



to the courtyard, for you to inscribe the names of your loved ones who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith. Once the book is filled, we place it on the Mary altar for the remainder of the month, and a new book will be available for more names to be inscribed. This practice allows us to remember with gratitude those who have died, with the hope and faith knowing that for "God's faithful people, life is changed, not ended."

Remember Those Who Have Died on Feast of All Souls


All Souls Day: Thursday, Nov. 2, 2023

The Stump of Jesse

Discovering the Mother's Love - Part IV

r. Timothy Radcliffe, Dominican Friar and former Master of the Order of Preachers, gave a reflection at the Synod on Oct. 4 on the theme, "At home in God and God at home in us... To love is to come home to someone." This sentiment resonates with our experiences of visiting family



and friends out of love, embracing their perfections and imperfections. Similarly, we relate this to how our Blessed Lord comes and dwells among us (the Incarnation), offering hope for our return to a blessed state with our heavenly Father (through Jesus' death and resurrection).

Before the Ascension, Jesus founded one Church to continue his mission and establish unity in belief, prayer, and common life. He entrusted Church leadership to his apostles, who walked with him during his ministry. The Church's foundation, Jesus, and its teachings, guided by Scripture and the Holy Spirit, make it one. God continues to dwell in us. One might ask, "Why isn't the Church perfect?"

Fr. Tim referred to Carlo Carretto, who encapsulated the Church's ambiguity, calling it his home yet not entirely

his home, revealing and concealing God. Carretto's words express a complex relationship with the Church: "How much I must criticize you, my Church, and yet how much I love you! You have made me suffer more than anyone, and yet I owe more to you than to anyone. I would like to see you destroyed, yet I need your presence. You have given me much scandal, yet you have made me understand your holiness. No, I cannot be free of you, for I am one with you, even if not completely you. Then, too — where would I go? To build another church? But I could not build one without the same defects, for they are my defects."

Fr. Tim invites listeners to reflect on the idea that all our homes are like Nazareth, where God dwells. He encourages us to embrace Nazareth as our model, emphasizing its simplicity, breadth, and invitation to live wherever it most benefits our neighbors. No matter where we are or what we've done, God is always present, as stated in Revelation 3:20: "Behold I stand at the door and knock. If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come into you and eat with you, and you with me." Here, we witness the blessed Mother accompanying her Son and her adopted children, inspiring them to listen more attentively to God's voice and muster the courage to say "fiat/yes" to His will. To recognize and address the poverty of others, Christians must become poor like the figure of Tobit from the Hebrew Bible. Pope Francis said.

Tobit, a blind and elderly man who dedicated his life to the service of others, "can show practical concern for the poor because he has personally known what it is to be poor," the pope wrote in his message for the celebration of the World Day of the Poor.

The message was published June 13, the feast of St. Anthony, patron of the poor. Christians are called to "acknowledge every poor person and every form of poverty, abandoning the indifference and the banal excuses we make to protect our illusory well-being," Pope Francis wrote. "Regardless of the color of their skin, their social standing, the place from which they came,

if I myself am poor, I can recognize my brothers and sisters in need of my help."

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Peripheral Neuropathy Breakthrough!
