Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God.

It is hard to believe Christmas is one week away! Many of you reading today's column are stressed and overwhelmed with everything you need to accomplish with so little time. Time out! Catch your breath, be aware of the presence of God with you, and let the natural beauty and

purpose of the Advent Season capture you.

Advent purposely places speed bumps on our December journey to Christmas morn. Stop racing for a moment. I want to share the following from the Dec. 24, 2004, Chicago Tribune editorial page. So powerful and true! ...

"Take a moment — just a sliver of today's scarce time — to appreciate family and friends, the ones you hold dear. They are, after all, the reason you're racing around like a maniac, right? With all their faults and imperfections, they are the threads that make up the tapestry of your life. Their mere presence is a priceless gift that requires no shopping or wrapping — just tolerance, patience, and love. Celebrate them."

The many Christmas greeting cards I receive this time of year always profoundly touch me. Individuals whom I haven't seen in years include notes, making their cards cherished and laced with wonderful memories. Let me share part of a beautiful Christmas letter I received from friends last year. Their message is wonderful and succinctly captures the beauty and true meaning of our Advent and Christmas seasons.

"Remember the movie "It's a Wonderful Life"? What a beautiful and heartwarming story to share around this most holy and miraculous season. At the movie's end, Clarence, the angel, says to George, "Strange, isn't it, George, how each man's life touches so many others, and when he isn't around, it leaves an awful hole." This single, most poignant sentence in the movie had me thinking for quite some time. What would life be like without a loved one, a close friend, or even myself? Life doesn't give us any time guarantees."

In the book, "Tuesdays With Morrie," Morrie tells his friend Mitch Albom, the author, that he had gotten into an argument with an old friend, and a never-repaired crack developed in their friendship. Morrie wept as he told Mitch the story. "I wish I'd made peace with him," Morrie said. "I wish I'd told him what a good friend he was." Morrie died and never got a chance to apologize and fix the terrible blemish he saw on his life record. Remember, along with the gift of forgiveness, the gift of peace usually comes.

In today's challenging times, it is often easy to get caught up with how we look on the outside.

This Christmas, we ought to concentrate on the inside. We should give some real gifts. Maybe say "I am sorry" to someone that you have offended. Maybe say "I forgive you" to someone we feel that has hurt us. Let people know how significant their presence is in your life. A simple note, a surprise call, or just a few words wrapped with a smile and a big hug will be the best present.

Before Christmas arrives, we always have an endless list of tasks to tackle. Keep it in perspective, and don't lose the real meaning of the season wrapped in the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Hold your loved ones close to you and cherish them this Holy Season. The light of the Lord Jesus shines through us despite the cold, snow, and days continuing to get darker earlier.

This season is a beautiful time of year if we connect Advent's true meaning and keep life in balance. All the running around is fine if we remember to hold loved ones dear to us and give thanks for the gift of God becoming human in Jesus so we can become divine by loving others.

The Holy Name Cathedral Advent Wreath Will Light Three Candles This Sunday

On this Sunday called Gaudete from the Latin for "rejoice," rejoicing is a thread that weaves throughout all of the readings, from the joy of



the exiles returning to Jerusalem, to the rejoicing of Mary in the "Magnificat," to Paul's insistence that Thessalonians rejoice at every moment. What is notable in each instance is that joy Is not a vague sentiment or an abstract concept. It wells up in response to very concrete signs of God's providential care.

In the Gospel, we hear John the Baptist using Isaiah's words to present himself as the "voice of one crying out in the desert, 'Make straight the way of the Lord." John is simply the one pointing toward the expected One. He is not 'the light'; he came to testify to the light and bring others to believe through his testimony. In a certain sense, though, John is a light. Just as the effective light in a room does not call attention to itself but rather enables you to see what is in the room, so too John is not the focus but rather points to the One who is the light. Holy Days have a Different Type of 'Obligation' This Year

ur modern American culture has an 'instant gratification' mentality. We want what we want, and we want it now. And that sometimes plays into our liturgical worship. This year, with Christmas Eve on a Sunday and Christmas on a Monday, people may wonder, "Do I have to go to Mass two days in a row? (the answer is yes)...and if yes, why?"



The Church's calendar marks all Sundays and some feast days as 'holy days of obligation.' The word 'obligation' may imply something is imposed or forced upon us. However, Canon Law (the official set of laws that govern the Church) speaks of an obligation that stems from 'feasts of precept.' And 'precept' means a practical rule that guides behavior, rooted in values that the believing community has come to understand through God's revelation and the Church's tradition. So, our freely embraced faith 'obliges' us to give God due worship as the Church directs us on various days throughout the year.

This rule means we are solemnly responsible for participating in the Eucharist every Sunday and on certain feast days. The Church determines how exactly we observe the particular feast days. In the United States, there are five additional Holy Days: Jan. 1 for Mary, Mother of God; Aug. 15 for Mary's Assumption into heaven; Nov. 1 for All Saints; Dec. 8 for Mary's Immaculate Conception; and Dec. 25 for the Birth of the Lord. Ascension Thursday is

celebrated on the Seventh Sunday of Easter in most U.S. dioceses. And when Jan. 1, Aug. 15, or Nov. 1 falls on a Saturday or Monday, there is no obligation to attend Mass. However, Dec. 8 and Dec. 25 are always observed as holy days of obligation, regardless of what day they fall on. So, what does this all mean for our celebrations this year?

Dec. 24 falls on a Sunday, and though it may not seem all that different, the morning Masses on Dec. 24 will celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Christmas Eve liturgically begins after 3:00pm on Sunday, Dec. 24. To fulfill the obligations of Sunday and Christmas, you may attend Mass on Saturday night and then on Dec. 24 after 3:00pm or on Monday, Dec. 25, Christmas Day. Alternatively, you may attend Sunday morning Mass on Dec. 24 and again on Christmas Eve after 3:00pm or on Christmas Day.

Due to the liturgical schedule at the Cathedral, we will not offer our regular 12:30pm Mass on Sunday, Dec. 24, to prepare for the Christmas celebrations. Our first Christmas Eve Mass will be at 3:00pm. The Cathedral doors will open at 2:00pm to welcome the faithful.

Although Christmas is so close, let us take our time with this sacred preparation period. The readings and liturgy of the Fourth Sunday of Advent are essential for us as believers to continue to wait in joyful expectation for the Messiah's coming. We have waited in darkness for liberation, freedom, and peace. As we prepare to celebrate once again the birth of our Savior, may God bless us all with ever-deeper faith in the mystery of the Word made flesh, Emmanuel, God with us.

The Stump of Jesse

Bethlehem of Our Hearts

hat? Do you mean that my imagination about the manger has been wrong for 26 years?" During my pilgrimage to Bethlehem, I was shocked but delighted when our tour guide explained that Bethlehem means "House of Bread." I



found the divine synchronicity that Jesus, hailed as the "Bread of Life" and the "Eucharist," was born in the place named for the essence of sustenance. The imagery of the manger, amid wheat, straw, and animals, adds layers of significance to this discovery. As we stand on the brink of Christmas during the third week of Advent, a reflective journey through the perspectives of key figures in the Nativity story provides a fresh air for self-examination.

St. Joseph, entrusted with the knowledge of the Lord's birth, grappled with the innkeepers' rejection and despite witnessing the Savior at their door remained oblivious or preoccupied with worldly expectations of kingship. How would it have felt to be the head of the household in that situation? Mother Mary, bearing witness to the mystery of God's Incarnation, ponders the paradox of the Savior's arrival — a virgin birth and a humble manger, contrasting starkly with anticipated manifestations of divine power. In that circumstance, how would faith manifest?

In the shadows of the night, shepherds, unaware of the impending birth, engage in mundane tasks. Yet, their hearts echo a profound thirst for the Savior. This longing becomes evident as they abandon their routine, joyfully leading their lambs to pay homage to the newborn king when the angel appears to them.

As Christmas approaches amid the hustle of shopping and year-end reports, what is the state of our hearts? Are we, like the shepherds, attuned to the anticipation of Bethlehem amid the mundane aspects of life? I pray that external demands do not overshadow this festive season and may there be a discernible place within our hearts reserved for Bethlehem - the dwelling place of the "Bread of Life." JMJ.

Young Adults Small Group **Lenten Journey**

The Small Group Lenten Journey is a spiritual pilgrimage during the Lenten season, emphasizing prayer, sacrifice, and charity. 
Option #3: Exodus 90 (Men only) starts on Jan. 6

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
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
