

The disciples encounter Jesus on the road to Emmaus, relief on the baptismal font in the church of St. Matthew, Stitar, Croatia.

The Gospel reading, from Luke, follows the story of two disciples on the road to Emmaus. Upon returning to Jerusalem, these disciples learn



that Jesus had also appeared to Simon. As the two recounted their experience of Jesus to the others, the risen Lord appears among them and offer them peace. After encouraging the disciples to "touch" him, and after they have seen him eat, the disciples appear to have remained puzzled. Jesus speaks to them again, and then "he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures." Whereas Jesus had opened the eyes of the two disciples on the road, Jesus now opens the minds of the gathered disciples. The risen Christ appears to the stunned disciples and offers them peace. Jesus assures the group that their hearts need not be troubled, for he is truly with them. The promise of peace may lead us to consider the many communities in our world that are desperate for peace.

Why We Should Celebrate the Empty Tomb of Jesus

s we move deeper into the Easter season, it is essential to remember a fact that has not changed for 2,000 years — a fact that brings us together every day of our lives as disciples, a fact that brings hope to our dark world — the fact that the tomb is still empty. The earth in which our Lord slept for three days



does not continue to hold his body. This reality, this truth, this fact, has changed lives for centuries and continues to do so today.

The tomb of Jesus of Nazareth is in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, which is in the Christian Quarter within the walls of the Old City of Jerusalem. In the beginning years following the Resurrection, Pagan emperors built various temples on the site to multiple gods to lead Christians away from the site and to quash the growing Christian movement. Finally, in the early 4th century, Constantine's mother, Helena, traveled to Jerusalem searching for the true cross. She discovered the cross and Calvary, the anointing slab where they wrapped Jesus' body, and the tomb. The tomb was then encircled with four walls to protect it from the elements, and the church, what we know now as the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, was consecrated in 335.

Since then, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre has suffered various fires and other disasters, and the church, including the tomb, was destroyed on two separate occasions by non-Christian rulers. Because of the central reality of the empty tomb to our faith, our ancestors rebuilt it. But if we reflect, if the tomb wasn't empty, would it be worth rebuilding? If the witness of the early Apostles did not change the lives of others, would it matter where the tomb was? The tomb is one of the most sacred sites of our faith because our faith rests on this reality. And this empty tomb changes lives.

As we continue celebrating the empty tomb and its power in our lives, I am grateful for the countless people

who helped us celebrate Holy Week and the Paschal Triduum. I share my deepest thanks to our talented Art and Environment team for their many hours making our Cathedral beautiful for worship, the outstanding Music department leading us in song, our generous Ushers who made everyone feel welcome in this sacred space, our inspiring Liturgical ministers who proclaimed the word and shared the Eucharistic meal with those who hungered spiritually, our respectful Altar servers who assisted at the various liturgies, and our Security staff who stayed with us through it all.

The empty tomb is cause for celebration just as our Holy Week, Easter Week, every week, and even every day is a celebration of remembering the tomb is empty, and that reality invites us to use our gifts for the mission of Jesus in our world today. Because of this reality, many people use the gifts God has given them to share the Good News with others. It's never too late to ask the Lord, who has risen from the dead, how you can use your gifts to share the Good News with others and show the world that the tomb is empty and Jesus lives among us.

The Great Vigil of Easter



Young Adults: Join our Frassati Small Groups!

From Fr. Ton Nguyen: Let's chat about the moments in life that make you feel like you're on top of the world — quite literally, in some cases! For me, it was conquering Angel's Landing in Zion National Park. Picture this: the sun just rising, the air crisp with anticipation, and my buddy and I are setting off on this epic hike.

As we trekked, reaching about two-thirds of the way up, we encountered a narrow, slippery path that tempted us to turn back. Then, a remarkable sight spurred us on just ahead — a father accompanied by a teenager and a second-grade child continued their ascent. At that moment, I silently encouraged myself, "If a second-grader can persevere, so can I."

With renewed determination, we pressed on, finally reaching the summit. The overwhelming sense of joy and accomplishment defies description. Reflecting on this journey, I am reminded of Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati's words: "The higher we go, the better we hear the voice of the Lord." Indeed, such spiritual journeys are enriched by companionship.

I am excited to invite our young adults to join the upcoming Frassati small group, launching this May. If you know someone who could benefit from this journey, please share this message with them.

What is the Frassati Small Group?

Inspired by Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati, the Frassati Small Group is a fellowship of young adults who desire to live a life of holiness in imitation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in



our modern era. Forming a small group will create opportunities for members to deepen their faith through sharing spiritual conversation, forming good disciplines, and developing authentic friendships.

What does participation in Frassati entail?

- A 90-day (12-week) commitment Starts May 8 and finishes Aug. 3
- Small groups of 6-8 young adults (18-39 years old)
- Monthly cross-group meetings
- · Weekly small group meetings (two options) -Every Saturday mornings in the Rectory
 - Option 1: 9:30am-11:00am
 - Option 2: 11:00am-12:30pm
- Outing Events (sports, small group pilgrimage)

Disciplines

- · Reading the book: "Fulton J. Sheen" complied by Alexis Walkenstein
- Fasting from eating meat on Friday
- Exercising three days a week
- · Meeting your small group weekly and attending the monthly Mass and social event

On the second Thursday of each month, we will have a Young Adult Evening of Reflection in the Cathedral Chapel and Rectory (May 9, June 13, and July 11):

- 5:30pm (optional): Adoration and Evening Prayer
- 6:30pm: Mass
- 7:00pm-8:30pm: Dinner and Fellowship

Participants will begin on Saturday, May 4, and end on Saturday, Aug. 3. The cost is \$50 per person. Participants will receive a copy of the Fulton J Sheen book, a bracelet, and a full dinner at the second Thursday gathering. I can't wait to journey alongside you. I love being a priest! JMJ.

Camino del Santo Nombre

Reflection by Grace Villamora

The Camino del Santo Nombre series allows participants to interact with the secular world and relate it to their spiritual journey. The pilgrimage to the Art Institute of Chicago on March 15 provided such an occasion for reflection. Of the ten curated works of art that we viewed, I briefly focus on three that held the most meaning to me:

"The Picture of Dorian Gray" by Ivan Albright is a macabre representation of a descent into decay caused by a wayward life and moral corruption. This painting reminds us that we can overcome temporal blight by living as Christ did.

The "White Crucifixion" by Marc Chagall depicts Jesus Christ as a Jewish martyr. It has resonance today due to the rise in antisemitism and anti-immigrant sentiments in today's era.

"The Two Disciples at the Tomb" by Henry Ossawa Tanner portrays the arrival of Peter and John at Christ's empty tomb. The painting suggests contrasting reactions to doubt, just as Peter, who denied Christ three times before and appears downcast and pensive, and unwavering faith in the case of John, whose glowing face suggests the divine presence and awe of the risen Christ. This is an invitation to reflect on faith, doubt, and the redeeming power of the Resurrection of Christ.

The Camino del Santo Nombre series is a godsend for parishioners who want to reflect on their faith in nontraditional venues outside the familiar parish surroundings. It helps us appreciate our faith even more against the backdrop of the real world. The next Camino is "Animales de la Biblia" at the Lincoln Park Zoo on May 18.

Stewardship Reflection

Recognize Jesus in our Lives

In addition to celebrating all Christ did for us this Easter season, we also are reminded of how His sacrifice impacts our lives.

Today's Gospel reminds us that Jesus should be the center of our lives. This passage begins with two disciples realizing Jesus had just appeared to them.

We can learn a valuable lesson from these disciples. To recognize Jesus' appearances in our lives, we need to know Him. And the best way to know the Lord is to spend time with Him. It can start with just 10 minutes of quiet prayer a day and increasing that each week. We might begin by reading Scripture, books on the lives of the Saints, or even a decade of the Rosary. Yet the goal should be to carve out time each day, in a quiet space, for just you and the Lord.

As the disciples mentioned, they recognized it was Jesus in the breaking of the bread. We, too, can better know the Lord through the sacraments, most especially the Holy Mass. The Eucharist is Jesus Himself — Body, Blood Soul, and Divinity. What better way to grow in intimacy with Christ than to receive Him frequently or to go talk to Him in front of the Blessed Sacrament? As we make Jesus the center of our lives through prayer and the sacraments, we will be able to recognize Him in day-to-day moments.

As we are still in the midst of this Easter season, take time to think about what Christ did for us and the changes we should make in our daily lives to help us grow closer to Him.

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
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




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
