Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

Our Lenten journey now moves into the Third Sunday of Lent. How quickly these Lenten days are moving — much like our lives! Has Lent become just another forty days in our lives, or have we taken the time to do an inventory of our lives? Lent offers a "speedbump"

along the road of life to help us slow down and put Gospel values always on the main road.

Leo Tolstoy tells this delightful story in Fables and Fairytales:

There once was a king who desired to be a great and just ruler. He summoned the best minds of his kingdom to advise him. Then, the king heard about an old hermit renowned for his holiness and insight. Accompanied by a small band of knights, the king went to the old man's cottage. As he approached the hermit's small hut, he ordered his men to remain behind. The king then put on the cloak of a commoner and walked to the hermitage alone.

The king found the hermit digging in his small garden. The king said, "I have come to you, wise hermit, to ask you three guestions: How can I learn to do the right thing at the right time? Who are the people I most need, and whom should I pay more attention to than others? And how can I know what the right thing to do is?

The hermit listened but said nothing; he continued his digging. The king saw that the work was taxing on the frail old man, so the king offered to help. The hermit handed him the shovel, and the king took over digging new garden beds.

As he worked, the king repeated his three questions. Before the hermit could answer, they saw a man stumbling up the path to the hermitage. Blood flowed from a gash in the man's stomach. The king and the hermit caught the man just as he collapsed. They took him inside the hut, washed and treated his wounds, and gave him fresh water.

The following day, the man woke up and immediately recognized the king changing his bandage.

"Forgive me, my lord," the man said, trembling. "Forgive you? For what?" the king asked. "I'm your enemy," the

man explained. "In an uprising against you, you killed my brother and seized our lands. I followed you here, intending to kill you. But as I came to the hermitage, your men recognized and wounded me. I managed to escape but would have bled to death had you not cared for me. I owe you my life and am now of your service for the rest of my days.

Deeply moved to be reconciled with an old enemy, the king forgave the man and promised to return his lands. The king then called for his knights to take the man back to his castle, where he could be properly cared for. The king then asked the hermit his three questions again. The hermit said simply, "But you have answered them." "How? When?" the perplexed king asked.

"Do you not see that if you had not pitied my weakness yesterday and had not dug those beds for me but had gone on your way, that man would have ambushed you and killed you? So the most important time was when you were digging in my garden; I was the most important person.

And the good you did for me was the most important business. Later, when the man came to us bleeding and near death, had you not cared for him, he would have died without making peace with you. The most important person was the man; your care was the most important thing you could do, and the right time was when you were doing it."

"Remember, then, that the most important time is now because the present is the only time we can control. The most necessary person is the one in need. And the most important pursuit is to do good for them, for it is for that purpose alone that God has sent us into this life."

As we continue our Lenten journey to the Cross with the Lord, may we care for and forgive others – NOW! And, please, trust God and take the time to pray this Lent – NOW!

and hear him confront the religious authorities in the temple in Jerusalem. The most obvious focus of today's reading is Jesus' cleansing of the temple, followed by reference to his impending death and resurrection. Looking carefully at the passage, though, we see that the last verses turn attention to the people who had begun "to believe in his name when they saw signs he was doing. But Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew them all." The reading is clear that a reciprocal relationship between Jesus and believers exist. It is implied that some people were beginning to follow Jesus because they were interested in seeing great works, not because they trusted him.



Purification and Enlightenment: It's Time for the Scrutinies

s we continue in this season of Lent, our liturgy offers us a unique look into the preparation of the Elect — those who will be baptized, confirmed, and receive their First Communion at the Great Vigil of Easter on Holy Saturday. The period of purification and enlightenment begins as the Rite



of Election concludes, which was just celebrated here at the Cathedral over the past two weekends, where the catechumens become "the elect." "This period of more intense spiritual preparation [for the celebration] of the paschal mystery,] consisting more of internal reflection than in catechetical instruction" (RCIA #138). Within this period are two types of rituals: scrutinies and presentations. The scrutinies are ways for deeper reflection on what will take place in the life of those who will enter the Pascal Mystery on Holy Saturday.

Very briefly, there are two presentations: The Presentation of the Creed and the Presentation of the Lord's Prayer. These simple rituals can be done in a small setting rather than within the Sunday Liturgy. The scrutinies, however, occur during Mass for three consecutive Sundays, beginning on the Third Sunday of Lent and concluding on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. The scrutinies have their proper readings and prayers for Mass (collect prayer, intercessions, prayer over the offerings, preface, Eucharistic prayer additions, and prayer after Communion), along with a minor exorcism and laying on of hands for each of the Elect and then their dismissal before the offertory rite begins.

The Gospels for the scrutinies are as follows: The Samaritan Woman at the Well, the Man Born Blind, and The Rising of Lazarus, both having a deeper spiritual meaning than just being long Gospel passages. They are used to show that Christ is the living water, he is the light of the world, and he is the resurrection and the life (RCIA #143). Every ritual we have in the Church has power in our lives of faith and draws us deeper into an encounter with Jesus of Nazareth, whom we profess and believe in, who has risen from the dead and desires a relationship with us.

Over these three Sundays, we will celebrate the scrutinies at the following masses: on March 3 at the 10:30am Mass, on March 10 at the 12:30pm Mass, and on March 17 at the 5:15pm Mass. The readings for these three Sunday Masses will differ from those at the other masses for the weekend, although we are in Year B for the lectionary cycle. But as mentioned, the scrutiny masses have their readings taken from Year A of the lectionary cycle.

The journey of conversion and renewal for the Elect during this period of purification and enlightenment is also a reminder for us who have already been baptized and participated in the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ of this great mystery. It is an opportunity to call those of us who have been baptized to step out of our Lenten routine and remember who Jesus is to us. In these final weeks before their initiation, let us pray for the Elect as they make their way closer and closer to the font of new life and for us as we prepare to renew our baptismal promises on Easter morning in the light of the Risen Lord.



Adopt-a-Saint

hat? Yes, we are at our best when we are in motion and have a clear destination. Adoption is the generous taking of a stranger as your child and heir, or even the adoption of a stray animal. Wait a second. How much room, food, supplies, and legal paperwork do I have



to prepare for this act of adopting a saint? Well, it doesn't cost much. We simply write a short self-bio reflecting our origins, personality, hobbies, and dreams. Then, search for a Saint with similar characteristics or someone you would admire. I learned this from one of our young adults, Kate, who shared her testimony at the Young Adult Retreat Panel, Last year, I was very ambitious in adopting two Saints — St. Therese of Lisieux and Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati. This year, a wise Bishop messaged me, "All love on this earth involves choice." When, for example, a young man expresses his love to a young woman and asks her to become his wife, he is not just affirming love but also choosing this love over anyone else. In that one act by which he chooses her, he rejects all that is not her.

There is no other way to prove we love something or someone than by choosing it in preference to something else. Word and signs of love may be, and often are, expressions of egoism or passion, but deeds are proofs of love. "We can only prove we love our Lord by choosing Him in preference to anything else." These words written by Fulton J. Sheen, are very accurate and wise, aren't they?

On Ash Wednesday, I shared that Lent is the season of intense love, and this season comes with two invitations. (1) Return to the Lord and our brothers and sisters with your whole heart — don't treat them as yesterday's newspaper; and (2) Rend your hearts, not your garments - rending our hearts away from habits of attachments, excessive internet usage, unhealthy relationships, etc. I hope you are making good choices, especially during the Lenten Journey. I love being a priest. JMJ.

Support Blessings in a Backpack Ministry

Lent provides us with an opportunity to develop a spirit of generosity. It encourages us to share our possessions and ourselves with others, fostering a sense of community and reminding us that we are all part of the Body of Christ. Take some time to reflect on how you can best use your time, talents, and treasure to give back during this Lenten season.

Blessings in a Backpack (BiB) is a Cathedral program focused on food insecurity, faced by the most vulnerable of our society, our children. Approximately 65% of the students in Chicago Catholic schools depend on the federal 'hot lunch' program for their daily meal. But when the weekend comes, these same children don't have access to food, let alone nutritious meals. Our BiB program provides weekly bags of food for the weekend for 300 of these children, currently attending St. Thomas of Canterbury School. But we know that this is less than 3% of those in need.

According to the USDA, more than 34 million people, including 9 million children in the United States are food insecure. A food-insecure household has limited or uncertain access to enough food to support a healthy life. Three out of five teachers say that students regularly come to school hungry.

How can you help? Join our Blessings in a Backpack team! We are currently 90 strong, distributed over a variety of duties: organization, administration support, packing, driving, and fund raising are a just few examples. We attest that the need to serve is a part of one's faith journey, and providing these volunteer opportunities is a part of the Cathedral overall mission and is as important at the service we provide for the children.

We meet every Thursday morning to pack and deliver our bags of food for the weekend. Can't make it on a Thursday?

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received.


