



Why Do Catholics Go to Midnight Mass on Christmas?

ne of the genuinely unique traditions of the Catholic Church is the celebration of Midnight Mass on Christmas. It is a beautiful tradition because it forces us out of our routine. Because no other time in the year do we gather in the darkness of night, in the chill of winter, to come to Mass. Depending on Easter



Sunday's date, it may still be cold outside in Chicago, but we begin that celebration at 8:00pm, not midnight. Midnight Mass allows us to experience the calm, peacefulness, and stillness of the night hour, waiting for the birth of the Lord.

The tradition of Midnight Mass dates back to the 4th century. A European Christian named Egeria spent three years with Christians in Jerusalem to learn about Christianity from the place of its origin. She wrote that Christians there in Jerusalem kept a vigil at midnight for the birth of the Lord because the exact time of the Lord's birth is unknown. Similarly, the precise time of his Resurrection is not known either.

However, in recent years, "Midnight" Mass changed to become known as Mass in the Night. In the Roman Missal, revised in English in 2011, the four possible Masses for Christmas are the Vigil for the Nativity of the Lord, Mass in the Night, Mass at Dawn, and Mass during the Day. Each has distinct readings and prayers for each Mass. Due to the demand on clergy, musicians, and volunteers needed for any liturgical celebration, parishes have moved Midnight Mass from midnight to 10pm or even 8pm, celebrating the Mass in the Night with the associated prayers and readings. Here at Holy Name Cathedral, for more than 75 years, we have celebrated Midnight Mass at midnight. Fr. Greg has served as the WGN commentator at our Midnight Mass for 39 consecutive years.

Like the Easter Vigil, the Mass in the Night on Christmas Eve begins with a proclamation. The Exultet, or the Easter

Proclamation, is a beautiful proclamation of the victory of Christ over sin and death through his passion and death. For Christmas, Mass in the Night begins with the Christmas proclamation. The Easter proclamation says. "O truly blessed night, worthy alone to know the time and hour when Christ rose from the underworld!" We do not know when Christ was born or when he rose, but we keep vigil with our faith communities, knowing it has happened.

The Christmas proclamation begins with creation and situates the birth of Jesus Christ in the context of secular and religious history. This baby is no ordinary child because we know that this is no ordinary birth. With the birth of this child, who is wrapped in swaddling clothes and placed in a manger, salvation has come to earth. The Christmas proclamation ends with "JESUS CHRIST, eternal God and Son of the eternal Father ... and was made man." With the birth, salvation history begins to move forward towards the salvific acts of this child, culminating in the passion, death, resurrection, and ascension of this child 33 years later.

Whether we gather at the Vigil, in the Night, at Dawn, or on the Day, the Christmas Proclamation echoes in our hearts, churches, and world, reflecting the reality that God became man and walked with his people. As we move into the joyful Christmas season, may we share our joy of God's encounter in thought, word, and deed.

The Birth of Jesus: Conceived in Faith, Full of Promise

■he gospel of Luke describes the birth of Jesus very simply: "And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger..." (Luke 2: 7). This brief description does not quite do justice to what every mother



knows, however. Giving birth to a child and becoming a mother reshapes the life of a woman. In a real sense, she herself is reborn when she gives birth to her baby. Mary's experience was like that of every other mother.

The infant Jesus, like all newborns, made infinite claims and demands on his parents. Apart from modern conven-



iences, such as disposable diapers, taking care of babies - with their endless claims and demands - has hardly changed over thousands of years. The story then is the story now, of middle-of-the-night

feedings, changing clothes, rocking to sleep, adjusting the blankets. The infant Jesus not only made endless claims and demands; he also signaled infinite promise and unlimited possibilities. Perhaps at no other time of life is so much hope thrown in our direction as when we are first born, We are little bundles of seemingly pure potential.

Mary held the newborn Jesus; she held the demands and the claims, the promise and the possibilities. Mary, the woman journeying in faith, held the child she had conceived in faith. The demands and claims of faith had become clear in her call, and she answered yes in freedom and love. The promise of faith took root in her call. She proclaimed the goodness of God and God's faithfulness to the promises made to Abraham and his descendants forever. Now it all came together. The demands and claims and promise and possibility were as specific as the child she held. Her journey of faith did not bring her to dream the impossible dream or to follow some vague and perhaps abstract ideal. Her journey led her to hold the flesh of the Word made flesh, who came to dwell among us. In her child's birth, she was reborn; her faith was renewed.

f you make a pilgrimage to
Bethlehem, how can you avoid the
long lines waiting to venerate the
birthplace of the Lord in the Nativity
Grotto? Here is a tip! Attend the
Catholic Mass offered at 4:55am. While
there, a favorite activity was waking up
early, walking around while the city was



still sleeping, bending my knees to pass through the Door of Humility and enter the massive Basilica. From there, I attended Mass at the Grotto, and venerated the holy site without waiting in line. As I exited the Basilica, the aroma of fresh bread and coffee greeted me before returning to the classroom.

I was often accompanied by seminarian friends during my wanderings, with a few Christmas songs echoing in my heart. But I reflect on another song, not a classic Christmas song, "Make Room" by Casting Crowns. The lyrics are:

Young Adults Small Group Lenten Journey

The Small Group Lenten Journey is a spiritual pilgrimage during the Lenten season, emphasizing prayer, sacrifice, and charity. It encourages participants to break away from their daily routines, focus on their spiritual growth, and draw closer to Christ. Option #1: Fiat 40 (Women only) starts on Feb. 15

Option #2: 40-Days Journey (Co-Ed) begins on Feb. 15



What is a Mass Intention?

Light a Prayer Candle
