Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Our journey to the cross with the Lord continues. Holy Week begins with an invitation to enter more deeply into the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Will this week be like any other in our life? Will we make time (especially this week) to slow down

and pray with others in Church during our Holy Week celebrations? Reflect on the following as we begin our Holy Week journey together.

Three Trees

Once upon a mountaintop stood three little trees, dreaming of what they would become. The first little tree looked at the stars and said, “I want to hold treasure. I want to be the most beautiful treasure chest, covered with gold and filled with precious stones!” The second little tree looked at the stream trickling out to the ocean and said, “I want to travel mighty waters and carry powerful kings. I’ll be the strongest ship in the world!” The third little tree looked down into the valley below and said, “I want to stay on the mountaintop and grow to be the tallest tree so that when people look at me, they’ll raise their eyes to heaven and think of God.”

Years passed. The rain came, the sun shone, and the little trees grew tall. One day, three woodcutters climbed the mountain. As he cut down his tree, the first woodcutter said, “This tree is beautiful.” The first tree exclaimed, “Now I shall be made into an exquisite chest to hold wondrous treasures!”

The second woodcutter looked at his perfect tree and cut down the second tree, which said, “Now I shall sail mighty waters as a strong ship for powerful kings!” The third tree felt her heart sink, and she stood tall toward heaven. But the third woodcutter never even looked up. “Any kind of tree will do for me,” he muttered, cutting down the third tree.

The first tree rejoiced as they approached the carpenter’s shop, but the carpenter fashioned the tree into an animal feed box. The once beautiful tree was coated in dust and filled with hay, not covered with gold or filled with treasure.

The second tree smiled when the woodcutter took her to a shipyard, but he cut and hammered her into a simple fishing boat rather than a mighty sailing ship. Being small, she couldn’t sail an ocean, let alone a river, and ended up in a little lake. The third tree was confused when the woodcutter cut her into sturdy beams but left her forgotten in a lumberyard. The once tall tree wondered, “I just wanted to stay on the mountaintop and point to God.”

After many days and nights, the three trees nearly forgot their dreams. But one night, golden starlight poured over the first tree as a young woman placed her newborn baby in the feed box. “I wish I could make a cradle for him,” her husband whispered. The mother squeezed his hand and smiled as the starlight showed on the smooth, sturdy wood. “This manger is beautiful,” she said. And suddenly, the first tree knew she was holding the greatest treasure in the world.

Another evening, a tired traveler fell asleep in an old fishing boat with his friends as they drifted into the lake. Soon, a thundering and thrashing storm arose. The little tree shuddered. She knew she did not have the strength to carry so many passengers safely through the wind and rain. The traveler awoke and said “Peace” as he stretched out his arms and hands. The storm stopped as quickly as it had begun. And suddenly, the second tree knew she was carrying the king of heaven and earth.

The third tree was startled on a Friday when workers yanked her beams from a forgotten woodpile. She flinched as she was carried through an angry, jeering crowd and shuddered when soldiers nailed a man’s hands to her. She felt ugly, harsh, and cruel. But on that Sunday morning, when the sun rose, and the earth trembled with joy beneath her, the third tree knew that God’s love had changed everything and made the third tree strong. And whenever people thought of the third tree, they would think of God and that was far better than being the tallest tree in the world.

Remember — life is what happens while you are busy making other plans! Trust in God -- and may our Holy Week transform our lives — and the world. With the grace and help of God, we can make a profound difference.

Each of us imperfect beings is still invited into something greater than our worst parts. While we may each be discerning our role in God’s world, let us also remember to hold one another accountable for the times when we know better, and do better.

It's Time for Holy Week! Here's How to Prepare for Easter

We enter into a sacred time this week. Holy Week is very symbolic of our life of faith. We enter Jerusalem with crowds waving palms as Jesus enters the Holy City. On Tuesday, the Cardinal and the priests of the Archdiocese gather for a Day of Renewal and the Chrism Mass when they renew their priestly promises, and Cardinal Cupich blesses the three oils — Sacred Chrism, Oil of the Sick, and Oil of the Catechumens. These oils will be distributed at the end of the Chrism Mass to priests and parish representatives throughout the Archdiocese for sacramental use until Holy Week 2025. Thursday begins the Sacred Triduum, the three holiest days of the year, commemorating the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth.

The Triduum spans three days, with each day having a distinct character to itself on this continuous journey. We begin in the Upper Room on Holy Thursday evening with the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Only one Mass can be celebrated in each church on Holy Thursday. This Mass does not end with the final blessing but moves to the altar of repose, a representation of Christ in the garden and prison awaiting trial. We watch and pray with our Lord as he awaits his condemnation by Pilate. Our Cathedral will be open until Midnight on Holy Thursday to allow the many visitors to come in and spend time in prayer.

Good Friday is the only day in the liturgical year when we do not celebrate Holy Mass. The Service of the Lord's Passion is simply that, a service. The priest consecrates additional communion wafers on Holy Thursday to make the Eucharist available for Good Friday services. Another unique aspect of the Good Friday service is that it does not begin with the sign of the cross because it is a continuation of the liturgy on Holy Thursday, nor does it end with a final blessing, but in silence because God has died in the flesh.

On Holy Saturday, just like Holy Thursday, there is only one



Mass celebrated in each church: the Great Vigil of Easter. This Mass also does not begin with the sign of the cross. Instead, it starts outside the church with the blessing of the fire to light the newly blessed Easter candle. Only at the end of the Easter Vigil does the priest celebrant give a final blessing, concluding the three holy days, with the joy of "Go, and announce the Gospel of the Lord."

One service often overlooked is Tenebrae. At Holy Name Cathedral, our Tenebrae service is Wednesday, March 27, at 7:00pm. Tenebrae is a religious service that uses psalms and light as a tangible preparation for the Triduum. With each psalm or reading, a candle is extinguished, and the light dimmed until the final candle in the darkened church is taken away, only to return after the great "streptitus" or earthquake. The Christ candle shows us that even death cannot extinguish the light. I encourage you to add the Tenebrae service to your Holy Week activities.

Today, on Palm Sunday, we will pray the Stations of the Cross at 3:00pm and offer a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration from 3:30 to 4:30pm to spiritually prepare ourselves for these upcoming sacred days. As we enter Holy Week, the Worship Advisory Council invites you to join us during these sacred days to deepen your encounter with the Lord and others as we walk with him through his passion, death, and resurrection.

Sr. Norma Pimentel Comes to Holy Name on Monday, April 15 at 6:30pm

Sr. Norma Pimentel is a Sister of the Missionaries of Jesus, and Executive Director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley. She oversees the charitable arm of the

Diocese of Brownsville, TX, providing different ministries and services in the Rio Grande Valley through emergency assistance, homeless prevention, disaster relief, counseling, pregnancy care, and humanitarian relief to immigrants.



Sr. Norma Pimentel

Known as the “Pope’s Favorite Nun” for her groundbreaking work with immigrants, Sr. Norma is also a very

talented artist. This lecture will be based on dozens of her paintings of the faces and symbolism of our many brothers and sisters coming to the United States, and locally here in Chicago. Her talk will be the first of what will be an annual lecture series honoring the late Bishop Kevin Birmingham and is sponsored by the Illinois Patrons of the Arts in the Vatican Museums and Holy Name Cathedral.

In 2015, Sister Norma received the Martin Luther King “Keep the Dream Alive” Award from Catholic Charities USA in recognition for her work on the U.S.-Mexico border in which she oversaw the provision of a safe space for migrants to rest and regain strength. She also received awards from the University of Texas-Pan American, the Texas Medical Association, and a nomination for “Texan of the Year.”

Sister Norma Pimentel earned her Bachelor’s degree in Fine Arts from Pan American University, a Master’s degree in Theology from St. Mary’s University in San Antonio, Texas, and a Master’s degree in Counseling

Psychology from Loyola University in Chicago, Illinois.

Sunday, April 7 at 4:00pm in Club Room

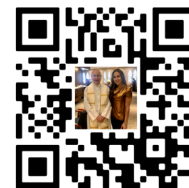

Heartbeats of Holy Name

Young Adult Ministry

The Young Adult Ministry at Holy Name calls young Catholics in the parish to encounter Christ through service, fellowship, and spiritual growth. The growing monthly gathering welcomes over 50 young adult parishioners for dinner, socializing, and a formation talk by a guest speaker. In communion with one another, they grow spiritually through prayer, liturgy, the Eucharist, Bible study,



and charitable outreach to those in need in the community. The small groups for spiritual conversation grew significantly, stemming from a shared recognition of the importance of a strong faith life. They become workers in the vineyard of The Lord, imitating His love and, in the process, finding true joy and multiplying it over and over by giving it to others. This discipleship is the essence of the Christian life and the path to true purpose through Jesus Christ.



Migrant Ministry

The Migrant Ministry at Holy Name Cathedral is devoted to providing humanitarian and pastoral assistance to newly arrived migrants in Chicago. This outreach includes meals at the Thursday/Friday Suppers and meeting other physical needs like clothing, housing, employment, and educational opportunities. It also means providing pastoral care, walking with migrants to ensure their dignity, and offering spiritual nourishment through Masses in their native language. The program seeks to assist migrants in the complex legal processes of making asylum claims and working with partners to find opportunities as the migrants settle into their new home in Chicago.

Since the Catacombs, Christian artists are more than decorators; they are theologians of line and color proclaiming the Incarnation and manifesting the Gospel for the whole world. Over eight sessions, artist and writer Joe Malham reviews artists and art that, in times of crisis and transition, have renewed and revitalized the Church and not only changed the course of faith but of history. They will include Giotto, Michelangelo, Caravaggio, Artemisia Gentileschi, and lesser-known greats like The Nazarenes, A.W.N. Pugin, and Communist sculptor and friend of Pope John XXIII, Giacomo Manzu.

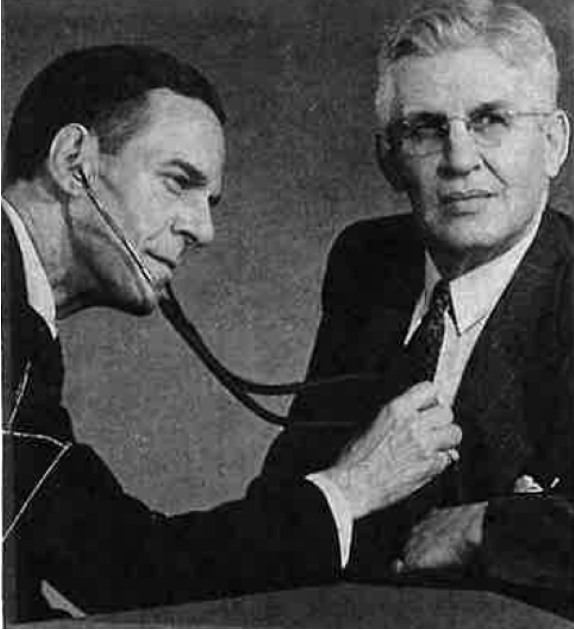

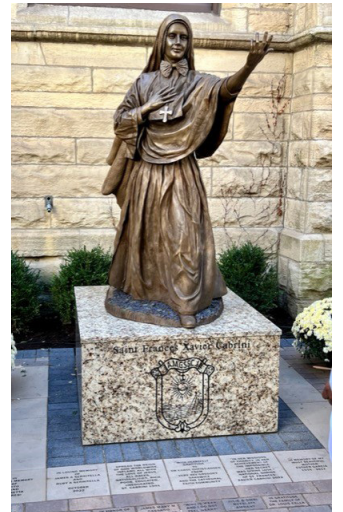
