Catholic Illuminations Happy 174th Anniversary to Holy Name Cathedral!

nniversaries are dates we remember and should remember with gratitude. Weddings, baptisms, Ordination dates, birth dates and death dates, all of these are dates that give meaning in our lives. Frequently, we have a false understanding that parishes have always been around, church buildings



have always been at their current location, and the annual celebrations of our faith happen. But like anything that happens in this world, parishes have a beginning.

Holy Name Parish was founded on Nov. 18, 1849, as a freestanding chapel located on the grounds of the University of St. Mary of the Lake, on the same block as the current Cathedral. After outgrowing the chapel, they built a small freestanding church on the southeast corner of Superior and Cass (Wabash). In 1851, construction began on a larger church on State between Superior and Huron. It was slow going due to lack of funds. Following the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, the bigger, still-inprogress church burned and was rebuilt at the current location of State and Superior in 1874. Also, St. Mary's Cathedral burned down during the Great Fire, so when the Holy Name Parish moved to State and Superior, the decision was to rebuild it as the Cathedral.

Holy Name Cathedral was dedicated on Nov. 21, 1875, by Bishop Thomas Foley, the Coadjutor Bishop of Chicago. You may wonder why Holy Name Parish became Holy Name Cathedral. And the answer lies in a chair, in the *'cathedra.*' The Cathedral is the church with the chair of the diocesan bishop. Every Cathedral you go to worldwide has a chair for the bishop, and only the current bishop can sit in that chair unless the Pope comes to visit. The cathedra is a symbol of authority. Our cathedra was replaced in 1968 with the renovations following Vatican II. The chair is made of wood, with three panels on the back, depicting the first Christian teachers, Jesus of Nazareth, St. Peter, and St. Paul. Above the cathedra is the coat of arms of Cardinal Blase Cupich, which is a combination of his episcopal coat of arms (the right side of the shield) and the Archdiocesan coat of arms (the left side).

Every church has a dedication day to signify the use and to give glory to God, and every church should celebrate that day with great joy because it is here within these anointed walls that we will be taken to heaven. Since "the church is a visible building, it stands as a special sign of hope of the pilgrim Church on earth and reflects the Church dwelling in heaven" (Rite of Dedication of a Church), the celebration of the anniversary of the dedication is vital to the life of a believer. One is baptized, forgiven, nourished, united, ordained, and anointed in the church. And for a Cathedral dedication, the entire diocese rejoices in knowing we are part of something bigger.

As we celebrate the 174th anniversary of the founding of Holy Name Parish and the 148th anniversary of the dedication of Holy Name Cathedral, let us thank God for his blessings, goodness, and faithfulness. Let's allow what we encounter within these walls to change the world. May we also remember that, like the ceiling of the Cathedral designed as the hull of a ship, we all belong to this faith community, and amidst the strong winds of the world, in this ship, in this sacred space, we are journeying together, in community, to our common destination of seeing God face to face for eternity. As a parish and as a Cathedral, may everything we do always be done for the glory of the Holy Name of Jesus.

Dear Friends in Christ,

The Illinois legislature abandoned nearly 10,000 children attending Catholic and other non-public schools this week by failing to renew the Invest in Kids scholarship program.
