On the Cover

“Woe unto You, Scribes and Pharisees” by James Tissot, painting, Brooklyn Museum

Today's readings present two portraits of pastoral leadership. The prophet Malachi conveys God's message to errant priests. They have not



cared for their people but have 'caused many to falter' to their instruction (Mal 2: 8). They have not listened to or sincerely obeyed God. In today's Gospel, Jesus has a similar quarrel with the scribes and Pharisees. They 'love places of honor' (Matthew 23:6), lay burdens on the people's shoulders, and do not practice what they preach. While acknowledging that their rules must be followed, Jesus warns the people not to imitate them and gives his own vision of leadership in the Christian community: 'the greatest among you must be your servant;' (23:11). This community of learners looks to Christ and the Father.

Coming Soon: A New Tabernacle for the Cathedral

One of the clear indications of being inside a Catholic church is the presence of the Tabernacle.

Due to our belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, we reserve the consecrated hosts not consumed during the Mass in the Tabernacle for use in times of emergency anointings and sick call visits. Every Tabernacle should have a unique lamp shining permanently, indicating the presence of Christ by the sanctuary lamp and inviting us to show honor and reverence to God as we enter this sacred space (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 316). We show reverence and honor by genuflecting before it, spending time in quiet prayer and adoration, and being aware we are in the presence of God.

Our Shrine of the Blessed Sacrament was designed by Luca Luchetti, a famous Italian sculptor of the time, and installed during the Cathedral renovation following the Second Vatican Council in 1968-1969. The Shrine of the Blessed Sacrament has a bronze screen representing the Ascension of the Lord and how Jesus ascended to heaven to intercede for us and also remains in the world (shown by the Tabernacle being in the shape of a globe), fulfilling his promise that he will be with us always (cf. Matthew 28:20).

Luchetti also designed the Marian altar, made of rare alabaster marble, with the bronze screen of the Assumption of Mary. It was renovated in 2019, with a statue of the Blessed Mother.

Both renovations were made possible through specific gifts to the Cathedral, and a bequest, to bring these



shrines into closer proximity with the overall architecture of the Cathedral, and reflect the new baptismal font, added in 2020.

Starting Nov. 6, our tabernacle area will undergo Part One of installing the new Tabernacle. The bronze screen and globe tabernacle will be removed, and a new marble base and baldacchino (canopy) will be installed. This part will last about a week. During this time, the Blessed Sacrament will be reserved in the Tabernacle located in the chapel, which is behind the sanctuary organ. The temporary Tabernacle will then be placed on the new marble base until the new Tabernacle is complete and installed, sometime before Christmas of this year. The new Tabernacle will be made of gold and designed in connection with the overall design of the Cathedral.

On a related note, our campaign for the new ciboria was successful, and we have purchased 18 new ciboria for our liturgical worship. These new ciboria will be blessed at the 10:30am Mass on the First Sunday of Advent, Dec. 3. The date for the dedication of the new Tabernacle has yet to be set, but we will announce it in the coming days.

As a Cathedral community, we are grateful for this new Tabernacle and those who have made it possible. Though change is never easy, and some have been drawn into deeper union with Christ in the current design of the Shrine of the Blessed Sacrament, we should never forget that we, as disciples on the journey of life, after we partake of this one bread and one cup, become ourselves, a walking tabernacle. For we receive Jesus into our very selves, we leave this Cathedral with Christ in us to bring his love, mercy, and forgiveness to those we meet on the journey, always giving glory to His Holy Name.

The Stump of Jesse

Cemetery Stories, Part I: Visiting Sts. Louis & Zelie Martin

We departed from the house at 6am, when the Earth was still groggy from its slumber. After parking the car, we made our way up the hill. The wind swept by, sending shivers down our spines. Upon entering the building, we were instructed: “Go up the staircase to your left, which will lead you to the resting place of Sts. Louis and Zelie Martin, the parents of St. Thérèse.” The path ahead was shrouded in darkness, illuminated only by the flickering candles and fresh flowers adorning the tomb.

As I knelt to pay my respects to the saintly couple, a whisper caressed my neck, and a chilling yet sacred presence filled the air. I took a moment to reflect on the Mass I had just concelebrated with thousands of people on St. Thérèse’s Feast Day. A nun guided me to the sacristy, whispering, “St. Thérèse is over there. Go!” Before me stood a splendid golden basilica housing



St. Thérèse’s relics. At that moment, I could feel her presence. As the Mass commenced in French, though I couldn’t understand the language, the soft, gentle, and holy music transported me as if I were amidst angels singing in heaven. My gaze fixed on a vast canvas picture of St. Thérèse, her enormous eyes radiating compassion and joy, hanging in front of my seat. It was as though she had descended from heaven to join in the earthly celebration.

Then came the reading. I didn’t grasp its meaning until the word “Abba” resounded. I realized it was about Jesus making us righteous through His death and resurrection, allowing us to address God as “Abba, Father.” Overwhelmed with love, I whispered, “Yes, thanks to St. Thérèse. I understand now. God is my Father, and I am His child.” Tears of joy filled my eyes during the Mass, hoping no one would notice. It was a profound reminder that through baptism, we become God’s children, and He eagerly awaits our presence in heaven. The question lingers in my mind: How are we living out our identity on Earth? I love being a priest. JMJ.

Filling Your Spiritual Backpack: Venerable Augustus Tolton

Augustus Tolton may have spent his entire life making history and enduring oppression as the first Black Catholic priest in the United States. Fr. Augustus, known as “Good Father Gus”, moved to Chicago and assigned the task of building St. Monica’s “National Parish” for the city’s African-American Catholics.

In 2010, the cause for his sainthood began. In 2019, Pope Francis advanced Fr Tolton to the title of Venerable, the next steps being beatification and then canonization.

To recognize and address the poverty of others, Christians must become poor like the figure of Tobit from the Hebrew Bible, Pope Francis said.

Tobit, a blind and elderly man who dedicated his life to the service of others, “can show practical concern for the poor because he has personally known what it is to be poor,” the Pope wrote in his message for the celebration of the World Day of the Poor.

The message was published June 13, the feast of St. Anthony, patron of the poor. Christians are called to “acknowledge every poor person and every form of poverty, abandoning the indifference and the banal excuses we make to protect our illusory well-being,” Pope Francis wrote. “Regardless of the color of their skin, their social standing, the place from which they came, if I myself am poor, I can recognize my brothers and sisters in need of my help.”
