Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Christmas morn has passed, but we continue our Christmas season as we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany this weekend.

What does Epiphany mean? As many of you know, Epiphany means appearance or revelation. It implies

a showing, a direction for our search. And interestingly enough, the scriptures imply it's a search that everyone must make. In the Gospel, Luke has the poor searching in the form of shepherds. In his Gospel, Matthew has the learned and rich searching in the form of the Magi. So the message is that there is room for everybody in this search for life's meaning and purpose, from no degrees to PhDs, from shepherds to executives.

And so, to the Magi. They are three searchers who did not find the answer to life in their horoscopes but took a long and challenging journey to another country in search of Christ.

The Feast of the Epiphany means finding Christ and letting the Lord Jesus find us. It is not a one-time thing. Instead, finding the Lord is a life-long quest, like a marriage or a profound friendship. Like the Magi, we gather to focus on the One who loves us and abides with us. The more we connect the way of Jesus with our story — if searching is our road — then finding will be our home.

Epiphany is about dreams, hopes, searching and direction. The journey is more critical than the destination. What are we searching for and what are we finding in our lives? We sometimes seek happiness in all the wrong places. Dream big dreams! However, in our search, always keep our eyes fixed on the Lord Jesus Christ, and doors will open we never dreamed possible.

As we begin a new year, we make many resolutions: lose weight, control temper, learn to relax, or spend more time with the family. Many people talk about reducing stress in their lives. I share the following connection with the Feast of the Epiphany. Enjoy ... and pass it on ...

Stress Management

When explaining stress management to an audience, a

lecturer raised a glass of water and asked, "How heavy is this glass of water?" Answers called out ranged from 20g to 500g. The lecturer replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long you try to hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance. It's the same weight in each case, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes."

He continued, "And that's the way it is with stress management. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry on. As with the glass of water, you must put it down and rest for a while before holding it again. When refreshed, we can carry on with the burden. So, before you return home tonight, put the burden of work down. Don't carry it home. You can pick it up tomorrow. Whatever burdens you're carrying now, let them down for a moment if you can."

So, my friend, why not take a while to simply RELAX? Put down anything that may be a burden to you right now. Don't pick it up again until after you've rested for a while. Life is short. Enjoy it!

Epiphany also means letting life surprise us. Keep reading ...

"When I was a small boy in Kansas, a friend of mine and I went fishing. As we sat there on a riverbank in the warmth of the summer afternoon, we talked about what we wanted to do when we grew up. I told him I wanted to be a real major league baseball player, a genuine professional like Honus Wagner. My friend said he'd like to be President of the United States.

Today's solemnity continues the celebration of the mystery of God's manifestation to the very ends of the earth. The visitors from the East



symbolizes the extent of God's salvation as it unfolds. As they offer gifts, as would be fitting for a king, they announce to the world that an astonishing event has taken place; all peoples will know the glory of God.

Today's verses are frequently identified as "the adoration of the Magi." The word Bethlehem, the place of Jesus' birth, appears four times in the twelve verses of Matthew's Gospel. Might we consider this town, this earthly place, a specific location at a given time in human history, where Jesus, son of David and Son of God, is made manifest in human flesh? It is because of this mystery of the incarnation that the author of the of the Letter to the Ephesians could write of the Spirit "that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise of Christ Jesus through the Gospel."

Catholic Illuminations Baptism: The Gateway into the Life of the Church

Nike our current culture, the Christmas season does not end on Dec. 26. As a Church, we continue to sing Christmas carols, decorate our worship spaces, and celebrate the wonder and joy of Christmas Day until the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. This year, due to the way the calendar falls, the



Baptism of the Lord is not celebrated the Sunday after the Epiphany. Instead, it will fall on the Monday following the Epiphany on Jan. 8.

Without going deep into the reasons and significance of why Jesus, who knew no sin, I would like to focus on the general meaning of baptism and the impact it has on our life as believers.

We profess each weekend in our Creed, "I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins." We may wonder what this one baptism is and what it means to confess one baptism. There are many Christian denominations and many forms of baptism in our world. The "one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins" is recognized as the one instituted by Jesus himself before his ascension to the right hand of the Father, when he tells the Apostles: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). This is known as the trinitarian formula and is necessary for a valid and licit baptism.

Some denominations do not use this formula, and in the eyes of the Catholic Church, the person is not validly baptized. Even a tiny change in the formula, such as "We baptize in the name of the Father. ..." Or "I baptize you through the Creator, the Redeemer, and the Sanctifier," makes the baptism invalid. These formulas are inaccurate because they are not the words of the Church or the Lord himself.

Baptism is the gateway Sacrament into the life of the

Church. It becomes the way to encounter the Lord's mercy, tenderness, love, and friendship. By being baptized, we are immersed into the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ and sent on a mission into the world as disciples to be his hands and his feet, proclaiming the Good News that God has come. To confess the one Baptism means to believe that sin, both original and personal, is forgiven in baptism, and we become children of the Almighty Father. The Sacrament of Baptism allows us to place our faith in Jesus Christ, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

As we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we move into the season of Ordinary Time. This year, we have six weeks before beginning our Lenten journey on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 14. Ordinary Time allows us to focus on the mission of Jesus, to proclaim the Good News to the world, in word and deed. As we confess the one Baptism once again in our Creed this weekend, may we be aware that in baptism, we are forgiven of our sins, made children of God, and sent on a mission to bring that Good News to others.

More Than 1,200 People Attended Midnight Mass at Holy Name Cathedral


