

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

The Christmas trees are down and stored for another year. Our Christmas season ended last weekend, but the journey continues. The Christmas Season gives way to Ordinary Time (until we start our Lenten season), but there is nothing ordinary about Ordinary Time!

Winter is upon us, and spring is still a long distance off.

The different seasons of the year reflect the seasons of our lives. We all seek answers regardless of age but raising great questions from the depths of our being is essential. Reflect upon the following...

Prayer for a Questioning Heart

It seems to me, Lord, that we search much too desperately for answers when a good question holds as much grace as an answer.

Jesus, you are the Great Questioner. Keep your questions alive that we may always be seekers rather than settlers.

Guard us well from the sin of settling in with our answers hugged to our breasts.

Make us wondering far-sighted, questioning restless people and give us the feet of pilgrims on this journey unfinished.

At the same time, we can take so much for granted, and winter's cold, dark days can add to the season's slump. What gets us out of bed in the morning? How do we handle the daily routine of living? I share a wonderful little vignette geared toward newly married couples but truly applicable to everyone in any meaningful relationship — no matter the age!

Common Table Salt

Asked to give the toast at a friend's wedding reception, the guest presented the couple with a beautifully decorated gift box. Inside the box was salt — common table salt. The guest then offered this toast to the couple: "It's hard to keep a house without salt. It adds flavor and taste to just about every dish. But if you run out of toothpaste, you can brush with a mixture of soda and salt because of the salt's cleaning qualities.

Because of its healing properties, you can gargle with salt if you develop a sore throat.

If you're hungry, you can cure ham or other meat with salt because of its preserving qualities.

You can use salt to melt the ice that builds up in the winter cold or to put out fires that flare up.

So, if you bring to the marriage the qualities found in salt — the cleansing quality, the healing quality, the preserving quality —

If you use it to enhance the flavor of your life together, to melt the ice that will build up and put out the fires that will occasionally flare up between you, and, of course, if you take everything with a grain of salt, you will have a long and happy life together."

And while I think about it, never add salt to the wound! And I close with ...

The Little Hut

The only shipwreck survivor washed up on a small, uninhabited island. He prayed feverishly for God to rescue him, and every day, he scanned the horizon for help, but none seemed forthcoming. Exhausted, he eventually managed to build a little hut out of driftwood to protect himself from the elements and to store his few possessions. But then, one day, after scavenging for food, he arrived home to find his little hut in flames, the smoke rolling up to the sky. The worst had happened -everything was lost. He was stunned with grief and anger. "God, how could you do this to me?" he cried.

Early the next day, however, he was awakened by the sound of a ship approaching the island. It had come to rescue him. "How did you know I was here?" asked the weary man of his rescuers. "We saw your smoke signal," they replied.

It's easy to get discouraged sometimes when things appear to be going badly. But we shouldn't lose heart because God is at work in our lives, even amid pain and suffering. Remember, next time your little hut is burning to the ground, it just may be a smoke signal that summons the grace of God.

On the Cover

A painting of St. John the Evangelist by Miguel Vaguer (1959), located at El Buen Pastor parish, Valencia, Spain

Unlike the other gospels, the Gospel of John does not depict Jesus calling the first disciples while walking along the shore of the Sea of Galilee. John the



Baptist points two of his disciples toward the "Lamb of God." As in the other gospels, they take heed and follow Jesus. But there is a different dynamic here, Jesus has not called these two, and seeing them following, he turns and questions them, "What are you looking for?" Their reply might seem at first to be oddly out of place: "Where are you staying?" Here the evangelist introduces one of the key theological emphases of this gospel: abiding, or staying, with Jesus. The Greek verb, menein, "to abide," is repeated twice more, as the two went "and saw where Jesus was staying (menei), and they stayed (emeinan) with him." It is a good time to consider the person or people who have been most instrumental in bringing us to Jesus and to pray in thanksgiving for them. And the more challenging question: Who have we brought, or are we bringing, to Jesus?

It's Time for the Annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

he Week of Prayer for Christian Unity begins each year on Jan. 18, culminating on the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on Jan. 25. The first Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, initially called the Church Unity Octave, was held in a chapel 50 miles north of New York City in 1908. It was hosted by the Franciscan Friars and



Sisters of the Atonement, who desired unity between the Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches. The founders of this community were a priest and a sister who converted to Catholicism. Pope Benedict XV declared that the Church Unity Octave be celebrated throughout the Universal Church. But why were the dates Jan. 18 to Jan. 25 chosen?

The Feast of the Chair of St. Peter in the Roman Catholic Church and the Feast of the Confession of St. Peter in the Anglican Church were celebrated on the same day, Jan. 18. It was only in the reforms of the Liturgical Calendar under St. Pope John XXIII in 1960 that this feast was merged, along with seven other feasts that were similar or mysterious in origin, that the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter was moved to Feb. 22. So, without moving the Week of Unity altogether, it remained the same despite the Catholic liturgical changes. In the southern hemisphere, however, the Week of Prayer is celebrated between the Feast of the Ascension and Pentecost, another symbolic octave period.

The Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul is monumental, given his story. Before his 'conversion,' St. Paul was a leader in Judaism who sought to persecute the early Church. In Acts of the Apostles, it is recorded that he was responsible for the stoning of St. Stephen, the first martyr, who we remember annually on Dec. 26 (Acts 8:1). Before Paul's conversion, found in Acts 9, he was known as Saul. From his experience on the Road to Damascus, Saul went from persecuting the Church to being one of the most essential Apostles, writing letters to various early communities constituting more than half the New Testament. We then see that the beginning and ending dates of this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity are symbolic: St. Peter, the First Pope, and St. Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles. These two saints had differences among themselves but worked together for the unity and mission of the Church. As the Catholic Church, we also have divisions and must work for unity, just as the early Apostles did.

It was not until the Second Vatican Council that the Roman Catholic Church took up the call for ecumenical dialogue with fervor. Following the Council document *Unitatis redintegratio* (Restoration of Unity), the Church no longer saw non-Catholic Christians as heretics but as separated brothers and sisters. This movement opened the way to more fruitful dialogue, not seeing the differences between other Christian denominations but similarities.

This year's theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is: "You shall love the Lord your God... and your neighbor as yourself" (Luke 10:27). As we embark on another Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, let us earnestly pray with Christians around the world for unity among us. Let us pray with Christians around the world for peace and understanding. Let us pray, with our Lord as he endured his agony in the garden, "that they may be one, as we are one" (John 17:22). Let us realize we all worship the same God, the God who came among us to show us how to love.



A Reflection on Stewardship

When I started at the parish school, I received my own tiny envelopes. And each Sunday my parents gave me a few coins to put in my envelope. I knew that putting something in the basket was important because although it was hard to stretch a paycheck to pay our rent, buy food, pay tuition, etc. our church had expenses, too.

It was important that we all helped so that we could attend Mass, receive Holy Communion, and keep things going to support our parish family. Fast forward to 2024 and I still try and help my parish, which is now Holy Name Cathedral, in whatever way I can. I realize that most people don't have the means to be a "big donor" or maybe even a "medium donor" but we all can give whatever we can to help support Holy Name and its great ministries. We're all in this together."
