

What often makes the difference between experiencing life as an endless drudgery and utter misery and being alive with energy

# Come to our Healing Mass and Receive an Anointing

■he Anointing of the Sick is one of the Church's seven sacraments. Combined with the Sacrament of Reconciliation. they are known as sacraments of healing. There has been a lot of misunderstanding about the sacrament, and many falsely associate it only to be celebrated in the hour



of death. But the reality is that it, like the other six Sacraments, is for the living. And so we celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick at life's moments when we need healing in body, mind, and spirit, though sometimes that healing is also at the moment of death.

Like all Sacraments, the Anointing of the Sick brings one into an encounter with Jesus Christ. The Sacrament enables sick persons to find solace and comfort during their illness, allowing them to live out their call of discipleship in their illness. The beginning pages of the Praenotanda of the Ritual for the Anointing of the Sick says, "By their witness, the sick show that our mortal life must be redeemed through the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection" (Pastoral Care for the Sick, 3). We see that the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus have touched everything that happens in this life.

Celebrating the Anointing of the Sick is personal and communal, belonging to the individual and the Church community. It is personal because the individual receives the grace of the Holy Spirit and communal because the

church community unites in prayer for the ill person. This dual perspective contrasts with how society sometimes treats sick people. Before the Second Vatican Council, the Anointing of the Sick was celebrated in extremis only as a person approached death. So, it was known as "Last Rites" and "Extreme Unction." The Council affirmed that this was indeed a sacrament for the sick and not only for those near death. The personal and communal aspects of the Sacrament of Anointing means a priest can anoint in a hospital room, or within the context of a Mass.

Anointing is also for those who are seriously ill, people about to undergo surgery, older people who struggle with declining health, people with chronic illnesses, and those who have mental illness. Priests can anoint people suffering at any point in their life and can be celebrated more than once; it is not a Sacrament that can only be celebrated once, like Baptism or Confirmation.

This upcoming Saturday, Feb. 10, the 9:00am Mass will be a Healing Mass. This Mass will have the Anointing of the Sick for those who have come to reflect on the Sacrament and their current health issues and avail themselves of this Sacrament. Sunday, Feb. 11, is the World Day of Prayer for the Sick and traditionally the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, whose water at the Grotto in Lourdes is known for miraculous healings. How appropriate then to approach Mary, the mother of the Divine Physician, through the celebration of the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, to seek healing in mind, body, and spirit so the sick can draw close to Christ and see suffering as a participation in the salvation of the world.

# **Adult Confirmation Classes Sign-ups Now Open**


#### Sessions begin Feb. 22

# **Spiritual Formation and Accompaniment**

Over the past year, Cardinal Cupich and Holy Name Cathedral have been accompanying migrants who have been granted legal status to apply for asylum in the United States. We have, for instance, assisted a family of six from Venezuela, a father, mother, and four children, by providing temporary housing, furniture, clothing, food and spiritual accompaniment. We pray for comprehensive immigration reform, as we strive to help meet the needs of these new arrivals, many whom we see in the streets near Holy Name Cathedral. One of the biggest hurdles these families face is navigating the complicated legal process for a successful asylum claim. Other challenges are learning a new language, obtaining work permits, enrolling their children in school and finding housing. Those of you who attended the Spanish Mass for Migrants on Dec. 17 at the Cathedral know that we had around 700 migrants with many families and small children in attendance. We could use more help. 

# Join Our Ministry of Care & Take Communion to the Sick

#### Training on Feb. 10 at 9am in the Rectory

Holy Name Cathedral's Ministry of Care is dedicated to engaging fellow Catholics in prayer, reflection, and support so these individuals feel the comfort of faith when faced with a



serious illness or chronic disease. Ministers of Care (MOCs) visit Catholics while they are undergoing treatment in a healthcare facility or facing an illness that has them homebound. MOCs visit with those undergoing treatment at a time when they face challenges in their lives. Ministers comfort these individuals by offering conversation, a listening presence, the comfort of prayer, and sharing the Eucharist. Ministers of Care visit people in their homes or at one of our local healthcare facilities.

Ministers of Care serve weekly or twice monthly for approximately two hours each time. Comprehensive training and continuing education are provided to those who serve in the Ministry.

Our Saturday, Feb. 10 training will include Fr. Greg Sakowicz who will share his journey as a priest caring for those who are sick and dying. We will also have Fr. Louis Cameli speaking about sharing the mystery of the Eucharist, including its meaning and best practices for distributing Communion.

### The Perfect Steward

Our readings today remind us that Christ came to serve. Jesus' entire life was focused on others. He came to fulfill His Father's mission — the salvation of mankind. He labored for this mission by becoming the humblest of servants. In today's Gospel, Simon says to Jesus, "Everyone is looking for you." Jesus did not seek after the praise. Rather, He responded by saying, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also." Jesus was already looking to whom He could serve next.

As Christian stewards, we are also called to be humble servants who labor for our Father's mission. We should strive to imitate the Perfect Steward, Who was constantly aware of the needs of those around Him and put His gifts to good use. For us, this begins right here in our home, parish, and community. We are called to live each moment in awareness of our Father's mission and in gratitude for all He has given us.

Jesus tells us that the way to be attentive is through prayer. Before Jesus made the decision to go to the nearby villages to preach, He first went off to pray. It is through prayer that Jesus could hear what His Father was asking of Him. We, too, are called to spend time in daily prayer — we will then become aware of the opportunities to serve the Lord.

Let us commit to finding some quiet time this week to pray. Let us ask the Lord — how can I serve You better throughout my days? And let us pray, "Make me humble, Lord."




