

# **Reflections from Our Rector**



#### Dear People of God,

Our Lenten journey begins this week with Ash Wednesday. We are literally marked for the season of penance, forgiveness and probing deeply the areas of our life which need an overhauling.

What are the areas in my life that I hold onto (won't let go) which keep me from loving, living and forgiving? Many of us become our own worst enemy. Lent is a wonderful opportunity to let go and turn our lives over to the Lord Jesus. How do we do this? We need to keep life in perspective and realize God wants us to share our gifts. However, we are not the message: we are the Lord's messengers! Reflect (and smile) on the following:

- 1. God wants spiritual fruit, not religious nuts!
- 2. Dear God, I have a problem, it's me.
- 3. Growing old is inevitable; growing up is optional.
- 4. There is no key to happiness. The door is always open.
- 5. Silence is often misinterpreted but never misquoted.
- 6. Do the math count your blessings.
- 7. Faith is the ability to not panic.
- 8. Laugh every day; it's like inner jogging.
- 9. If you worry, you didn't pray. If you pray, don't worry.

10. As a child of God, prayer is kind of like calling home every day.

11. Blessed are the flexible for they shall not be bent out of shape.

12. The most important things in your home are the people.

13. When we get tangled up in our problems, be still. God wants us to be still so God can untangle the knot.

14. A grudge is a heavy thing to carry.

15. He who dies with the most toys is still dead.

Along life's journey it is also important to realize we need each other. We are not built to be islands. As we gather around the Table of the Lord each weekend, we are the church – the Body of Christ. We are nourished by the Word of God and the Holy Eucharist and then challenged to be Christ to all those we meet in the days ahead. We are the church and Lent is a wonderful time to recommit our lives to the Lord within the Faith Community. The following story "speaks" volumes – read and pass it on...

A man stopped going to church, so his pastor decided to pay him a home visit. It was a chilly evening and the pastor found him home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for the pastor's visit, the man welcomed him and they both sat guietly still by the fireplace, contemplating the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After a while, the pastor got up, reached for the tongs, and carefully picked a burning ember from the flames, placing it on one side of the hearth. Then he returned to his chair, still silent. The host watched all this in guiet reflection. Momentarily, the lone ember glowed but soon it flickered, died and became cold. Not a single word was exchanged since the initial greeting. The pastor soon glanced at his watch. Realizing it was time to leave, he stood up, picked up the cold, dead ember and returned it to the middle of the fire where it immediately began to glow brightly in the light and warmth of the burning coals surrounding it. As his pastor opened the door to leave, the man spoke with a tear running down his cheek, "Thank you for your visit and for your fiery homily. I'll be back at church next Sunday." Sometimes the very best homilies are the ones left unspoken. May we preach a homily with our lives.

And, speaking of homilies, here are six things you'll probably never hear in church from the congregation.

1. Hey! It's my turn to sit in the front pew!

2. I was so enthralled; I never noticed your homily went 25 minutes.

3. Personally, I find evangelizing much more enjoyable than golf.

4. I've decided to give our church the \$500 a month I used to send to TV evangelists.

5. Since we're all here, let's start Mass early.

6. Father, we'd like to send you to this Bible seminar in Hawaii.

### **Catholic Illuminations Renew Our Hearts and Minds During the Lenten Season**

his Wednesday, the Church will begin our journey through the desert with Ash Wednesday, in preparation for the joyful day of Easter Sunday. The ritual of marking ourselves with ashes as a sign of repentance from sin goes back to the Old Testament. Ashes are a sign of humility and repentance, of



recognizing our sinfulness and desiring to be made new in God's sight. Throughout the Old Testament, many people marked themselves with ashes as they recognized their sinfulness, recognizing their need to change their ways (cf. 2 Samuel 13:19, cf. Esther 4:1,3; cf. Job 42:6, cf. Jeremiah 6:26). The usage of ashes in our Catholic tradition links us to our Old Testament roots.

Attending Mass or a prayer service on Ash Wednesday to get ashes on our forehead to "show off" to our coworkers, family members, or people on the street that we are Christian is not in line with the spirituality of this day. Ash Wednesday begins our Lenten journey of ongoing conversion and repentance. It is a way for us as individuals to realize we are sinners, we are mortal, and we are dust, but with God, through our baptism and profession of faith in Jesus Christ, we are redeemed and set free from sin and death. The use of ashes is a reminder to us in a very tangible way that we cannot do life alone, that there is always a need for renewal and repentance, and by journeying in the desert with Jesus for 40 days, we will be able to focus on renewing our spiritual lives.

The three traditional pillars of Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Through prayer, we renew our relationship with God. We recognize more deeply how we need to depend more on God, his love, and his mercy. By fasting, we try to detach ourselves from worldly allurements and desires. We give things up during Lent to turn our attention back to God, who fulfills our desires. By almsgiving, we seek to help those who cannot help themselves, restore our common humanity, and strive to be agents of solidarity and accompaniment. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving should redirect our hearts and our minds towards God, assisting us in this sacred time to change our ways, and above all, help us to remember that we are dust and we shall return to dust, also reminding us to repent, and believe in the Gospel.

The Cathedral will distribute Rice Bowls, a practical way of giving alms during the Lenten season. The proceeds of our almsgiving will benefit Catholic Relief Services, the official relief and development agency of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. The money raised through Rice Bowls helps communities in over 100 countries alleviate the strain of poverty. We will collect the rice bowls during Holy Week.

As we enter this sacred season, may we be renewed in our hearts and minds, and through the cross traced on our foreheads in ashes, we are saved, made free through the sacrifice of Christ, and promised eternal life through our baptism.

# **Accompaniment of Migrants**

Over the past year, Cardinal Cupich and Holy Name Cathedral have accompanied migrants granted legal status to apply for asylum in the United States. For instance, we've assisted a family of six from Venezuela with young children by providing temporary housing, furniture, clothing, food and spiritual accompaniment.

We pray for comprehensive immigration reform, as we strive to help meet the needs of these new arrivals. Some of the hurdles these families face are navigating the complicated legal process for a successful asylum claim, learning a new language, obtaining work permits, enrolling their children in school and finding housing. Our recent Spanish Mass for Migrants on Dec. 17 at the Cathedral had around 700 migrants with many families and small children in attendance.





# What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received.
