# Reflections from Our Rector\_



#### Dear People of God,

What are we looking for in life? What are we finding? During these cold weeks of winter, it is easy to grow impatient and critical as we anxiously await the arrival of spring. Yet, each day is a profound gift from God and a new beginning. Do you find joy in life?

Do you bring joy to others? The following beautiful story captures well how the presence of God is made visible through us no matter the time of year. Enjoy the following and pass it on. ...

#### Where is God's Perfection?

In Brooklyn, New York, Shush is a school for learningdisabled children. Some children remain in Shush for their entire school careers, while others can be mainstreamed into conventional schools. At a fundraising dinner, the father of a Shush child delivered this unforgettable story. After extolling the school and its dedicated staff, he cried out, "Where is the perfection in my son, Shaya? Everything God does is done with perfection. But my child cannot understand facts and figures like other children. Where is God's perfection?"

The audience was shocked by the question, pained by the father's anguish, and stilled by the piercing query. "I believe," the father answered, "that when God brings a child like this into the world, the perfection that he seeks is the way people react to this child."

He then told the following story about his son Shaya: One afternoon, Shaya and his father walked past a park where some boys Shaya knew were playing baseball. Shaya asked, "Do you think they will let me play?" Shaya's father knew his son was not athletic, so most boys did not want him on their team. But Shaya's father understood that if they chose his son to play, it would give him a comfortable sense of belonging.

Shaya's father approached a player and asked if Shaya could play. Looking for guidance and getting none from his teammates, the boy took matters into his own hands. He said, "We are in the eighth inning and losing by six runs, so I guess he can be on our team. We will try to put him up to bat in the ninth inning." Shaya's father was ecstatic as Shaya smiled broadly. Shaya put on a glove and headed out to play short center field. In the bottom of the eighth inning, Shaya's team scored a few runs, and in the ninth inning, Shaya's team scored again but was still down by two. They had two outs and bases loaded with the potential winning run on base.

Next to bat was Shaya. Would the team let Shaya bat at this juncture and give away their chance to win the game? Surprisingly, they gave Shaya the bat even though Shaya didn't know how to hold it properly, let alone hit with it. As Shaya stepped up to the plate, the pitcher moved a few steps to lob the ball softly so Shaya would at least be able to make contact. The first pitch came in, and Shaya swung and missed. One of Shaya's teammates approached him, and they held the bat together as they waited for the next pitch. The pitcher took a few steps forward again to toss the ball softly toward Shaya.

Shaya and his teammate swung at the bat as the pitch came in, hitting a slow ground ball. Instead of ending the game with an easy out at first base, the pitcher threw a high arc, far beyond the reach of the first baseman. Everyone started yelling, "Shaya, run! Run to first." He scampered down the baseline to first base, wide-eyed and startled. By the time he arrived, the right fielder had the ball and could have tagged Shaya out at second base. But the right fielder understood the pitcher's intentions, so he threw the ball high and far over the second baseman's head. Everyone yelled, "Run to second!" Shaya ran as the runners ahead of him deliriously circled the bases toward home.

As Shaya reached second base, the opposing shortstop turned him to face third base, shouting, "Run to third." As Shaya rounded third, both teams ran behind him screaming, "Shaya, run home." Shaya ran home and stepped on home plate. All 18 boys lifted him on their shoulders as the hero who just hit a "Grand Slam" and won the game for his team.

"That day," said the father softly, with tears rolling down his face, "those 18 boys reached their level of God's perfection."





# Celebrate Candlemas and Follow the Light of the World

n often overlooked liturgical celebration in our calendar year is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. The dating of the Presentation of the Lord, 40 days after Christmas, coincides with the Jewish purity laws of purification of the mother. These laws can be found



throughout the Book of Leviticus, one of the five books of the Torah, or Jewish Law. And also in accord with Jewish Law, in remembrance of the great flight into Egypt, as the Angel of Death passed over the houses in Egypt striking the first born, each first born son was to be dedicated to God in gratitude and recognition for the freedom from Egypt (Exodus 13:2).

The Presentation of the Lord is also known as Candlemas Day. On this day, traditionally the candles used throughout the liturgical year would be blessed at this Mass, along with a candle procession to the altar. This is in reference to the prophet Simeon, who is in the Temple when Joseph and Mary present Jesus, and says of the child, "He will be a light to the nations" (Luke 2:32).

In our world today, we do not rely as heavily on candles as our ancestors, due to modern electricity, but candles are still very important to our worship. The candles main function is to provide light; thus in our historic cathedral, built in 1875 before the modern electrification of America, we used many candles. But there was, and is, another source of light to allow us to worship. The stained glass windows in our Cathedral are unique, and abstract compared to what they were before the renovation in 1968-69. Before the renovation, the windows depicted biblical stories to teach the faithful aspects of our faith, in case those in the pews were uncatechized.

The stained glass windows in the Cathedral now, were crafted in Milan, and also tell a story of light. Looking from the back windows near the State Street doors, we see dark colors of blue. As we process up to the altar, the window shades move from dark blues, to yellow, and the most transparent window of them all, the center window of the Cathedral. And one can't help but notice, to truly look at that window, you need to look through the cross, through the pain and the suffering and the evil of the world, and that the world can inflict upon each other, and looking through Jesus, find light, peace, and love.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus tells us he is the light of the world (cf. John 8:12). And from his Presentation in the Temple, we see that we should follow that light. What the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord reminds us, by Joseph and Mary presenting their child in the Temple, being ritually pure to do so, is that Jesus is the light that needs to shine in the darkness. That we as disciples, given the Light of Christ at our Baptism, are meant to keep it burning brightly until we join the saints in the heavenly court. As we celebrate Candlemas Day on Friday, let us let our light shine, so other's may see God's good work in our lives.

Holy Name Cathedral's Ministry of Care is dedicated to engaging fellow Catholics in prayer, reflection, and support so these individuals feel the comfort of faith when faced with a serious illness or chronic disease. Ministers of Care (MOCs) visit Catholics while they are undergoing treatment in a healthcare facility or facing an illness that has them homebound. MOCs visit with those undergoing treatment at a time when they face challenges in their lives. Ministers comfort these individuals by offering conversation, a listening presence, the comfort of prayer, and sharing the Eucharist. Through the compassion extended by Ministers of Care, individuals in need of care experience the nearness of God and a connection to their faith community as they journey on the road to recovery. Ministers of Care visit people in their homes or at one of our local healthcare facilities.

Ministers of Care serve weekly or twice monthly for approximately two hours each time. Comprehensive training and continuing education are provided to those

# Stewardship: From Fr. Greg

#### Dear People of God,

Last weekend I spoke at all the Masses about Stewardship.
Stewardship is one of our strategic pillars, providing the foundation of our Cathedral Faith Community, along with Worship, Evangelization, Service, Young Adult Ministry, Archdiocese, and Spiritual Formation.

Stewardship is recognizing that all we have is a gift from God, and how we accept these gifts and share them with others is our gift back to God. Thank you for the gifts you share with Holy

Name Cathedral. We are very grateful for your financial support.

Holy Name Cathedral is a totally self-funded parish. We do not receive funding from the Archdiocese and rely on the generosity of our parishioners, visitors, and friends to fund the operating expenses of the parish. Operating expenses include staff and clergy salaries, building maintenance and operating costs like heat and electricity, ministries to serve our communities, and the beautiful music that supports our worship.

In last week's bulletin we included the Statement of Operating Activities for Fiscal Year 2023. It was also included with a letter sent to all parishioners. This report details our operating income and expenses and shows a deficit of \$426,859. For the past few years, our Sunday collection has not been offsetting weekly expenses to operate our parish and we have had to deploy fundraisers to try to close the gap as much as possible. Even with



these fundraisers, we are still running a deficit.

As a parish, our goal is to operate in the black and not the red. Currently, the average weekly donation to the Sunday offertory collection is \$20 and for that we are very grateful. We are asking you to prayerfully reflect on your current giving to the Sunday offertory collection and consider increasing it to the best of your ability, by 5% if possible. If you are a parishioner who currently does not donate to the Sunday offertory collection, we ask that you consider becoming an active contributor.

If every parishioner participates in the Sunday offertory collection and donates an amount to the best of their ability, we are confident this deficit will be eliminated. By eliminating the deficit, we can focus all our energy and attention on growing our existing ministries and offering new ones that fulfill the spiritual needs of our faith community and beyond.

Please prayerfully reflect on your participation in the Sunday offertory collection and what you can do to support our vibrant and wonderful faith community. You will find quarterly financial reports and ministry updates in future issues of the bulletin.

Thank you for the gifts of your treasure and all you do to support Holy Name Cathedral. God bless you and your family.
