Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

Our Season of Advent has begun. The liturgical colors have changed, and daylight continues to grow shorter. The crisp November air gives way to December's bitter winds as the barren trees brace for another long winter. Over the next few Sundays, our Advent

wreath will symbolize the light of Christ overcoming the darkness of our lives. Christ, our light and hope, is God breaking into our midst.

As we begin our Advent Season, it's easy to lose perspective and the "reason for the season." Let us not take Christ out of Christmas and wrap the gifts of love, compassion, forgiveness and time for all people, especially our family and friends. For Advent is about waiting -our waiting for God and God's waiting for us. Most importantly, we make Christ present in our midst by serving and loving others – especially those who are poor.

Advent also speaks of patience and relationships especially family. Isn't it ironic that Advent gives way to Christmas morning, followed by the Feast of the Holy Family? I am sharing with you this reflection ... please pass it on ...

"Be watchful! Be alert!" Don't be caught unaware! Jesus warns his disciples in the Gospel. We begin another Advent of watching and waiting. For some, it is a time



of delight, waiting for Christmas, for gifts, for time off from work and school, and for gatherings of family and friends. For others, it is a dreaded time, as they approach their first holiday without a loved one or worry about how they will pay for gifts and meals. Whatever our situation, the readings today help us to adopt a stance of faithful watching and waiting.

Advent is not a time of waiting for the coming of the Christ Child — that already happened. It is, rather, a time when we move into heightened alert to perceive more intensely the ways of Emmanuel, "God with us." The watchfulness that Jesus speaks about in the Gospel is not waiting in dread, nor is the object of our vigilance unknown. Rather, it is attentive listening for the familiar footstep of the returning Beloved. We would not want to be found sleeping but ready with open arms.

Happy New Year! May You Have a Short, But Sweet Advent

■he First Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of a new liturgical year. Our liturgical year is grounded in the person of Jesus Christ and the salvation offered to humanity through his life, passion, death, and resurrection, but also through his teaching, preaching, and ministry. It is only fitting to begin the



new liturgical year by preparing for his birth because there would be nothing to redeem without taking on our humanity. Advent is not so much a penitential season as it is a preparatory season as we prepare our hearts and our world for the coming of Jesus Christ in the flesh. The season of Advent focuses on the coming of Christ, the First Coming at his birth in Bethlehem, and the Second Coming when he appears in glory at the end of time. With Christ's first and second comings, we worship a God who fulfills His eternal promises. This time also reminds us to be ready. Be ready for his birth; be ready for his return in glory. Like those unaware of God walking in the flesh 2,000 years ago, we sometimes forget he continues to walk among us today, in those we meet on life's journey.

As we begin our Advent season, we pull out our Advent wreath and light the first candle. The Advent wreath historically came to the United States from German immigrants, whose pre-Christian Germanic ancestors used wreaths and candles in wintertime to look forward with hope for brighter and warmer summer days.

The symbolism of the Advent wreath points to the mystery of the season we celebrate. The circular shape shows us that there is no beginning or end to the love of God, as shown in the Incarnation - the event of God taking flesh in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. The evergreen leaves show the gift of immortality when one incorporates themselves into the life of Christ, most notably in the Sacrament of Baptism. Finally, the Advent wreath has four candles, three purple and one rose, symbolizing hope, peace, joy, and love. The lit candles represent the

light of Christ that scatters the darkness. Each week, the wreath gets brighter and brighter, showing us the coming of the Lord is near.

This year, the season of Advent is as short as it could be, just 22 days. With Dec. 24 being a Sunday, the morning Masses are the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Christmas Eve liturgically begins in the afternoon when we typically pray Vespers. Due to the Cathedral Mass schedule, we canceled the 12:30pm Mass on Sunday, Dec. 24, to allow for final preparations for the Christmas Eve liturgies at the Cathedral, which begin at 3:00pm with Christmas Eve Mass. The Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent will be offered on Saturday, Dec. 23, at 5:15pm and Sunday, Dec. 24 at 7:00am, 8:30am and 10:30am.

As we enter this sacred time of preparing and waiting, let us use this Advent season to prepare our hearts and let our minds anew for Christ's coming, who brings hope, peace, joy, and love to all who welcome him into their lives. As we sit in darkness, let us look ahead with hope, knowing the Lord has come and will come again, and we will continue to raise our voices once again in the Advent anthem: Come, Lord Jesus!

Start Being Joyful Wherever You Go

n excited volunteer shared a simple yet powerful experience he witnessed: a child's gratitude. While serving the dinner, he saw pure joy in the child's eyes when they received a warm meal and the humble gift of a



teddy bear; both felt God's presence and a tremendous sense of gratitude. It was a tangible expression of the Advent spirit — imbued with hope, peace, joy, and love. In these moments, it becomes evident that we are not merely providing sustenance but delivering a message of compassion and kindness following Christ's example.

As we engage in acts of service during Advent, we meet immediate needs and participate in a broader spiritual journey. We seek to bring joy wherever we go, becoming embodiments of hope, peace, joy, and love that define the true spirit of Christmas. I love being a priest. JMJ.






