

Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

Spring is here! Trees bud, flowers spring from beneath the earth, grass greens up, and the sun warms and creates blue skies. Everywhere we turn, life speaks to us!

The Resurrection of Jesus is life so full and abundant that we call it eternal.

Jesus is our life...light...and hope. Our Easter Season is a time to dust ourselves off and start anew with lives rooted in the Lord Jesus.

In his book Make Me an Instrument of Your Peace, Kent Nerburn writes about his experience driving a cab for a living. He remembers one specific night when he received a call at 2:30am to go to a small brick fourplex. Thinking he would pick up some late-night partygoers or someone who had just fought with their spouse, he was surprised when a small eighty-year-old woman answered the door.

She wore a print dress and an old-fashioned pillbox hat. By her side was a small nylon suitcase. The apartment was empty, except for a few pieces of furniture covered with sheets and a cardboard box filled with photos and glassware. The driver picked up her bag and helped her to the cab. She gave him the address and asked, "Could you drive through downtown?"

"It's not the shortest way," he answered.

"Oh, I don't mind," she said. "I'm in no hurry. I'm on my way to a hospice. I don't have any family left. The doctor says I don't have very long."

The driver reached over and shut off the meter. "What route would you like me to go?"

For the next two hours, they drove through the city. She pointed out the buildings where she worked as an elevator operator, the house where she and her late husband lived as newlyweds, and the furniture store that once was a ballroom where she had gone dancing as a girl. Sometimes, she'd ask to slow down in front of a particular building or corner; there, she would just sit staring into the darkness, saying nothing.

As the dawn broke over the horizon, she said, "I'm tired.

Let's go now."

They drove to the tiny house that served as the hospice. Two attendants came and helped her out of the cab and took her bag.

She asked the driver how much she owed for the fare. "Nothing," he said. "But you have to make a living," she insisted. "There are other passengers," he replied.

Almost without thinking, he bent over and hugged her. She held him tightly. "You gave an old woman a moment of joy," she said. "Thank you."

Then, in the dim morning light, he watched as she walked into the hospice.

Life is a precious gift from God. We all need to appreciate what we have now (despite the pains, hurts, and struggles of life) because one day, it will be over. Take each day as a gift from God and make each day a gift for others.

An elderly woman once shared the four secrets to staying young, alive, and filled with God.

- 1. You have to laugh and find humor every day.
- 2. You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die. We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even know it!
- 3. There is a vast difference between growing older and growing up. You will turn twenty if you are nineteen years old and lie in bed for one full year and don't do one productive thing. If I am eightyseven years old, stay in bed for a year, and never do anything, I will turn eighty-eight. Anybody can grow older. That doesn't take any talent or ability. The idea is to grow up by always finding the opportunity to change.
- 4. Do not have regrets. Older people usually don't have regrets for what they did, but rather for things they did not do. The only people who fear death are those with regrets.

As we continue our journey, take time to give thanks and live life for others who are rooted in the Lord Jesus.

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks of the Father as a vintner who prunes branches that are bearing fruit so they will produce more. It speaks of



the fecundity in our relationship with God and also of missionary outreach and of interdependence with the other branches on the vine.

Pruning is a Johannine metaphor for the passion. It is akin to the image in John 12:24, where Jesus speaks of the seed that must fall to the ground and die in order to bear more fruit. The emphasis is on the life that sprouts from the dving and the pruning. Expert gardeners know that the place to prune is, paradoxically, where the nodes are bursting with life. Perhaps we, too, need to often need to prune away those things that keep us from fruitfulness.

From pruning, the Gospel shifts to the importance of the branch remaining united to the vine in order to bear fruit. A branch cannot bear fruit on its own. Remaining or abiding in Jesus is crucial for disciples is evident in that verb menein, "to abide." How can we ensure that we are abiding in Christ, and he in us?

Celebrate the Joy of the Resurrection with these Two Saints

ontinuing our movement this Easter season, we know Christ's death and Resurrection have transformed every aspect of our world. We celebrate that every day of the year, as his disciples, realizing his Resurrection, which took place 2,000 years ago, still impacts our lives today. Every saint in our Catholic Tradition,



whether known publicly through formal canonization or unknown universally, but known in a personal way, brings the power and glory of the Resurrection to transform them and allow them to be impacted by this event. Their life is a testimony of sharing that reality by their witness, the love of God that has conquered the grave.

This week, our liturgical calendar presents us with two saints and what it means to allow the Resurrection to transform the world. The first is tomorrow, April 28, the memorial of St. Catherine of Siena. Born during the plague in Siena, Italy, in 1347, she was one of 25 children. As she grew up, she began fasting and cutting her hair to mar her appearance to prevent marrying her brotherin-law (her sister died, and the family wanted Catherine to marry her sister's husband). After her father agreed to allow Catherine to live a life of prayer and dedication, she entered the Third Order Dominicans. She is known for her mystical visions, spiritual writings, and for positively influencing Pope Gregory IX to move the Papal States from Avignon, France, back to Rome. None of this would

be possible if she didn't believe Jesus rose from the dead and desires us to be in heaven with him forever.

Like St. Catherine, the second saint, St. Joseph, was not alive to witness the Resurrection but still gave witness to the power of God in his life. In 1955, Pope Pius XII declared May 1 as the Memorial of St. Joseph the Worker, coinciding with "May Day," when some countries highlight the labor class. St. Joseph was a carpenter and, in the ways of Jewish culture, taught Jesus the trade of carpentry. Joseph teaches us that even on ordinary work days, God is with us and working through us. Everything we do, no matter how difficult or easy, can be done for God's glory. Jesus was crucified on a cross made of wood. As he hung upon the blood-stained wood, he must have felt a feeling of home, a connection to his family, a desire to be with Joseph. Joseph taught Jesus in action that work is holy, should be dignified, and has a purpose in our lives.

The glory of the Resurrection that we celebrate in this Easter season and every day of our life as disciples should be seen in our words and actions. St. Catherine. a woman in medieval times, allowed the joy of Christ's victory over sin and death to exude in her life and is known for influencing a pope to move back to Rome. St. Joseph, the foster father of Jesus, taught the Savior of the World in his humanity that there is dignity to our work, and we should always work to help others, even when words are not necessary. Let us celebrate these two saints this week with appreciation for their witness and all saints, who show us it is possible to celebrate the joy of the Resurrection every day by how we live our lives.


Participation in Frassati includes:

The following restaurants donate meals to our Thursday and Friday dinners, which Holy Name Cathedral parishioners serve weekly to the local hungry.






