Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

It's hard to believe May is upon us. How quickly the year is moving! How fast time seems to fly — especially as we age!

As we continue our Easter Season, the joy of the Resurrection promises new life so abundant we call it Eternal Life.

However, it is imperative to take each day as a gift from God and live life to the fullest by serving our sisters and brothers.

I have always been known as a list maker. Since childhood, I have kept a list of all the various birds I have identified. I keep a list of baseball cards from multiple years. I list all the Christmas gifts I need to purchase. The other day, I discovered a list worth keeping....so I am sharing it with you today.

- The most significant problem to overcome: fear
- The most potent force: love
- The greatest asset: faith
- The most worthless emotion: self-pity
- The most prized possession: integrity
- The most significant barrier to success: excuses
- The most satisfying work: helping others
- The ugliest personality trait: selfishness

I want to add that God's gift of life is rooted in prayer, serving, forgiving, sharing (especially with the poor), and humor! In his book *Just Like Jesus*, Max Lucado points to the gift of touch.

"Oh, the power of godly touch. Haven't you known it? The doctor who treated you, or the teacher who dried your tears? Was there a hand holding yours at a funeral? Another on your shoulder during a trial?

A handshake of welcome at a new job? Can't we offer the same?

In today's gospel reading, Jesus speaks of having chosen and befriended all who have remained with him. The offer of friendship to disciples



is part of a chain of love that begins with the Father, whose love is poured out in the self-gift that is Jesus, who offers friendship to all. Jesus then tells his friends how to keep that chain unbroken; pay the love forward to others, befriending them in the way that he has done for them. He speaks of this as a 'commandment,' which seems an odd term in this context. How can one be commanded to "love" another person? In biblical parlance, "love" signifies not so much the feelings one has toward another. Rather, it designates deeds of loving kindness toward another that communicate to that one that they are part of a community of chosen friends of God and Jesus. We are commanded to act this way toward others, no matter how we might feel about them and whether or not they reciprocate the love offered.

Congratulations to Chicago's 14 Newly Ordained Deacons

This Saturday at the Cathedral, Cardinal Cupich will ordain 14 men to the Diaconate who will serve in parishes across the Archdiocese of Chicago. Two of them are transitional deacons, meaning they will move to priesthood ordination next May, and the remaining twelve are permanent deacons, most of whom are married and have a family, though some are unmarried. It is at diaconate ordination that a deacon takes the promise of celibacy for the rest of the individual's life if he is not married at the time of ordination. There is no canonical or sacramental difference between permanent and transitional deacons; these men will be ordained into just one Diaconate; and the Diaconate is rooted in service to others for the rest of their lives.



We can trace the ministry of deacon back to the early Church. In the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 6, we read that seven reputable men were chosen and filled with the Holy Spirit and had the Apostles lay hands on them. One of these seven men was Stephen, the first Martyr, who died, professing that Jesus of Nazareth had risen from the dead. Around the fifth century, the diaconate ministry began to fade from the Church and would remain this way until the Second Vatican Council. In 1967, St. Pope Paul VI restored the practice of men being ordained deacons of those who did not want to become priests, now understood as the permanent Diaconate. The diaconal ministry then, as it still is today, focuses on three areas of ministry. The deacon functions as a minister of the liturgy, a minister of the Word, and a minister of charity.

During the Rite of Ordination for a Deacon, the bishop hands the Book of the Gospels to the newly ordained and vested deacon (who wears the stole and the dalmatic, symbols of the diaconal office) and says, "Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach." This simple phrase goes to the depths of the

diaconal ministry. Because deacons preach the Word of God, they celebrate the Sacraments of Baptisms and Weddings and assist the poor and the outcast through works of charity.

Deacons assist the priest at Mass, preach the Gospel, prepare the altar, welcome all to share the sign of peace, and dismiss the congregation at the end of Mass. They also preach the Word by offering retreats and days of renewal, going to prisons and nursing homes, and celebrating Communion Services. Deacons perform acts of charity by serving in food pantries and soup kitchens, burying the dead, and assisting those in need.

Through their vocation, deacons are agents of service. When a priest is ordained, the call to service remains from their time as a deacon, and this continues even if the priest is later ordained as a bishop. Please pray for those who will be ordained this Saturday, filled with the Holy Spirit, and have Cardinal Cupich lay his hands upon them, continuing the work of the early Church in an unbroken line of ordaining to serve. Pray also for an increase in vocations to the Diaconate and to serving God's people in the Church so that more people may hear God's voice through actions of love and service.

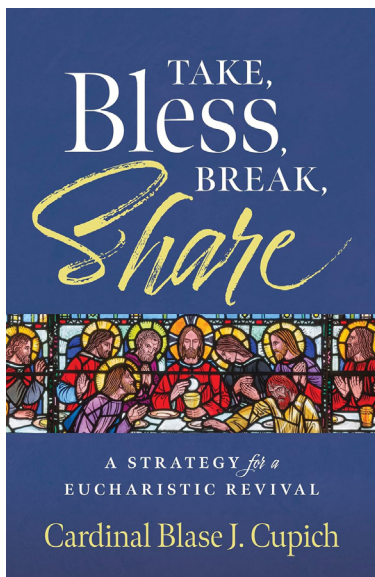

- Coordinated the Mother Cabrini statue and reliquary project and dedication.
- Worked with individual ministries to identify funding sources that would enable them to reach their ministry's goals.
