Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

The Lord is Risen! Alleluia! Jesus's death is not the final word, but life is so abundant that we call it eternal — Resurrection. This is the Word of Good News! Joy, hope, promise, and an empty tomb — He is Risen!

The Gospels do not explain Easter — Easter explains the Gospels. Our lives do not explain Easter — Easter gives meaning to our lives. Faith is the story we tell in our lives.

Resurrection means Jesus lives. Our Lord discovered what to die for and live forever for and invites us to do the same. Easter speaks of new life and hope, always in the name of the Lord Jesus. We have so many choices in life, and demands are placed upon us. What are we choosing? What are we seeking? What are we finding in life? Easter is an opportunity to put life into perspective through the eyes of the “Easter faith.”

I share with you a reflection recently given to me. It beautifully connects the Easter journey with the Lord. Easter involves trust and surrendering...

God's Rosebud

One day, a new minister was walking with an older, more seasoned minister in the garden. Feeling a bit insecure about what God had for him to do, he asked the older preacher for some advice. The older preacher walked up to a rosebush, handed the young preacher a rosebud, and told him to open it without tearing off any petals.

The younger preacher looked in disbelief at the older preacher and tried to figure out what a rosebud could possibly have to do with his desire to know God's will for his life and ministry. But because of his great respect for the older preacher, he proceeded to try to unfold the rose while keeping every petal intact. It wasn't long before he realized how impossible this was to do. Noticing the younger preacher's inability to unfold the rosebud without tearing it, the older preacher began to recite the following poem...

“It's only a tiny rosebud, a flower of God's design;
But I cannot unfold the petals with these clumsy
hands of mine.

The secret of unfolding flowers is not known to
such as I.

GOD opens this flower so easily, but in my hands,
they die.

If I cannot unfold a rosebud, this flower of God's
design.

Then how can I have the wisdom to unfold this life
of mine?

So, I'll trust God to lead each moment of my day.

I will look to God for guidance in each step of the
way.

The path that lies before me, only my Lord knows.

I'll trust in God to unfold the moments, just as He
unfolds the rose.”

Jesus took a journey — a long walk — that ended not in death but in Resurrection. Jesus also took an inward journey, trusting God, His Father. As we live our lives, we also make an inward journey. Keep reading...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,



Catholic Illuminations

The Easter Candle Offers Eternal Life to Those Who Follow

Every Easter, a truly unique ritual takes place in parishes — the blessing of a new Easter candle. This significant event takes place at the Great Vigil of Easter, where the priest blesses the fire and lights the candle, symbolizing the Risen Lord's descent into the darkness of death and his light brought to those in darkness. This same light is bestowed upon us at our baptism, dispelling the evil of sin and death in our lives. The candle itself holds profound symbolism to our life of faith.

Whether the priest celebrant carves the symbols into the candle or they are painted on by the candle maker and traced over by the priest using his finger, he utters, "Christ yesterday and today (vertical line for the cross), the Beginning and the End (horizontal line for the cross), the Alpha (letter A above the cross), and the Omega (Ω below the cross). All time belongs to him (adds number 2 in the upper left corner of the cross), and all the ages (adds number 0 to the upper right corner of the cross) to him be glory and power (adds number 2 in the lower left corner of the cross) through every age and forever. Amen." (adds number 4 in the lower right corner of the cross). Since the priest etches the year into the candle's wax, we must begin with a new candle. Five grains of incense, or nails, are added to the candle to



symbolize Christ's five wounds. As the priest places the nails into the candle, he says, "By his holy and glorious wounds, may Christ the Lord guard us and protect us, amen."

After the blessing of the fire and the new candle, the priest lights the candle by saying, "May the light of Christ rising in glory dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds."

Then, the procession to the darkened church commences, following that single flame, the flame that even death cannot extinguish. As the faithful walk into the church that evening, the light spreads to everyone else from the

Easter candle's flame. Once that blessed light illumines the church, the Exultet is sung, the Easter Proclamation. This proclamation tells the story of salvation and how, on this night, Christ conquered death and rose victorious from the underworld. The Easter Vigil follows from there, when we proclaim Christ risen from the dead.

Each parish needs a new Easter candle every year as a symbol of the resurrection and also for a practical reason: over time, the candle shrinks in size due to burning for various occasions. The Easter candle is lit every day for 50 days during the Easter season and then for funerals and baptisms throughout the year as a symbol of life beginning and ending in Christ.

Whatever Catholic Church you visit, look for the Easter candle, admire its beauty, and

remember that it symbolizes Christ, who conquered the grave and offers eternal life to those who follow the light of life and the light of faith.

Sr. Norma Pimentel Comes to Holy Name on Monday, April 15 at 6:30pm

Sr. Norma Pimentel is a Sister of the Missionaries of Jesus, and Executive Director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley. She oversees the charitable arm of the



Diocese of Brownsville, TX, providing different ministries and services in the Rio Grande Valley through emergency assistance, homeless prevention, disaster relief, counseling, pregnancy care, and humanitarian relief to immigrants.

Also known as the “Pope’s Favorite Nun” for her groundbreaking work with immigrants, Sr. Norma is a very

talented artist. This lecture will be based on dozens of her paintings of the faces and symbolism of today’s challenges with supporting the many migrants coming to the United States, and locally here in Chicago. Her talk will be the first of what will be an annual lecture series honoring the late Bishop Kevin Birmingham and is sponsored by the Illinois Patrons of the Arts in the Vatican Museums.

In recognition for her work on the US-Mexico border in which she oversaw the provision of a safe space for migrants to rest and regain strength, in 2015 Sister Norma received the Martin Luther King, Jr. “Keep the Dream Alive” Award from Catholic Charities USA and awards from the University of Texas-Pan American, the Texas Medical Association, and a nomination for “Texan of the Year.”

Psychology from Loyola University in Chicago, Illinois.

The Image of the Prodigal Son in Easter

With uncertainty swirling in his mind like a tempest, the son grappled with a decision that seemed to tug at his soul. Should he return to his father's house, which he had once abandoned in pursuit of independence? Doubt gnawed at him, whispering tales of rejection and scorn, painting visions of servitude awaiting him. Yet, despite the tumult of his thoughts, he leaped, embarking on a journey back to the home he had forsaken. What awaited him there was beyond his wildest imaginings. Instead of the anticipated disdain, he found himself enveloped in a warmth he had long forgotten — the profound embrace of his father's boundless love and mercy, a revelation that stirred the depths of his being.

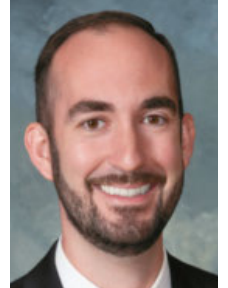

When a loved one dies, the world seems at first completely out of kilter. A whole reorientation to life without the physical presence of the loved one



is necessary. In the gospel, we catch a glimpse of how the first disciples of Jesus navigated the difficult days in the aftermath of his death, how they had to construct their lives and meaning anew.

One of the key messages of John's Gospel is that the resurrection is not simply a “happily-ever-after” ending or the fulfillment of our expectations. It turns the world on end and defies explanation. It is God's final parable.

John's gospel drives home the central question, “Where is Jesus now?” Mary Magdalene, represents the voice of the community, as she seeks her beloved, and laments “We don't know where they put him!” (20: 2). On Easter, we hear the first half to the answer: he has returned to the Father. The second half will be answered on Tuesday at the octave of Easter. Join us for Mass to hear the answer.

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose.
