Dear People of God:

Our Season of Lent is rapidly coming to a close. Next Sunday, we begin Holy Week. We always speak of Lent in terms of fasting. Lent should be more than a time of fasting. It should also be a joyous season of feasting. Lent is a time to fast from certain things and to feast on others.

The Notre Dame Center for Pastoral Liturgy wrote the following beautiful reflection in their January 1993 journal — Assembly. Read and reflect. Pray and ponder. Share with family and friends.

At the same time, Lent is a time of feasting and sharing. Keep reading ...

St. Patrick? St. Joseph? What To Celebrate Liturgically in '24

epending on how the calendar falls and the centrality of a particular feast or solemnity in the life of the Church, the feast is either transferred to Monday if it falls on Sunday or not celebrated at all. March 17 is St. Patrick's Day. However, since it falls on a Sunday this year, we



do not celebrate the Mass with the proper prayers for St. Patrick; instead, we celebrate the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Since St. Patrick's feast day is not a solemnity, liturgically speaking, it will not be celebrated this year.

However, the Solemnity of the Annunciation, which is March 25, will be moved to after the Easter Octave, celebrated on Monday, April 8, because March 25 falls within Holy Week this year, and the Annunciation is a foundational solemnity to our life of faith. Every Sunday throughout the year, even in Lent, is a solemnity because every Sunday is a mini-Easter. Since solemnities are the highest-ranking celebrations, no matter what day, they mark the occasion with the Gloria and the Creed. These two pillars of the liturgy remind us of God's goodness as a song of praise (Gloria) and connect us through time and space with those who have gone before us (Creed). Even during Lent, when we celebrate a Solemnity, we recite the Gloria and the Creed, calling us to greater rejoicing.

March 19 is the Solemnity of St. Joseph, a day of profound significance in our faith. This day formally included in the General Calendar under Pope Pius V in 1570, has been celebrated since the 10th century. With various other changes and calendar date moves over the following centuries, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary and patron of the Universal Church, was solidified in 1955 on the calendar for March 19. On this day, we remember St. Joseph, who raised Jesus at their home in Nazareth with the Blessed Virgin Mary, who truly taught Jesus how to be the man he is. You can imagine in this home, Jesus was taught how to worship, listen, and lead by the example of Joseph and Mary. While

Joseph has no recorded words in Scripture, he is one of the greatest saints of our tradition.

As a reminder, next weekend, as we enter Holy Week, we will collect the CRS Rice Bowls distributed on Ash Wednesday for Lenten almsgiving. The funds will be given to Catholic Relief Services, which will use the funds to help those in need throughout the world. Like St. Joseph, whose silence shows us we don't always have to speak, and actions can speak for us, our Lenten almsgiving is a way for us to prepare for Easter by giving to those in need.

As we journey through Lent, we are given these sacred days to call us out of reflecting on our sinfulness and reflect on God's power and love. Though Joseph and Mary did not fully understand what was asked of them in their lives, by remaining close to God, all things become revealed, and God's power is magnified through his servants. As we celebrate St. Joseph this week, may we follow Joseph's example of leading through example to bring about the kingdom of God.

Blessings in a Backpack

Blessings in a Backpack accomplishes two critical goals: 1. Providing opportunities for parishioners to donate their time and resources to those in need. a hallmark of living our faith in the world. 2. Providing nutritional support to foodinsecure children who would otherwise go hungry without this ministry. While we cannot serve all the nearly 11,000 students who qualify, our ministry can reach 300 at-risk children with a bag of food every weekend. The challenge is significant and growing due to inflation, increased cost of food, and the recent termination of the Tax Credit Scholarship Program by the State of Illinois. Our dream is to add a second school, so funds are critical to this ministry.





Thursday/Friday Suppers Ministry

For over 15 years, the Thursday/Friday Suppers Ministry has provided meals for some of the neediest Chicagoans, now including our newest neighbors, migrants coming to Chicago. While meeting their nutritional needs, volunteers serve their guests by assuring them of their value as fellow community members through conversation and by fostering friendships with dignity, kindness, and compassion. We serve at least 220 hot meals each Thursday and Friday, often stretching the food to reach 250. Amid the ongoing demand to feed migrants coming to our meals, we seek to raise new funding to find other ways to feed our local unhoused neighbors who had been our regular guests at these meals. We hope to provide for the growing number of those facing food insecurity in our neighborhood to be sure all receive what they need.

Do We Still Have Ashes on our Foreheads?

s we immerse ourselves in Lent, let's rewind to that distinctive Ash Wednesday experience. Can you recall proudly wearing those ashes, adorned with the Cross, whether at work or shopping? Maybe someone thought, "Ah, they're Catholic," or puzzled over why your face seemed slightly different that day.



On that Wednesday, I delved into how Lent provides us with opportunities to refine our vision, clearing away the smudges that cloud our view of the world. Let St. Augustine's words resonate: "Our only task in this life, friends, is to purify the eyes of our heart so that we might see God." Do we still carry the ash mark of the Cross on our forehead? It might have vanished in the shower (or maybe not, leaving a peculiar scent – oh dear!), but my wish is that it's indelibly etched in our minds and hearts.

Let's connect this to the Cross, a potent reminder of our salvation. How has our Lenten journey unfolded, focusing on seeing the beauty, holiness, and God's image in our fellow humans, steering clear of treating them like yesterday's news?

I sincerely hope this memory remains vivid in our minds and hearts.

While Holy Week is coming soon, we're not quite there yet. Hang tight and stay resilient with prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Indeed, it's tough and challenging — there's no denying that. Every path adorned with a Cross requires sacrifices, and none of them come easy. But it's all part of our incredible journey, my friends. I love being a priest. JMJ.
