

# **Reflections from Our Rector**



Dear People of God,

April is upon us. The flowers are blooming, trees are budding, spring bird migration is slowly peaking, and the Cubs and Sox have begun playing baseball! Our Easter Season continues, and Easter speaks of new life and change. The most constant in

life is change!

Our God is always loving, forgiving and present though much of what is around us keeps changing. New beginnings, change and dreams are exciting, and the Lord Jesus is always at our side.

*Up*, a 2009 movie delight from the animation wizards at Pixar begins with one of the most touching and poetic four minutes ever seen in the movies — all told without a word of dialogue.

A quiet, shy kid named Carl meets Ellie, a real spitfire. They both dream of being explorers, of going on great adventures to faraway places. Ellie and Carl grow up, fall in love, marry, and transform a ramshackle house into their dream home. They save their loose change in a glass jug for their dream trip — but real life gets in the way: work, home and car repairs, and medical bills. But they are happy. And in an instant, they are celebrating their fiftieth wedding anniversary. Soon after, Ellie succumbs to cancer, leaving the grieving Carl lost and alone.

After Ellie is gone, Carl finds, "My Adventure Book," the scrapbook Ellie kept since they were children. The first pages are filled with the silly, funny little treasures and memories of childhood. Then there is a page Ellie has labeled, "Stuff I'm Going To Do." On these pages, Ellie planned to chronicle her dream trip with Carl. Carl is stung with remorse that he never kept his promise to Ellie to take her on such a trip. But as Carl turns the page, he sees that Ellie has collected pictures of their life together — their wedding, working side by side on their house, the simple joys of going out for ice cream together. Under one of the last pictures taken of the two together, Ellie has written: Carl, thanks for the great adventure – Go and have a new one! Love, Ellie.

Carl realizes that he and Ellie have indeed shared a great

adventure: they dreamed together, faced and survived crushing disappointments together, grew happily old together.

Love and friendship are life's great adventure.

Our Easter Season is also a celebration of love and friendship with the Lord Jesus. Another great adventure of life is to look into the face of a loved one and see the face of God. Easter is born in us when we realize love, friendship and relationships help us see the face of God. This also occurs when we reach out to help others. The whole thrust of the Jesus story is living as servant helping others in the name of the Lord — especially the poor, homeless and outcasts.

Easter Season is a joyous celebration of life so abundant we call it eternal. Easter is lived thorough love, friendship and life-giving relationships — life's great adventure. Easter joy!

It is important that we gather as a Faith Community weekly around the Table of the Lord. Yet, when someone is absent the community suffers. We are nourished by the Word of the God, the Bread of Life, and the Cup of Salvation.

In the movie *Up*, Carl and Ellie have found the deeper meaning of life. They discovered that true joy is not driven by "perishable" material things, but by the "nonperishable" values of God. They have discovered what hopefully all of us have discovered — that the "fast food" that is out there doesn't satisfy. Rather, our hearts are thirsting for deeper meaning, and ultimately for Jesus Christ, the "food that endures forever."

The Lord Jesus promises us strength, hope, Eucharist and forgiveness on the journey and the Lord promises us eternal life. If you get a better offer — take it!

### Catholic Illuminations What is Divine Mercy? And What's the Story Behind It?

n April 30, 2000, St. Pope John Paul II canonized Sister Faustina Kowalska, a religious mystic from Poland who died in 1938. In the early 1930s, Sister Faustina reported apparitions of Jesus, which eventually were approved as authentic apparitions by the Vatican. Eventually, St. Faustina spoke with an artist who



painted the image. The image of Jesus walking towards us, pulling back a part of his white gown, and blue and red rays coming from his Sacred Heart is known as Divine Mercy. Below Jesus is the saying, "Jesus, I trust in You."

Since the canonization in 2000, the Second Sunday of Easter is known as Divine Mercy Sunday. It is the final day in the Octave of Easter, allowing us to continue our celebration for eight more days. Our liturgical year has two octaves, the Christmas Octave and the Easter Octave, celebrating the joy of Christmas and Easter, the two pivotal moments in our faith: God becoming man and rising from the dead. Both octaves culminate on the eighth day. For Christmas, the Octave reaches its climax on January 1, formerly the naming of Jesus, but now celebrates Mary, the Mother of God. For Easter, the Octave reaches its climax with Divine Mercy Sunday.

The celebration of Divine Mercy is a unique and profound experience. It reveals to us that our participation in the paschal mystery, the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus, is an act of mercy. Through this participation, we are not only forgiven and redeemed but also set free and encountered by God's unfailing love and mercy. This unique aspect of the Divine Mercy celebration underscores the depth and breadth of God's mercy, making it a truly transformative experience.

Associated with a devotion to the Divine Mercy of God, is the Divine Mercy Chaplet, inspired by the apparitions of Jesus to St. Faustina. The chaplet uses a regular rosary, and is similar in the practice of repetition, repeating the same prayer as on all the Hail Mary beads and the same prayer on the Our Father beads. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is an easy way to remind ourselves of God's endless mercy as we say, "Eternal Father, I offer you the body, blood, soul and divinity of your dearly beloved Son, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world," as well as "For the sake of his sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

Every Sunday is a mini-Easter, and every Sunday is a reminder of God's never-failing mercy for us. This celebration of Mercy is a daily reminder that just as Jesus is risen from the dead and offers us a share in his divine life through baptism, so too is his mercy available for us each and every day. And by our baptism, by becoming a new creation in Christ, we are invited to share that love and mercy with others every day. Let us always be reminded that with the Resurrection, God's mercy has also conquered the grave. That in his Divine Mercy, we learn to trust in Jesus, and that no matter the darkness of our lives, Jesus always walks towards us, inviting us to eternal life.

#### Sr. Norma Pimentel Comes to Holy Name on Monday, April 15 at 6:30pm

Sr. Norma Pimentel is a Sister of the Missionaries of Jesus, and Executive Director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley. She oversees the charitable arm of the



Diocese of Brownsville, TX, providing different ministries and services in the Rio Grande Valley through emergency assistance, homeless prevention, disaster relief, counseling, pregnancy care, and humanitarian relief to immigrants.

Also known as the "Pope's Favorite Nun" for her groundbreaking work with immigrants, Sr. Norma is a very

talented artist. This lecture will be based on dozens of her paintings of the faces and symbolism of today's challenges with supporting the many migrants coming to the United States, and locally here in Chicago. Her talk will be the first of what will be an annual lecture series honoring the late Bishop Kevin Birmingham and is sponsored by the Illinois Patrons of the Arts in the Vatican Museums.

In recognition for her work on the US-Mexico border in which she oversaw the provision of a safe space for migrants to rest and regain strength, in 2015 Sister Norma received the Martin Luther King, Jr. "Keep the Dream Alive" Award from Catholic Charities USA and awards from the University of Texas-Pan American, the Texas Medical Association, and a nomination for "Texan of the Year."

Sister Norma Pimentel earned her Bachelor's degree in Fine Arts from Pan American University, a Master's degree in Theology from St. Mary's University and a Master's degree in Counseling Psychology from Loyola



University in Chicago, Illinois.
