Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

I share with you “Easter” stories that genuinely bring life. Let these powerful stories touch your heart, and please pass them on...

First Lesson: The Cleaning Lady

In professor gave us a quiz. I was a conscientious student and had breezed through the questions until the last one: “What is the first name of the woman who cleans the school?” Indeed, this must be a joke. I had seen the cleaning woman several times. She was tall, dark-haired and in her 50s, but how would I know her name?

I handed in my paper, leaving the last question blank. Just before class ended, one student asked: Would the final question count towards our quiz grade? “Absolutely,” he said. “In your careers, you will meet many people. All are significant. They deserve your attention and care, even if you only smile and say “hello.” I’ve never forgotten that lesson. I also learned her name was Dorothy.

Second Lesson: Always Remember Those Who Serve

In the days when things cost much less, a 10-year-old boy entered a coffee shop and sat at the table. A waitress put a glass of water in front of him. “How much is an ice cream sundae?” he asked. “Fifty cents,” replied the waitress.

The boy pulled his hand out of his pocket and studied the coins. “Well, how much is a plain dish of ice cream?” he inquired. More people were waiting for a table, and the waitress was growing impatient. “Thirty-five cents,” she brusquely replied. The little boy again counted his coins. “I’ll have the plain ice cream,” he said. The boy finished the ice cream, paid the cashier, and left.

When the waitress returned, she began to cry as she wiped down the table. Two nickels and five pennies were neatly placed beside the empty dish. He couldn’t have the sundae because he had to have enough left to leave her a tip.

Third Important Lesson: The Obstacle in Our Path

In ancient times, a king arranged for a boulder to be placed in the road. Then he hid and watched to see if anyone would remove the huge rock. Some of the king’s wealthiest merchants and courtiers came by and walked around it. Many loudly blamed the king for not keeping the roads

clear, but none did anything about moving the stone.

Then, a peasant came along carrying a load of vegetables. Upon approaching the boulder, the peasant laid down his burden and tried to move the stone to the side of the road. After much pushing and straining, he finally succeeded. After the peasant picked up his load of vegetables, he noticed a purse lying in the road where the boulder had been. The bag contained many gold coins and a note from the king indicating that the gold was for the person who removed the boulder from the roadway. The peasant learned what many of us never understand. Every obstacle presents an opportunity to improve our condition.

Fourth Important Lesson: Giving When It Counts

Years ago, when I worked as a volunteer at a hospital, I got to know a girl named Liz who was suffering from a rare and severe disease. Her only chance of recovery appeared to be a blood transfusion from her five-year-old brother, who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibodies needed to combat the illness.

The doctor explained the situation to her little brother and asked the little boy if he would be willing to give his blood to his sister. I saw him hesitate momentarily before taking a deep breath and saying, “Yes, I’ll do it if it will save her.” As the transfusion progressed, he lay in bed next to his sister and smiled, as we all did, seeing the color returning to her cheek. Then his face grew pale, and his smile faded. He looked up at the doctor and asked with a trembling voice, “Will I start to die right away?”

Being young, the little boy had misunderstood the doctor; he thought he was going to have to give his sister all of his blood to save her.

On the Cover

“Christ, the Good Shepherd with Flock” Vintage Illustration

The Gospel for today is a portion of the longer and familiar discourse on the Good Shepherd.



Most people reading this passage have had no experience with tending sheep, but it is important to keep in mind that this discourse is about relationships. The Jewish community would have been familiar with the images of the shepherd and the hired hand. The hired hand to whom Jesus refers is an individual (or individuals) who had no relationship with the sheep he is paid to tend. The shepherd, on the other hand, is the one who knows and tends to the sheep with tender care. When Jesus says, “I am the good shepherd,” he is not only identifying himself as the one with whom he and his sheep have a mutual relationship, but also saying that He and the Father have a mutual relationship. While using the familiar shepherd imagery of the Old Testament, Jesus explains the image of shepherd to include “other sheep that do not belong to this fold.” Jesus will lay down his life for many, not for an elite few.

On Good Shepherd Sunday, Pray for an Increase in Vocations

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is referred to as “World Day of Prayer for Vocations” because it stems from the Gospel passage and is also known as “Good Shepherd Sunday.” It is in this Gospel that we hear Jesus call himself the Good Shepherd, and the Good Shepherd lays down his life for his sheep (John 10:11). Vocation comes from the Latin word *vocare* which means “to call.” It is no surprise that a vocation and a calling have always been linked, and religiously speaking, a call to the religious life, priesthood, and diaconate.

Each person who has a vocation to a life of service in the Church is different and unique. My vocation, my call, came when I was in second grade, preparing for the First Holy Communion. As I grew up, my catholic school community of St. Thomas of Villanova in Palatine, my family, and the wider community of relationships supported that call. And I have found much happiness and an irreplaceable sense of joy in this life of serving others through the Priesthood.

But a vocation is not only for those in religious life. Similar to my story at a young age, my fraternal twin brother felt the call to serve others through law enforcement. He is now a deputy sheriff in a neighboring county. My mom felt the call to serve others through nursing, and has been a pediatric nurse for over 30 years. My dad felt the call to serve others through the corporal work of mercy by burying the dead,



and has been working for the Archdiocesan Catholic Cemeteries for 38 years. A vocation is a call, and that call is to serve others, to shepherd others in a way they cannot shepherd themselves, a call to sacrifice for others.

In this year’s message for World Day of Prayer for Vocations, Pope Francis wrote in the opening paragraph, “Each year, the World Day of Prayer for Vocations invites us to reflect on the precious gift of the Lord’s call to each of us, as members of his faithful pilgrim people, to participate in his loving plan and to embody the beauty of the Gospel in different states of life.” We are all on the journey of life together, and have unique vocations to help each other on that shared journey.

The Second Vatican Council renewed the universal call to holiness, stating that a vocation is not only for a few, but each person has a call in life to be holy. A vocation ultimately is a call from God to be happy, to be joyful witnesses in the world through the various gifts God has given us. And this call begins in baptism. That God desires our happiness and calls us to serve others and to love others, as Jesus says in the Gospel, so that our joy may be complete.

As we move further into the Easter season, still standing in the glow of that sacred night when Christ rose victorious from the underworld, we dive deeper into the mysteries we celebrate. Due to our baptism, we have the common vocation to be holy, to be saints. But we each have a particular vocation to use the gifts God has given us to give glory to His name, and find our own happiness along the way. It is never too late to say “Yes!” to what God is asking of you and to find joy.




Thank you, Fr. John Boivin

Dr. Moringiello will kick off the Theology on Tap series with the topic:

“No one is good at praying, and all of us can work on it. Insights from Scripture, the early Church, and today.”

Dr Moringiello is an associate professor at DePaul University in their Catholic Studies Department. He received his PhD in Theology from University of Notre Dame and the focus of his research and teachings are on the early Christians and how they understood love (agape) as constitutive of their identity and their interpretation of Scripture. He wrote his doctoral dissertation on St. Irenaeus of Lyon a second century Bishop and of the first great theologians of the Christian Tradition.
